Award for CCC Mobile Website

Award for council's M-mobile-friendly website
Cumbria County Council's website has a sought-after new status for its mobile-friendly accessibility.



ICT professionals SOCITM have granted the site 'M' status, making Cumbria one of only five county councils in the country to hold the award.

As part of an ongoing commitment to improve access and usability of the website for the people of Cumbria, the council's web development team introduced a mobile-friendly version of the county council website last summer.

The value of this development is supported by a recent survey that shows half of all Cumbrian's who have internet access use a mobile phone to connect to the web.

The same survey also showed that 97 per cent of Cumbria's adults under 55 now had access to the internet.

Other recent county council website innovations include an interactive map that shows which roads in Cumbria are planned to be gritted that day and live up-to-date school closure messages which can be viewed from the council's homepage or by those who follow the county council's Twitter account (@CumbriaCC).

Allerdale Local Committee allocates nearly £200k to local community projects

Local communities in Allerdale have received a significant cash boost thanks to Cumbria County Council's Allerdale Local committee.

The committee, which met on Friday 15 March, allocated nearly £200,000 of funds to a wide variety of projects and schemes - everything from a green-fingered community scheme in Dearham and Broughton to a brand new pedestrian crossing outside Cockermouth School.

Cllr Eric Nicholson, Chair of Allerdale Local Committee said "We're

delighted to have been able to help and support so many local and valuable community schemes and initiatives. Everything from repairs to some of our most well know local landmarks and buildings, to new schemes that support everything from our young people to an initiative that supports healthy living. "The diversity of applications shows how active our local communities really are. Our job as elected local members is to support them and ensure that they get the help and support that they deserve."

Chimney Fire Warning

With cold weather continuing to bite despite the arrival of spring, people in Cumbria are being warned again of the dangers of chimney fires.

Extended freezing temperatures and regular icy winds have brought a spike in the number of chimney fires across the county over the past few months.

In January, February and March 2012 there were 69 chimney fires county-wide compared to 105 this year with nearly a week of March still remaining – an increase of more than 50 per cent.

Chimney fires tend to be caused by a build up of coal soot or increasingly frequently -with more and more people using wood-burning stoves – wood tar deposits.

So before residents next combat the cold by settling down in front of a roaring fire, Cumbria County Council's Fire and Rescue Service is urging them to take a few simple steps to prevent potential tragedy.

Some simple tips can greatly reduce your chances of having a fire in your chimney include:

- Make sure you have a functioning smoke alarm and check it works regularly
 - Sweep the chimney before use
 - Ensure a fireguard is used at all times – it can prevent a serious property fire
 - Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house
 - Never use petrol or paraffin to light your fire.
- Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service would also recommend the following simple maintenance routines:
- Solid fuel fires - swept once a year for smokeless fuel; twice a year for coal

- Wood burning fires - four times a year when in use
- Gas fires - once a year if designed for sweeping
- Oil fires - once a year.

What to do if you have a chimney fire

- Call the fire service - 999
- If you have a stove then shut all air vents and flue dampers to reduce the chimney fire's oxygen supply
- If you have an open fire then gently splash water on it to extinguish the fire.

- Move flammable materials, furniture, ornaments away from the fireplace
- Do not pour water on the fire if you have a stove
- Ensure that the fire brigade can access the loft space
- Chimney fires tend to be caused by a build up of coal soot or wood tar deposits.

The heat from the fire warms the deposits until they ignite and the fire then spreads up the chimney. The extreme heat from chimney fires can quickly cause severe damage.

Cumbria's Assistant Chief Fire Officer, Adrian Buckle, said: "As the figures show, there has been a surge in the number of chimney fires around Cumbria this year – a combination of extended cold weather and more people using open fires and wood burning stoves. Chimney blazes can quickly wreak danger, destruction and even death so it's essential that people take steps to protect themselves, their families and their properties. The easiest way to deal with a chimney fire is to prevent it occurring in the first place."

Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service provide free home fire safety visits, fitting free smoke alarms where applicable.

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Reflexology



Reflexology is a technique of diagnosis and treatment in which certain areas of the body, particularly the feet, are massaged to alleviate pain, tension, or other symptoms in various organs of the body.

It has been practised in some form for thousands of years, in China, India and also ancient Egypt. However, it was not until the early part of the 20th century, via the works of both Dr. William Fitzgerald, an American ENT consultant, and later in the 1930's of a lady called Eunice Ingham, that Reflexology, also known as 'Zone Therapy', was acknowledged in the West.

It is an 'energy-based' therapy since reflexologists believe that the body's energy flow follows certain routes on each side of the body ending with the fingers and toes. Every organ and gland in the body has a corresponding ending, or pressure point on the feet, hands, or another part of the body - even the ears! Reflexologists know which area of the foot

corresponds to which body part by learning 'maps' of the feet. When the available energy routes are blocked for whatever reason, a tenderness on the body at a specific site, indicates some ailment or condition in the body that may exist somewhere other than at this tender area. The massaging of particular reflex points enables these blockages to be cleared, restoring the free flow of energy, and assisting the body's own healing process.

The best way to undergo reflexology is in the hands of a trained therapist who will usually massage the reflex areas - primarily the feet, via specific finger and thumb manipulations, often with the tiniest movement, concentrating on any tender areas that correspond to the part of the body that is ailing. Several treatments may be necessary to obtain maximum benefit.

Go Green with GoLakes Travel

The growing number of ways to visit the most popular areas of the Lake District without relying on your own car has gained political recognition at the top level, with the transport minister visiting Cumbria to find out more about the exciting new initiatives being delivered through the GoLakes Travel programme.

Norman Baker MP paid a trip to Windermere train station to see the range of sustainable travel alternatives on offer after travelling up by train from London. After hopping onto a First TransPennine Express train from Oxenholme to Windermere, the minister launched the new sustainable Mini Clubman pay-as-you-drive service now available from Windermere station through CoWheels and delivered in partnership with First TransPennine Express.

The low-emission (under 100g CO2/km) hire car is designed for people needing to make the last leg of their journey by hire car if the other options of bus, boat, bike or electric bike aren't suitable for their final holiday destination.

The vehicle is one of the growing fleet of sustainable short-term hire vehicles being rolled out by GoLakes Travel - all of which are either zero- or low-emission. For this tourist season, there will be eight vehicles available for hire in the central Lake District's most popular locations, including Ambleside, Coniston, Hawkshead and Staveley. As well as the Minis, visitors can also hire fun-to-drive electric Twizys, while local businesses are being encouraged to consider hiring an electric Kangoo van for their short-term needs.



As well as offering vehicles for hire, GoLakes Travel is also establishing a network of electric charge points, with 12 now coming on stream. The total sustainable hire fleet is predicted to expand to 15 vehicles by 2015, and will be operated as viable standalone businesses that will then expand across the county.

After launching the Windermere pay-as-you-drive service, the transport minister also had a go on an electric bike - another important element of the GoLakes ethos of giving people more choice and more sustainable alternatives to car travel. GoLakes is working with the Electric Bicycle Network to offer more people more opportunity to try out this fun way of getting around and take the sting out of some of England's steepest roads.

The minister's visit was another key step in the GoLakes Travel programme, which is being delivered in partnership by Cumbria County Council, Lake District National Park Authority and Cumbria Tourism. The £6.91m programme is being funded through the Department for Transport's Local Sustainable Transport Fund (£4.89m) and local partners (£2.02m), with the funding available until March 2015. It is hoped that it will create a step change in the way people travel around the Lakes,

with a lasting legacy for years to come taken up by local businesses and tourist operators.

The key aim of the initiative is to cut the carbon footprint of the Lakes and grow the local economy by encouraging more people to visit one of England's best loved tourist destinations using public transport and alternatives to the car. Currently 14% of the Lake District's carbon footprint is accounted for by visitors travelling by car.

As well as offering a wider range of alternative ways of getting around, GoLakes Travel is investing in better transport infrastructure, such as building new cycle routes and making existing routes more cycle-friendly, increasing the number of bus routes and bus stops, encouraging more bike-carrying buses, improving the number of hop on/off boat stops and addressing parking issues.

Transport Minister Norman Baker MP said: "We have now launched the Government's Strategy for a joined-up transport system, so it was pleasing to see first-hand how this vision is already being delivered in the Lake District. I am convinced the Go Lakes initiative offers holiday makers the opportunity to make real sustainable travel choices and I urge other towns and cities across the country to follow their example."

Jim Savege, Cumbria

County Council's corporate director for environment, was among the group meeting the minister, he said: "GoLakes is entering an exciting stage of project delivery, with a number of new initiatives coming on stream this year. We're within grasp of the Lakes having a completely integrated and joined up cycling network, and I think it can become world famous as an incredible place to explore on two wheels. It was great to hear how supportive the minister was of all our initiatives."

Richard Leaf, Chief Executive of Lake District National Park Authority, also met Norman Baker MP. He said: "GoLakes is a once in a generation opportunity to help create a step change in visitor behaviour and build a platform for sustainable travel that can grow and grow. It's just the beginning of a journey which can lead to a significant reduction in carbon emissions."

Richard Greenwood, Cumbria Tourism's Head of Policy & Research, welcomed the minister to Windermere. He said: "From bus to boat and from bike to boot, our slogan is Drive Less, See More. The minister certainly saw more of the opportunities to get around when he visited. We're seeing more and more local hotels and tourism businesses embracing GoLakes and all it stands for. It underlines what the Lake District is renowned for - a healthier, happier visitor experience."



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Clive Carroll at Mawbray

On a bitterly cold March evening there was a warm and intimate atmosphere in the village hall where the audience could sit back in comfort and luxuriate in the experience of seeing a master of the acoustic guitar performing at very close quarters.

On 23rd March Culterham Hall, Mawbray, provided the setting for the extraordinary musical talent of Clive Carroll. This good-humoured, modest but self-assured man had his audience spellbound by his technique and constantly surprised by the variety of his repertoire. He could cover any musical genre that took his fancy at the drop of a hat, from sizzling bluegrass licks to sedate Renaissance suite parts, blistering Irish jigs and reels to sophisticated pieces of jazz and tongue-in-cheek 'pop' and 'country' quoting. Clive's own compositions were exquisite; one entitled 'Oregon' just had to be seen and heard to be believed! Wide open North American spaces described by a combination of atmospheric chords, soaring notes and haunting percussion played



simultaneously on various surfaces of the guitar, (catch it on YouTube ... you will love it). 'Eliza's Eyes' was a beautiful piece dedicated to his young daughter while 'Sid The Squid' was a brain-tickling rhythmic cameo inspired by the style of Ian Drury.

This musical giant has been soaking up all kinds of music like a great sponge since he was a baby and now he wrings it all out in concert and showers his audience with a rare warmth and generosity of musical spirit.

The sense of occasion was huge! Having such an amazing guitar virtuoso right on your doorstep just felt a bit crazy but it happened at Mawbray! I was so knocked out by the performance that I went, the very next night, to the final concert of his mini Cumbrian tour over thirty miles away ... two days later he was in Washington

Director Prosecuted

Following an investigation by Cumbria County Council's Trading Standards team, a Director of a roofing company pleaded guilty to adopting aggressive practices and giving misleading information to consumers.

John King of Global Park Homes Ltd, Coventry was sentenced for offences relating to the Consumer Protection from Unfair Trading Regulations 2008, on two counts, for work carried out in November 2011. The regulations protect consumers from unfair or misleading trading practices. The regulations also ban aggressive sales practices.

King pleaded guilty to engaging in a commercial practice which was aggressive, after an 85 year old female consumer entered into a contract for maintenance work on her home. The second charge was for an offence of engaging in a commercial practice which was a misleading in respect of a brochure given to a 75 year old female, which stated that Global Park Homes Limited had twenty years experience in the repair of

such chalet type properties, when the company had in fact only been incorporated since November 2008.

King was fined £250 for each offence, £15 victim surcharge and £4,000 costs.

The offences came to the attention of Trading Standards when one of the victims contacted the team following the setting up of a no cold calling zone at the site to prevent such incidents from occurring. Angela Jones, Trading Standards Manager, said: "We will prosecute traders who adopt aggressive or misleading methods in contravention of the Regulations. We advise all residents to be cautious if approached by cold callers and no-one should feel pressured to buy goods or services on the doorstep. We also recommend that you obtain at least three quotes making sure that you clearly specify what needs to be done and if in doubt contact Trading Standards for advice."

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
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County Council Elections - Boundary Changes





Cumbrian Hotel Websites Approved

Cumbria County Council's Trading Standards team have recently carried out a survey checking the accuracy of the information provided on websites advertising hotel and other similar types of tourist accommodation in Cumbria.

Ninety websites were examined and follow up visits made to all of the associated premises to ensure that: Any statements that could be potentially misleading such as AA or RAC Star ratings, details regarding the distance of the accommodation from tourist attractions such as lakes and shopping areas and any claims as to the facilities provided within the accommodation were accurate.

Checks were also made

to ensure that rooms were actually available at the advertised price, that cancellation policies were clearly stated and fair and that the website itself was compliant with all relevant trading standards legislation.

Trading Standards are pleased to report that all the websites examined gave a clear, realistic description of the quality of accommodation provided and the services available with only some minor non-compliances which have been addressed.

Angela Jones, Trading Standards Service Manager said: "The internet is becoming an increasingly popular medium for booking holiday accommodation and visitors to the region should reasonably expect

to be able to make a clear and considered choice of accommodation based on the information presented. We are pleased that the overall compliance levels were high and the websites gave a clear, accurate picture of the quality of accommodation available."

Ian Stephens Managing Director of Cumbria Tourism said: "Cumbria Tourism has worked tirelessly for many years encouraging high quality standards and I'm sure those successive initiatives and the Annual Tourism Awards have played a key role in improving standards and business practice. She had asked for the collection at her funeral service to be donated to her favourite charity, the RNLI (Royal & National Lifeboat Institution). The sealed


collection box was handed to her son, Ian Kellett, at the end of the service.

You may recall that in the last issue of the Solway Buzz I said that I would expand on the activities of our resident stevedoring company "D.A. Harrison". Most local readers will know of Alan Harrison and his company, based at Waverton near Wigton, which started out as a haulage business back in 1958. As time went by and the business steadily grew, so did his fleet of heavy goods vehicles, with the distinctive pale blue livery. The company expanded into storage, quarrying, farming and several other associated fields, with members of the family specialising in different parts of the business.

Apart from wheat shipments into Carr's Mill between 1912 and 2002, when the mill's own grain suction plant and staff discharged those vessels, all other cargoes at Silloth were supposed to be handled by registered dock workers, employed through the National Dock Labour Board (NDLB). Prior to the abolition of that scheme by the Government in 1989, stevedores or dock workers were registered in a number of 'labour pools' at ports around the UK. Once they were in the 'pool', it was considered by many that it was a 'closed shop' and dockers now had jobs for life, which although a great scheme for the dockers, it proved overall to be a very inefficient and costly system with low productivity and may well have contributed towards the introduction and success of cargo containerisation. There was a single

Cumberland Registered Dock Workers 'pool', serving the ports of Maryport, Silloth, Whitehaven and Workington. Dockers would be allocated to work at those ports, as and whenever a ship with general cargo needed loading or discharging. The port of Barrow had its own 'pool' of dockers.

Alan Harrison first got involved with Silloth Docks in the 1970's, initially in the cattle lairage side of the port activity. Cattle had been imported intermittently from Ireland and through Silloth Docks, almost since the port was opened in 1859 and there has been a lairage facility of sorts here since that time. (A lairage is a penned area or building, suitable for the temporary resting of animals). Imported cattle were discharged from a specially built or adapted vessel, into the quayside lairage where they were fed, watered and rested, prior to onward movement by road to markets in northern England and the Borders.

Due to a serious lack

of general cargo business through the port in the 1970's, a tripartite agreement was reached between Harrisons, the National Dock Labour Board (NDLB) and the port owner British Transport Docks Board (BTDB), that Harrisons could themselves acquire contracts and work a number of cargoes through Silloth. Their new contracts included a number of animal feed companies, including Carrs Agriculture, C.H. Spence of Liverpool, Ronnie Stobart and Gretna Peat Products. Harrisons also persuaded Nestle Milk at Dalston and British Sugar to move cargoes through Silloth. In 1983, Harrison's became involved in the storage of Blue Circle cement powder being exported from the production plant at Stanhope in Weardale, via the port of

Silloth, to Northern Ireland. Up until then, the cement was delivered by road and discharged from Blue Circle lorries directly into the ship. This was a slow process due to the limited number of cement powder vehicles available for this task. That was until Harrisons purchased, dismantled and transhipped by sea, three large silos from the BTDB at the port of Cardiff, and then built a cement storage and ship loading facility at the port of Silloth, holding up to 750 tonnes, (a ship load), and into which the cement lorries could discharge their loads at any time, not just when a ship was there to receive it.

It was in 1983, that the BTDB, (which owned 21 ports around the UK including Silloth), was privatised by the Government and became

Associated British Ports (ABP). Following the Government's abolition of the NDLB in 1989, all port owners around the UK were able to license and employ their own chosen stevedoring companies. Fully aware of the good reputation of D.A. Harrison's company in this area, and their commitment to the port of Silloth, A.B.P. decided to formally offer the general stevedoring contract to that company. Apart from the brief addition of a second trial company in 1992, Harrisons have continued to date as the sole stevedoring company at Silloth. They continue to supply their own cargo handling equipment, including a modern crane, whilst providing an efficient, flexible service and handling a variety of cargoes for the port and the cargo shippers alike.

Watch Out - Burglar About

Cumbria Police are urging householders to keep doors and windows locked to prevent 'sneak-in' thefts.

Recently there have been a few sneak-in burglaries at homes in Allerdale and some have been in the Silloth area. Offenders have entered houses by insecure doors and windows and have stolen property including handbags, cash, mobile phones, laptops and keys.

Most have happened during the evening or overnight, at houses where doors have been left unlocked or windows open. In some cases occupants have been at home but unaware of the burglary until later.

It would appear that some offenders are wandering the streets looking for insecure doors and windows. Nationally, over 40% of domestic burglaries are committed by opportunist thieves taking advantage of open or unlocked doors and windows.

Crime levels have fallen recently and dwelling burglary remains a



relatively rare crime, but there are still some thieves out there looking for easy opportunities.

The good news is that by taking a few basic precautions, homeowners can reduce the chances of becoming a victim.

- Crime prevention tips
- Whenever possible keep your doors locked and windows closed, especially if you are upstairs, or in another part of the house, or in the garden. Also we encourage people to fit, and most importantly use, good locks on ground floor and accessible windows.
 - Remember to lock up even if you are only going out for a couple of minutes - that is all the time a thief needs.
 - Before going to bed, close all ground floor and accessible windows and remember to lock all of your doors.
 - It is worth remembering that most household

insurance policies do not cover the theft of property from within a home that has been left insecure.

- Postcode all types of property to deter thieves and improve the chances of tracing the stolen items. 'Postcoding' can be done with ultra-violet marker pens, engraving, stamping or even paint. Property can also be made identifiable by other unique systems, such as 'Smartwater'. Further details are available at www.smartwater.com or from your local Neighbourhood Police Officer or Crime Prevention Officer.
- If you have an intruder alarm - use it. Set it at night to protect vulnerable zones.

Report anything suspicious. Please let us know as soon as possible if you see anyone behaving suspiciously; many criminals are apprehended due to information from members of the public. Simply telephone 101, or if a crime is in progress, 999.

If you have information regarding crime you can also contact Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111. You will not be asked for your name.

Nuisance Fires

A spate of deliberate fires in west Cumbria continued with firefighters being called to tackle around thirty grass and rubbish blazes across Allerdale and Copeland.

This spike has led to a renewed warning from Cumbria County Council's Fire and Rescue Service that lives are being put at risk.

Firefighters attended incidents at areas including Frizington, Workington, Cleator Moor, Seaton and Maryport to extinguish burning grass and rubbish that had been deliberately set alight.

Adrian Holme, station manager at Cockermouth, Keswick, Wigton and Workington fire stations, said: "These fires are putting lives in danger and I'd urge anybody considering creating a blaze of this nature to think of the potentially fatal consequences of their reckless actions. Dealing with so many avoidable incidents over the weekend really stretched our resources and meant that we were needlessly tied up rather than being available for more serious emergencies. Deliberate fires, particularly those involving grass and gorse, can spread rapidly and quickly get out of control endangering lives and

property."

Siddick Fire

Environmentalists and leaders at Allerdale Borough Council have condemned the actions of those who are believed to have started a fire at one of West Cumbria's most important nature reserves. Firefighters say the blaze at the Siddick Ponds Nature Reserve at Workington was probably started deliberately. The Council is now reviewing security at the site.

Owned by Allerdale Borough Council, the reserve is managed in conjunction with Natural England and the Friends of Siddick Ponds Nature Reserve, with the assistance of the RSPB and local wildlife groups. The reserve is also a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) due to the many species of bird life it supports. The large reed beds and extensive open water habitat attract rare and endangered bird species including bittern, which are protected by European law due to their low breeding numbers, as well as reed warbler, water rail, and reed bunting.

The Friends of Siddick Ponds are a group of volunteers who give thousands of hours of their time to conserve

and maintain the site. Volunteers have helped with conservation tasks including wetland planting, scrub coppicing, reed cutting, meadow cutting and footpath construction as well as interpretation for visitors. They also receive support from organisations such as Connexions, West House, which helps people with learning difficulties, and the Fairburn Trust, as well as via community payback schemes.

Cllr Michael Heaslip, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive Member for Locality Services, said: "This is devastating for the nature reserve and it is heartbreaking to see the damage that has been caused. It's nesting season so this is the worst possible time of year for this to happen. We will be looking closely at our bird populations to see what the lasting impacts are. The vegetation will regrow and repair itself over time but it is going to take many months before that happens."

Kirsten Mawby, Allerdale Borough Council's Parks and

Open Spaces Officer, said: "If it wasn't for the work of the Friends, Siddick Ponds would not be such a beautiful wildlife haven. They do an amazing job and give up many hours of their time to help conserve this site for the benefit of the wildlife, but also the thousands of people who come to enjoy it every year."

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
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Solfest Has Booked Even More Bands

Cumbria's biggest, brightest and best music and arts festival running from 23rd to 25th August, Solfest is delighted to announce a second wave of headline bookings.

Just added to the Solfest line up and booked to appear on the mainstage this year are New Model Army, Deaf School, The Joy Formidable, Twisted Wheel, our 'Very Special Guests' Alabama 3, plus Jakarta Club, Ahab, Delhi 2 Dublin, N.U.M.B, By The Rivers and Victorian Trout Conspiracy,

New Model Army played their first gig in Bradford on October 1980, after deciding to form a stripped-down three-piece. Their music draws on a wide collection of influences and is fuelled by their passion for punk, northern soul and the incendiary atmosphere of the times.

Early in 1984, the producer of The Tube, the most important live music show on TV at the time, invited New Model Army to appear on the programme. Having originally asked the band to perform their provocative anti-anthem, 'Vengeance', Channel 4 suddenly got cold feet about the song's lyrics minutes before broadcast and asked the band to change songs. It made no difference. Somehow twenty to thirty followers had managed to get into the TV studio and when NMA began with 'Christian Militia' the audience went wild and the electric atmosphere was transmitted around the country. Consequently their first mini-album, Vengeance knocked the debut album by The Smiths from the top of the Independent Charts.

Soon after the band were signed by EMI with a contract that stipulated complete artist control. Their debut album, No Rest For The Wicked and the single 'No Rest' both reached the UK top 40, but this success did little to soften NMA's confrontational attitude. They appeared on Top Of The Pops wearing T-shirts with a motif reading 'Only Stupid Bastards Use Heroin'

(a reaction against the fashionable drug of the time) and were never subsequently invited back.

Since then New Model Army have left EMI, signed to Epic, left Epic and started their own management and label Attack Attack, lost their manager suddenly, had several line-up changes, fought illnesses, survived devastating fires and the theft of all their equipment. Throughout it all they have sustained the interest of tens of thousands of devoted fans in the UK, Europe, North and South America and the Far East with album after album of critically and commercially successful albums and intensive touring of their dynamic live show.

Deaf School formed in Liverpool in 1973. Between 1976 and 1978 they recorded three albums for the Warner Brothers label, in an art rock style that had its roots in cabaret, moving towards a harder punk rock sound. The band split in 1978 but have since been recognised as an important influence on many British musicians. Nearly all its members went on to enjoy successful careers afterwards, notably guitarist Clive Langer, who would produce Madness and Dexys Midnight Runners (two non-Liverpool acts who cite Deaf School as an influence). He would also co-write (with Elvis Costello) the song 'Shipbuilding'. Frontwoman Bette Bright married Suggs frontman of Madness!

The Joy Formidable formed in 2007 in the Welsh town of Mold. The three-piece released their debut single in July 2008, 'Austere' and through continuous hard touring and their explosive live shows the band have continued to build an audience with their own brand of big and noisy alternative rock that falls somewhere between the work of The Breeders and UK bands like Echobelly and Catatonia. Basically what they produce is high octane pop-rock fired by great hooks and riotous choruses.

Twisted Wheel hail from Greater Manchester and since coming together in

early 2007 have been booked as one of the support acts for Oasis's 2009 Heaton Park concerts, supported heavyweight rock bands like Kasabian and The View and played Reading, Leeds, T In The Park, Glastonbury and other large UK festivals. Embraced for their strong melodies, psychedelic themes


Whinlatter, Newlands and finally Honister - to complete an epic ride of 75 miles with a sting that is most certainly in the tail.


