Another incident recently resulted in a young boy seriously cutting his knee on a piece of glass left on the ground. The play area is inspected on a daily basis by the town handyman but he can't be there 24 hours a day.

Citizens Advice Q & A

Q I'm a student and I've been doing some casual work over the summer at a local hotel. They offer work to me as and when it's available. If I can't work I don't get paid which they say is because I am not an employee but am employed on a "casual but required" basis. This doesn't seem right to me. Shouldn't I be entitled to the same benefits as other people that work there?

A In short, the answer is no. Casual workers are not normally classed as employees. This is because there is no "mutuality of obligation" between employer and worker. For a contract to exist both employer and worker must be under obligation to each other. The employer has an obligation to provide work and the employee to carry out that work. You are free to work when you want and the employer is free to offer you work when he/she wants. This means that there is no contract of employment and therefore you would not have any of the protection given to employees by legislation. However, if you were to be offered work on a casual but regular basis, this can raise the question of whether there is an element of obligation. This is a very complex argument though, and each case would be considered on it's own merits.
