Over 20,000 youngsters turn out for Blue Peter Bikethon

Over 20,000 youngsters and their parents got on their bikes last month to join in a nation-wide Blue Peter Bikeathon in support of the Leukaemia Research Fund.



The event in Silloth was one of 70 around Britain and 100 local children and parents got themselves sponsored and pushed the pedal to raise money for the charity.

CBBC camera crews filmed a number of the events as part of a half hour special Blue Peter programme. Local organiser, Beth Allison said: “The enjoyment the children got from taking part was a great reward for all the work that went in to organising the day. Everyone had a great time and dressing up to the theme of Pirates just added to the fun, just knowing that the children were raising money to fight leukaemia made it even better.”

(Leukaemia is the most common form of childhood cancer. Leukaemia and related blood cancers affect more than 21,500 people in the UK each year.)

The organisers are confident that, nationally, they will top the 353,000 raised by last year’s 57 Blue Peter Bikeathons, when around 16,000 people took part.

Local organiser Beth Allison sends a special WELL DONE to all the children who took part in the Silloth Blue Peter Bikeathon. At least two of the youngsters cycled 21.9 miles in the two hour event.

“LETS” stands for Local Exchange Trading System. This is a system in place over most of the UK for those who would like to barter their goods or services using “paper money” within the group.

“WASP” stands for Wigton, Aspstria and Solway Plain. This covers a pretty wide area and, as it is beneficial to all who wish to join, it is now being promoted in Silloth where there is currently just one member.

Posters are being displayed in shops and libraries around Silloth with numbers to phone if you would like to become a member.

Talk Tea and Trade get togethers are held approximately once a month as well as a social evening get together in a pub of members choice. At the Tea and Trade there are tables for displaying anything you wish to trade or sell. This is often fresh produce and eggs etc

Subs are £5 per year or £3 if not employed.

We have found that the scheme works really well as members get to know each other and find ways in which they can exchange either goods, or help, or even professional services.
