The event will give local people, groups, organisations and volunteers an opportunity to showcase what Silloth is and what the town as a whole has to offer. It is also a fun day out for children and their families

There's lots of entertainment for the kids. The Splash pad will be on and the programme includes a Punch and Judy show; a Magician; Kids DJ; Balloon Man; Face Painting and Glitter Tattoos, Donkey

Rides and a Funfair.

Kids can feed the
donkeys with carrots and
Donkey Sanctuary Welfare
Officer Pam Moon will be
on hand to answer questions
about donkeys and their
welfare. Donkeys are a real
part of the Green's heritage
and Stephen Wright, who
co-authored 'A Century
Around Silloth' with Peter
Ostle is putting a display
together with old photos and
information about donkeys

on the Green in times past.

Adults and younger people will be entertained by music organised by the Music and Beer Festival Committee. Children from the school will also be performing and Moky Fit will put on a session on the trailer stage. Food demos from John Crouch and bread making from Carrs will be in the big marquee; also historical information and photos, courtesy of the Holme St Cuthbert History Group.

The Carnival and Kite Festival Committees will showcase what they are doing this coming year and the Vintage Rally will be bringing a few vehicles along on the day, to give people an advance glimpse at what they are doing later in the year. Information about Soldiers in Silloth will be available and the exhibition across the road from the Green will be open. The Roman Deja Crew will be telling stories about Roman times and showing what would be involved in being a Roman Soldier. There's also a spinner, potter and metal jewellery maker from Roman times. They'll not only demonstrate their skills, they'll be encouraging people to have

Silloth lifeboat launched to a stricken sailing vessel off Port Carlisle Saturday afternoon 13th April.

There were two persons on board the yacht which was disabled and taking on

water.

The yacht 'Snap' was towed back to its mooring in Port Carlisle by the lifeboat crew who are shown above on their way to the incident. Steve Henderson (Senior Helmsman) said "The two persons on board were very cold and wet but otherwise unharmed"

The lifeboat crew transferred the casualties to the Atlantic 85 B class lifeboat and took them ashore to the awaiting Brough By Sands Coastguard.

# Tony Coming to Abbeytown School

Sir Tony goes back to school to help us find more Teachers

This year, Send My Friend to School, organised by the Global Campaign for Education UK, is asking teachers and their pupils to get creative and remind world leaders that every child needs a teacher.

Holm Cultram Abbey School, in Abbeytown has been making brightly coloured and symbolic cut-out teachers to represent the 1.7 million teachers missing from schools around the world.

On 24th May, Sir Tony Cunningham will be supporting our efforts and getting involved with ALL the school, from looking at class sizes to what makes a good teacher, and to tell us about what it was like for him going to school and compare it to those in Africa today.

We hope that Sir Tony will deliver the cut-out teachers to the Prime Minister to remind the UK government of their promise to make sure all children have access to primary education by 2015.

Tony Cunningham said: "There are 1.7 million teachers missing in classrooms all across the globe and I am a strong supporter of efforts to ensure universal access to primary education is reached by 2015.



The Send My Friend to School campaign, organised by the Global Campaign for Education, is doing a wonderful job reminding world leaders that education is a right all children should be able to enjoy. As a former teacher I have a special interest in ensuring that the 60 million children who currently do not have access to primary education are not only able to attend school but

that the teachers themselves get the necessary training to deliver a quality education. Education is one of the most important building blocks to help countries all over the world develop in the future and I am thrilled to "go back to school" in support of this campaign and am very impressed by the work the children of Holm Cultram Abbey School are doing on behalf of the campaign."

Nicola Cadbury, Global Campaign for Education UK said: "Every year almost a third of all UK schools take part in the campaign to help their peers overseas realise their right of a basic education. We are always moved by the creativity and passion we see from UK pupils and urge everyone to keep working towards this important goal. There are just two years to go now to meet the Education For All target. The global professionally trained teaching force must be expanded if we are to get 60 million more children into school, to be taught in decent sized classes by adequately paid, well trained and motivated teachers."

# Going Ape - £500 for **Christ Church Roof**

Christ Church roof needed fixing so..... ...... We decided to do something about it by 'Going Ape' in Grizedale Forest and raising some money to help pay for it!

Saturday 6th April saw my youngest grand-daughter Sarah-Jayne and me up in the treetops at Grizedale Forest. The weather was perfect, sunny but not overly warm with just a hint of a breeze. It looked higher than we at first thought it would be but we got kitted up with harnesses and, after going through the safety procedures and instructions, we set off on the great adventure.

The first stage was relatively easy with a rope ladder, easy crossing and small zip wire. The course then progressed through the stages to very hard at stage six. Walking the plank (swinging from one plank to another!), Tarzan swings and zip wires all took on a new meaning as did the rolling barrels, swinging logs and rope crossings. We were going really well until stage five when one such rather long rope crossing proved too much for me when my arms gave up on me. Rather than landing on the platform on the next tree, I gently rolled back to the centre of the cable hanging in space in my harness about 60 feet above the forest floor with no strength to proceed forward or go back! Ten minutes later (it felt more like an hour!) I was still 'hanging around' realising that I couldn't be rescued and I would need to do something for myself if I ever wanted

to get my feet on the ground again. With Sarah-Jayne shouting encouragement from the tree in front, and a couple doing the same from the tree behind, I finally managed to reach the next platform where I could zip wire to the ground. At that point I realised that it was not safe for me to carry on to the final stage, nor would I have been able to take care of Sarah-Jayne so we threw in the towel and headed back down to the lodge to get our harnesses off. Initially, we were very disappointed at not finishing but one young employee of Go Ape told us that we had done very well and that a lot of people don't get past the first stage. This made us feel much better. He gave us our certificates to prove we had done it and we headed for something to eat.

So what was the worst bit? Undoubtedly hanging stranded in space was horrendous but climbing

the rope ladders came a close second. And the best bit? The zip wires without a doubt. They were exhilarating, even the one I dreaded most which was very high, very long and straddled the valley and the road. The return zip wire was just as far but not quite so high. I could see right down the valley and waved to people who had stopped to watch me go by. Wonderful! Would I do it again? I don't think so but Sarah-Jayne definitely has high hopes of making a return trip but needs an over 18 to accompany her. Any offers?

We think we have raised in excess of £500 for Christ Church, Silloth to help pay for the roof repairs and thank all our sponsors for patiently waiting since October for us to get it done. The church roof still needs work done on it so if anyone else would like to support us we'd be very grateful!


Maureen Gibson led the prayers and included prayers for Overseas members in Tanzania and Burundi and also Hereford in England. Lesley Reed then spoke on the theme of Gardens reminding us of the seeds we sow. When children are young they sow their wild oats and we set seeds in

youngsters and so it goes on through life that the seeds we sow count. She had brought seeds set in paper tapes and rounds to show how easy it can be to sow seeds for your garden but warned not to over water the compost and make sure your pots are clean. It is cheaper to recycle plastic dishes which have been cleaned but make drainage holes in the bottom. You can use vermiculite to cover the seeds and wrap pots in bubble wrap to protect from frost. Some seeds need to be kept cold in order to germinate and always water from the

bottom to encourage root growth. Lesley began sowing seeds for the children at preschool groups then went to work at Bank Mill and learned horticulture at college. Freda Garner thanked Lesley for a very interesting and informative talk. Anita Norman and Judith Bryan served refreshments then Joan Winter read the minutes of the March meeting. Freda Garner was presented with a gift voucher to thank her for the many years she was Branch Treasurer.

# Zen Shiatsu Therapy



Zen Shiatsu is a physical therapy that supports and strengthens the body's natural ability to heal itself, working on the whole person – not just the physical body. It originated in Japan from traditional Chinese medicine with influences from more recent Western therapies.

There are several types of Shiatsu and 'Zen Shiatsu' is one such form. Since the word 'shiatsu' means 'finger pressure' in Japanese, when practising this therapy a practitioner may use touch, comfortable pressure and/ or manipulative techniques to address a client's health issues. However, existing methods of diagnosis were

further refined by early Shiatsu practitioners, specifically, Shizuto Masunaga. He incorporated special exercises to stimulate the flow of 'Ki,' or energy, within the body to further enhance earlier techniques.

Today, Shiatsu can be found in many different styles, each based upon a particular philosophical approach whilst retaining the basic theories/techniques from its original inception in Japan. For example, certain practitioners may focus more on acupressure, that is, locating the acupuncture points on the body but instead of inserting a needle to disperse a perceived

blockage in a body's energy flow, finger pressure (shiatsu) will be used to clear the blockage and restore freeflowing energy throughout the whole body.

Receiving Shiatsu can also be a deeply relaxing experience and depending upon the client's reasons for seeking help from this therapy, many people return simply for the pleasure of 'winding down' from busy lifestyles and to enjoy its benefits.

# **Protect Your Family!**

Young people in Cumbria are being encouraged to protect themselves against measles by making sure they have received both doses of the MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccine.

The call by Cumbria County Council's Acting Director of Public Health echoes advice from Public Health England, which is now responsible for vaccination and immunisation programmes in the county.

This month has seen a number of measles outbreaks in different parts of England and Wales.

So far, only one case of measles has been confirmed in Cumbria this year (2013) and the number of parents protecting their children from the disease in the county is high (95 per cent).

Despite the high takeup rates, several thousand teenagers in Cumbria will be unprotected because they were not vaccinated as children when concerns, later discredited, about the MMR vaccine were widely reported.

Measles is an infectious viral illness that is spread when infected people cough or sneeze. It can have serious complications and in some cases prove fatal.



The most common symptoms are fever, cough, sore eyes and a rash that develops three or four days after the onset of illness, starting with the face and head and spreading down the body.

Doses of the MMR vaccine are usually given at 13 months and between the ages of three and four. However children of any age, right up to young adults, should consider vaccination if they missed out at the recommended ages.

Dr Rebecca Wagstaff, Cumbria's Acting Director of Public Health, said: "While vaccination rates amongst children in Cumbria are currently amongst the highest in the country, there are still a number of teenagers who failed to get protected when they were younger. It is not too late and no one, anywhere in Cumbria, should take the risk of catching measles when a safe and effective vaccine is available."

Anyone who is concerned or wants more information on how to get themselves protected should speak to their GP, Health Visitor or Practice Nurse.

# Gritting to Repairing



Cumbria County Council's highways team is gearing up for an intensive programme of road repairs after one of the most testing winters in recent memory.

New data from the council's fleet of 33 gritters shows that, although the 2012/13 winter did not have the severe, deep frost spells experienced in the preceding winters, the county had the highest number of freezing nights for seven years – with gritters called out in the county for 108 nights, the largest number since 2005/6.

In total Cumbria's gritters spread over 36,000 tonnes of salt on a continuous road length of over 175,000 miles this winter – the equivalent of a gritter driving seven times around the circumference of the earth, or driving from Kendal to Cologne 375 times!

The conditions were a test for the county council's new in-house highways team, which successfully transferred back to the council from the contractor Amey in April 2012.

Now that the gritting 'season' is coming to its end at the close of this month, the same highways staff will be able to switch their focus from gritting to repairing and improving the county's highways, which have taken a severe hit from the harsh winter conditions and two

exceptionally wet summers – with the number of potholes traditionally peaking at this time of year.



Overall the county council will be investing some £30 million in its planned road repair programme in 2013/14, and a further £29.3 million in 2014/15. Around £10.5 million of this money will be spent in 2013/14 on find and fix' repairs to tackle pothole problems. During the year the council's highways team expects to repair and complete over 40,000 reported road defects, with the response times showing continued and sustained improvements, so that the average time it takes to find, fix and 'close' a reported fault now running at just 11 days.

Cumbria has one of the largest road networks of any English local authority, with nearly 5,000 miles of highways to maintain - serving both scattered rural communities as well as some 40 million visitors to the county.

Andrew Moss, Cumbria County Council's Assistant Director for Highways and Transport, said: "It's been a challenging winter and we appreciate that some people are concerned about the condition of the road network. It's normal for the number of potholes to peak at the end of the winter season, and our highways teams will be putting in the effort and the expenditure over the forthcoming months to make significant improvements. The Department for Transport recently recognised the length of Cumbria's road network and the challenge of maintaining remote rural roads with additional £6m funding for the next two years, and now that we have this money, we will be investing every single penny straight into repairing and improving our roads. I would like to pay tribute to the sterling work our highways teams do in often challenging conditions. The new figures analysing the severity of this winter show that the £7m the county council invested in its new fleet, including the gritters, was money spent wisely."

This winter the county council also launched its live interactive gritting information service at www.cumbria.gov.uk/gritting which features a Twitter service and live map explaining which routes are being gritted.

# Fight Fraud with Scamnesty this May

May 2013 is Scams Awareness Month. The campaign which runs throughout May aims to raise awareness of scams and calls on consumers to drop scam mailings they have received into designated 'Scamnesty' bins.

Scams are schemes to cheat people out of their money. Scams come in a variety of ways: post, phone, email, online, sometimes with a knock on the door.

There are hundreds of scams: fake lotteries and prize draws, bogus health cures, dodgy investment schemes, pyramid selling, phishing - to name just a few. New scams appear as more people become aware of them and as criminals try to keep one step ahead.

Every year more than three million people in the UK fall victim to scams losing hundreds and even thousands of pounds. It is estimated that nearly half of people in the UK (48 per cent) have been targeted by a scam and that £3.5 billion is lost to scams every year.

Members of the public can take part and fight back against scammers by dropping any mailings into a designated scamnesty bin. The information collected will provide valuable new intelligence and help inform future investigations aimed at preventing others being scammed. Consumers can also drop into a Trading Standards office and take along their scam letters and obtain advice.

Angela Jones, Trading Standards Service Manager said: "Scams can have a devastating impact on people's lives. The conmen used sophisticated techniques and will often deliberately target older or vulnerable more residents. We know that some people feel embarrassed about being a victim of a scam but we would encourage people to seek advice and report any scams. Your actions may help protect others from becoming a scam victim."

If you have been targeted by a scam, or know someone who has then call Action Fraud 0300 123 2040 www. actionfraud.police.uk. Action Fraud is the UK's national reporting centre for fraud and internet crime.




Walking Home by Simon Armitage



# On the Water Front

Report by: Captain Slog (Assisted by David at John Stronach Shipping Agency)

22nd Almeria from Antwerp with fertilizer, then in ballast to Bridport.

23rd Ben Maye from Liverpool with wheat, then in ballast to Liverpool.

One of the earliest customers of the Port of Silloth – and a customer that is still very much a part of the port's activity today – is Carrs Milling Industries. Accomplished baker Jonathan Dodgson Carr first moved to Carlisle in 1831 and opened a baker's shop in the city on Castle Street. By 1834, his skill and success enabled him to open a flour mill and in 1841 he was appointed biscuit maker to Queen Victoria. (What a PR coup that must have been!). Around 1847, JD Carr went into partnership with his brothers and began trading as Carr & Company. As a result of increasing demand, two further flour mills were purchased in Carlisle between 1853 and 1860. It was in 1880, that the company decided that they should centralise the flour milling part of the business and so set about planning to build a large fireproof flour mill at the nearby port of Silloth. The port owner at that time, North British Railways, was in the final stages of planning the construction a new and larger inner dock, following the collapse of the dock gates

to the old "Marshall Dock" in April 1879. This "New Dock" would enable Carr & Co. to bring large ships loaded with grain, directly to their proposed new flour mill, without the additional cost of movement by rail from Liverpool or elsewhere. It was on 10th July 1885, with the "New Dock" having been completed and opened just ten days earlier, when the Carlisle Journal got wind of developments and reported on the projected new flour mill at Silloth, as arranged between Messrs Carr & Co. and the North British Railway. This was to be a facility that would encompass a large 'fireproof' flour mill, fitted with the latest milling equipment, along with grain stores and associated equipment for loading and discharging from ships. On 22nd January 1886, the Carlisle Journal updated its readership, stating that the mill architect, Mr T. Taylor-Scott, had been appointed and that the

builders would be Messrs Beaty Bros. of Carlisle, whilst fireproofing work would be undertaken by Messrs Homar & Rogers of

Manchester and London and that all internal ironworks would be erected by Messrs Houskin & Co of Glasgow. The Carlisle Journal edition of 10th December 1886 reported that during the previous nine months, the building and fireproofing works had been completed, whilst the ironworks and

fitting out of the mill with silos, a 300hp mill engine, cranes and ancillary equipment was expected to be completed in the Spring of 1887. This deadline was in fact achieved and subsequently two of the three redundant Carrs flour (To be continued)

# **Empty Property** Loan Scheme

A loan scheme has been launched which will help make more homes available across Allerdale and bring empty properties back to life.

Empty property owners can apply for funding from Allerdale Borough Council to renovate properties in order to bring them back into occupation - either to live there themselves or to make them available to sell or rent. The Council also runs a matchmaker scheme, putting property owners in touch with prospective purchasers and vice versa.

The Council has been awarded £226,217 from the Homes and Communities Agency (HCA), and has contributed an additional £113,109 to the scheme.

According to the HCA funding criteria, eligible properties must be in Maryport or Cockermouth, have been unoccupied for six months or more, and could include commercial properties which are being converted into living accommodation.

The loans can be used to bring the properties up to a decent standard, as well as improved security and energy efficiency. All loans will be secured with a legal charge against the property until the funding is repaid in full, but there are no fees to pay to receive the loan and no penalty charges for early repayment.

There are terms and conditions to the loan, however. The applicant must be over 18 years of age and be the owner of the property. A loan will not be paid for refurbishments that have already been undertaken, work must be completed within six months and the property must be available for rent or sale within four weeks of the completion

Clients can borrow 75% of the cost of the works, up to a total of £7,500, though the owner will be required to pay 25% of the price of eligible works.

Cllr Carni McCarron-Holmes, Executive Member for Housing, said: "It is wrong that properties should be standing empty when there is a shortage of affordable housing in many areas of the borough. This funding will give residents more opportunity in the housing market. The Council's officers are always available to provide advice about work that may be needed to bring an empty property back into use, as well as offering the matchmaker service to put owners in touch prospective purchasers. Officers can also provide information about the Green Deal and Cumbria Warm Homes energy initiatives. I would urge anyone who has an empty property to get in touch to see how we can help."

The Local Plan will set out a 15-year strategy to meet the needs of local communities for housing, employment, retail and leisure, while balancing the need to protect the natural and built environment.



# Affordable **Housing Survey**

A survey is to be carried out in towns and villages in Allerdale to investigate the need for affordable housing.

Allerdale Borough Council's Housing Needs Officers will be carrying out the consultation across the district of Allerdale throughout May 2013. Workington, Maryport and Keswick and their surrounding parishes have been surveyed in recent months, so the new consultation will include the other main towns of Aspatria, Cockermouth, Silloth and Wigton, and their outlying villages.

The purpose of the survey is to assess the need for affordable housing in each parish over the next five years, and try to alleviate the current situation where high house prices and low levels of affordable housing mean that many local families cannot afford to live in their community. The anonymous questionnaire will be sent to all households in rural parishes, Aspatria and Silloth and a randomly selected percentage of households in Cockermouth and Wigton and will examine the type of properties residents live in now, ask whether they feel they need to move, and the reasons for their need.

Current figures show that over 3,000 affordable homes are needed in Allerdale, and this figure is expected to rise after the new survey has been carried out. The statistics so far show that

more than 90% of these are for households in need of social rented housing, with the remainder needing low cost home ownership.

Cllr Carni McCarron Holmes, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive Member for Housing, said: "This is an important issue and the provision of affordable homes is one of Allerdale Borough Council's priorities in its Reducing Poverty Strategy. We want to try to limit the situation which affects so many towns and villages in Cumbria where families, particularly the younger generations, are forced to move away because they simply cannot afford rental prices or to get on the property ladder in the communities where they grew up. This survey aims to produce an accurate figure on the type and size of housing that is needed in a parish and will be used by the Council to shape future housing and planning policies. Without the evidence provided by the return of these survey forms it will be difficult for Allerdale Borough Council to ask for affordable housing to be built in the district, so a high response rate is very important and I would encourage residents to help us collect this information."



# Silloth's Sporting Siblings


Since moving to Silloth two years ago, a Blitterlees brother and sister duo have been busy bees.


