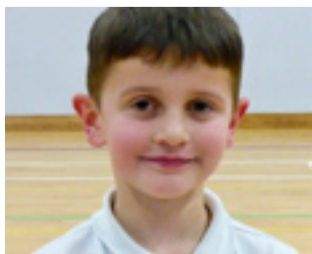

Causewayhead WI held their monthly meeting on February 8th at Trinity Methodist Chapel, Silloth. President Olga Hetherington welcomed members old and new. She also announced that we now had 41 members.

Pat Bell, Treasurer, gave details of funds and then went on to give details of the beach cleans which had taken place. On each occasion that they had done a beach clean they had filled twelve sacks of rubbish plus quite a quantity of other rubbish. Apparently the beach was in a very bad state, obviously a great deal of this was due to the strong winds and rough seas depositing debris on the beach. There was nothing to report on the garden.

A change to the times of meetings was discussed but the practicalities ruled this out.

Members were asked to take part in the town quiz and two teams elected to do this.

The President then introduced our speaker for the evening, Tom Henderson from the local veterinary practice 'Beacon Vets'. Tom is well known to most of our members who have animals and is a familiar figure in the area.

Tom commenced his talk

by giving us a background to his roots and his training as a vet. He was born in Australia and studied at the University of Melbourne Veterinary Science Department. He spent time practicing in Tatura, a town WSW of Shepparton in Victoria, and then gave a precis of how he came to England.

During his talk we were shown slides of various types of diseases and explained how these could be treated. One of the fascinating bits of information was that if twins are born to cows and are of the same sex there is no problem with fertility, but if a bull and a female are born then it is unlikely that the female will be fertile. He also explained the problem they have in Australia with Anthrax as theirs is a recognised zone known

as the 'Anthrax Belt' which runs from New South Wales through Northern Victoria.

He also explained about Urolithiasis which causes bladder stones in animals by crystals in the urine forming these stones. We then saw slides of a Caesarian operation on a dog which was a quite moving experience.

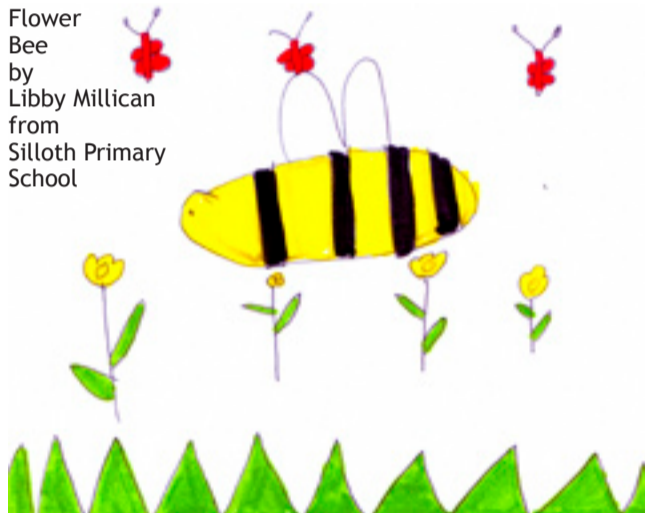
The whole audience was fully focussed on Tom's talk and proved an excellent experience.

They hardly dare say it after all the false alarms last year but Soldiers in Silloth Ltd, the company of volunteers who have been planning the toy soldier museum on Criffel Street are adamant they WILL open at 2pm on Easter Saturday, April 7th.

The planning and set-backs and re-arranging have been as drawn out as long as the story of the Green refurbishment so it seems right that the two new initiatives for bringing more visitors to Silloth should be launched in the same season. Soldiers in Silloth didn't get a

penny of the Lottery million being spent on the Green of course but some funding has been received from Cumbria Waste Management, the Neighbourhood Forum and the town council, and all the building work apart from some painting is completed and Tim Barker's soldier figures are being set up.

A Cautionary Tale

My wife and I recently visited Ilkeston in Derbyshire in order to get our motorhome re-upholstered and during the return trip suffered a rather frightening experience.

We were "cruising" at around 50mph on the inside lane of the M61 when the nearside rear tyre burst. Along with the shredded tyre, the wheel arch above it disintegrated and the adjacent floor suffered extensive damage. Obviously, we were very shaken by the experience but thankfully unharmed and we completed the remainder of the trip with our pride and joy secured rather ignominiously on the back of a breakdown truck. While the wheels were at eye level on the recovery vehicle, we took the opportunity to inspect the remaining tyres very closely and while the tread was more than adequate for a few thousand miles, there appeared to be very small cracks in the sidewalls of another two of them. I am sure many caravan and motorhome owners will be nodding their heads and saying tyres on such vehicles should be inspected much more closely and changed as a matter of course even

if the tread appears to be well within legal limits, but not everyone realises the importance of this.

I contacted some of the national tyre replacement companies to get quotes and prepared to remove the offending wheel in order to get it (the tyre) replaced in order to get mobile again. My plan was to drive probably somewhat gingerly to the big city and change the remaining tyres there. Unfortunately, I was unable to undo the wheel nuts so popped down to West Silloth Motors to borrow a larger wrench, only to be told by the ever helpful proprietor Mark Orchard that they could do the tyres for me. I had needed a tyre a few years ago and they did not do them back then, so I was delighted to find that despite being an older size, I could now get my tyres replaced locally at a better price than I was being quoted from the bigger national dealers.

So, I would strongly recommend that you check your tyres very closely, especially if you do not use them very frequently. If they need replacing, check out West Silloth Motors because as well as having the facilities to do MOT's on most motorhomes, they also do tyres these days.

Awards for WISE Owners

Successful entrepreneurs from around west Cumbria were celebrated at an awards ceremony last Friday.

Ways into Successful Enterprise (WISE) held an awards event at Samuel Lindow, on Westlakes Science and Technology Park celebrating business enterprise across Allerdale and Copeland.

29 people had been shortlisted in five categories:

- Change Through Enterprise
- Business Development Through Training
- Best for the Local Environment
- Business Leadership.

Alan Hunter has been renovating, adapting and creating suitable housing for people with Learning Disabilities for approximately eight years. Over recent years Alan became aware that there is an increasing demand, not only for housing, but for support services that are capable of meeting the needs of this sector. This is

evident from the number of Cumbrian residents who have learning disabilities who are currently living out of the county due to lack of suitable resources. Alan had a vision to create a new service to support people with learning disabilities. Following guidance from WISE, Alan developed his business, Living for Life Cumbria Ltd, which delivers supported living and domiciliary care to people with learning disabilities. Since first being registered in 2010, the business has created 20 jobs and is anticipated to have 40 staff by the end of the year.

After graduating with a degree in design, Rachel Gaw of High Harrington was determined to move into jewellery design, but found that money was a priority and getting a job came first. After working as a teacher for a few years, Rachel attended a meeting of the Cumbrian Network and realised that she really wanted to work with jewellery. After working on the Empty Shop Scheme in Workington, Rachel was

signposted to WISE who helped here create a business plan for Rachel's Wonders. Using research, Rachel identified a market for kitsch, quirky, bespoke jewellery and began making hand cast resin pieces of jewellery, selling her work online, at her local market and events such as vintage fairs and Tattoo Jam, the largest Tattoo convention in the UK. By contacting photographers, models, bloggers and magazine through Facebook, Rachel has seen her work featured in print and used in burlesque, gothic and tattoo-themed photo shoots across the UK.

As well as recognising the achievements of the winners, there was also an opportunity for anyone wanting to improve their career prospects in Allerdale and Copeland to get information on the advice and support on offer through the Ways into Successful Enterprise initiative.

Most of the cargoes coming into Silloth at this time consist of wheat from Germany, (often from a Baltic port such as Rostock), from Canada via Liverpool (or occasionally directly from Canada itself), and home grown wheat from southern UK ports (e.g. Sharpness, Avonmouth or Cowes). A wide variety of fertilizers come from the near continental ports of France, Holland or Belgium, from the Baltic States, from southern Spain and also from Tunisia. Molasses, for animal feed, is usually carried from source, (e.g. Indonesia), by a large tanker to a UK or continental hub port, then

often transferred ship-to-ship into a smaller tanker for delivery to Silloth. Being a very thick treacly substance in basic form and when cool, it has to be kept heated in transit and storage to allow pumping, normally at about 40 Celsius. Eucalyptus wood-pulp for the manufacture of cellophane products, is imported from northern Spain, e.g. Santander or Aviles. Unusual cargoes are always welcome and have included large machinery parts, building materials such as Furnace Bottom Ash (used in the manufacture of breeze blocks), and more recently, wind turbines.

In partnership with Google and Public Library Online, library users will have free and unlimited, round-the-clock access to five themed 'virtual bookshelves':

Arden Shakespeare, which is a collection of ten plays that are on the GCSE National Curriculum including Hamlet, Macbeth and King Lear.

Our Environment, a collection of ten books including Hot Topic by Gabrielle Walker and Sir David King and The Great Warming by Brian Fagan.

Quercus Crime, a series of crime novels published by Quercus including The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo by Stieg Larsson and Carved in Bone by Jefferson Bass.

The Book Group Shelf, which is a collection of fourteen popular contemporary titles such as The Finkler Question by Howard Jacobson and The Two of Us by Sheila Hancock that will appeal to all readers and reading groups.

Adventure for 9-11 year olds, a collection of thrillers for young people including The Cabinet of Curiosities by Paul Dowsell and Mortlok by John Mayhew.

Library users will be able to view the titles by booking a session on a library PC and members of the library will be able to access them via the Cumbria Libraries website at cumbria.gov.uk/libraries and on their home PC's, tablet PC's and smart phones, and be able to read them on screen. Although they are not e-books and can't be downloaded, the titles can be viewed 24/7 from anywhere in the world on a PC or smart phone. Unfortunately, at the moment this service isn't compatible with Apple products.

sloppy defending ended in a second goal being conceded, but there was no panic in the Seagulls' ranks. The players just composed themselves, re-established their passing football and scored a fourth through Lewis Mulla.

This was a significant milestone for the Silloth midfield dynamo as it was his first goal at 'the Bastion' (as the Eden Street pitch is known by the players). Lewis is much more renowned for his cultured passing game than his goal scoring, but he showed all his predatory instincts to react first to a ball that zipped across the box and then divert it into the net with a nonchalant use of his chest. Well done to the Mighty Mulla and I'm sure that this will be the first goal of many he scores at the Bastion!

Man of the match was Dan Foster whose solid defending and measured use of the ball was the platform on which this victory was achieved. The Seagulls have now progressed to the quarter-final stage as they look to be the first side to win the Divisional Cup three times.

Three wins out of three for title chasing Seagulls

The Seagulls were in imperious form as they racked up their highest score of the season thanks to a 15-0 victory over Parton United.

With other results going their way (and

the controversial loss to Windscale being overturned on appeal) the Silloth players knew that the destiny of the Tesco Division One title was in their hands. With only nine league game remaining the Seagulls knew they would have to treat each like a cup final, but with this performance they laid down an impressive marker for the rest of the season.

Silloth hit top gear right from the first whistle as they passed the ball with a pace and accuracy that has become their hallmark. The solid partnership of Paul Hayton and Robbie Carter in the centre of defence gave the Seagulls' full-backs licence to attack and it was little surprise that this was the source of the first three goals. Luke Graham's brace were his first goals for Silloth and they are just reward for a young player who has been outstanding in his debut season. Left-back Paul Glencross got in on the act and scored the goal of the game, as he finished off a slick passing move with a lung bursting run down the left flank and then swept a 25 yard shot over the onrushing keeper.

The Seagulls dominated possession for most of the game, but what was most pleasing for manager John Slack and his assistant Liam Wilson was the players' determination to win the ball back when possession had been lost. This was epitomised by one of the

goals scored by midfielder Andrew Trestianu (who was excellent despite nursing an injury) when he made up 15 yards to rob a defender of the ball and then coolly nutmegged the keeper.

Not only were Silloth in devastating form in front of goal, but the players maintained the intensity of their performance for the full 90 minutes. The Seagulls were 8-0 up at half time and added another 7 in the second half. There were fantastic performances all over the park from the Silloth players including the two youngsters who came off the bench, Kieron Carr and Shaun Clark.

Andy Hinde was once again in deadly form up front, scoring seven goals including a bullet header, a powerful free-kick and numerous one on ones with the keeper. His striking partner Andy Hardman was unlucky to only score two as he had efforts hit both the bar and the post. The other goalscorers were Andrew Trestianu with a hat-trick, Luke Graham two and Paul Glencross.

With so many of his players in outstanding form it was a difficult task for John Slack to pick his man of the match. However there were no arguments when he chose Calvin Rowell whose work rate had been phenomenal, distribution exquisite and was at the heart of all the Seagulls' superb football.

The Seagulls passed the sternest test so far to their title ambitions in a thrilling 4-3 victory away at Cleator Moor Celtic Reserves.

This was never going to be an easy fixture for Silloth and with their opponents fielding six of their first team

squad the job was made all the more difficult. However in the first half of the game the Seagulls' problems were all of their own making as they squandered possession far too readily. Silloth were 1-0 down after only five minutes thanks to a contentious penalty decision by the referee. The Seagulls' passing game was sporadic at best, but they were still able to fashion a number of excellent chances. Unfortunately, none were taken and the pressure began to mount on the Silloth defence. The Seagulls held firm thanks to a string of superb saves by keeper Chris Telford, but he was powerless to stop Cleator Moor's second goal on the stroke of half time.

This match had now become a massive test of character for the Silloth players and manager John Slack's half time message was a simple 'how much do you want to win the league?' Judging from the response of the Seagulls in the second half they really, really want to win the title, as they came out all guns blazing! The midfield quartet of Lewis Mulla, Mark Glencross, Calvin Rowell and Adam Carr were now dictating the tempo of the game and it was only a matter of time before Silloth got on the score sheet. The Seagulls' first was a goal of the season contender from right-back Ryan Hanley, who scored with a 35 yard piledriver.

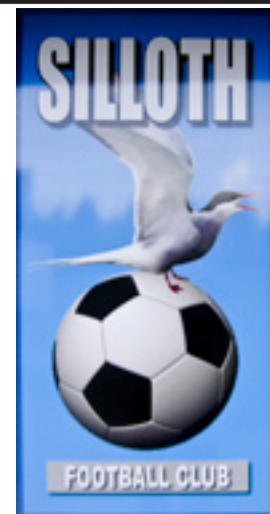
Next it was the turn of the Silloth defence to get in on the action as both centre-half Dan Foster and left-back Paul Glencross hit defence splitting passes that were coolly slotted home by Andy Hinde. When Calvin Rowell

scored the fourth goal the comeback was complete and despite conceding in the last minute the Seagulls left with all three points in the bag. This was a fantastic victory for Silloth, a massive step towards the league title and the players can be extremely proud with the commitment they showed to recover from being two goals down. Man of the match was jointly awarded to the centre-half pairing of Dan Foster and Paul Hayton who were the rock solid foundation on which this win was built.

Calvin Rowell was commanding in the heart of midfield and his swift distribution of the ball kept the Seagulls on the front foot. With wingers Adam Carr and Andrew Trestianu rampaging down either flank Silloth created a host of chances, but with the Parton keeper getting a hand to everything it looked like it was going to be a long afternoon for the men in blue and white. The Seagulls stuck to their guns and by the end of the first half they had a well deserved 3-0 lead.



After the break Silloth began to turn the screw as their passing game hit top gear. This culminated in a stunning team goal that is another strong contender for goal of the season! Mark Glencross received the ball from a throw-in by right-back Ryan Hanley and played it back to the thrower, who in turn slipped the ball inside to centre midfielder Calvin Rowell. Calvin switched play as he sprayed the ball wide to the overlapping left-back Paul Glencross. Paul knock a short pass to Andrew Trestianu who beat his man, drove to the byline and pulled the ball back to Andy Hinde. Andy took one touch to control, swivel and then a second to sweep the ball into the net.

This was one of four goals the Seagulls scored in the second half which sealed an emphatic 7-0 win. Goalscorers were Andy Hardman 2, Andy Hinde 2, Andrew Trestianu (with a delightful lob from the edge of the box), Adam Carr and Mark Glencross. Both Hardman and Hinde worked tirelessly up front, Dan Foster was once again solid in defence and the under 18's Kieron Carr impressed again coming off the bench (almost scoring with a 35 yard effort!) However the man of the match was Calvin Rowell who put on a supreme display that was the definition of a box-to-box midfielder.


