Bee Facts

A bee carries about 30 to 40mg, of nectar on each journey, this means that between 40,000 and 50,000 journeys are required to produce 1Kg, of honey.

A colony needs about 100Kg. for its own use and produces from 20Kg. and 50 Kg. surplus for the beekeeper. It collects about 30Kg. of pollen for bee food.

Each colony makes seven to 10 million bee journeys per season.

A good colony will have up to 60,000 bees at the height of the season. Eight hives gives about 500,000 bees.

Beeswax can remain unchanged for thousands of years. It has been found in 2,000 year old Egyptian mummies. It probably has more uses than any other natural substance and has valuable antibiotic properties.

Propolis is a sort of 'bee glue', it is extremely valuable
