Have Your Say on Green Spaces & Development **Opport**unities

People living and working in Allerdale are being urged to get involved in an initiative which will both safeguard our green spaces, and find those that are perfect for development.

The Council's Planning Policy team is preparing a Site Allocations Development Plan Document (DPD), which will form part two of the Local Plan for Allerdale, and will allocate sites for specific land uses. As part of the first stage of the consultation the Council has published three consultation documents and issued a 'Call for Sites'.

The consultation documents set out the issues the Site Allocations DPD will address, the types of land use that could be considered, how sites will be assessed and the sustainability objectives.

Through the 'Call for Sites' the Council is urging members of the public, parish councils, landowners and their agents, developers and other interested parties to submit sites for development or protection. Anyone can submit a site for consideration, and, importantly, they do not need to be the owner of it.

Sites can be put forward for development such as housing, employment, retail, leisure and education. Equally sites can be identified for protection such as open space, recreational areas, local wildlife sites and allotments. The preparation

of the Site Allocations Development Plan Document (DPD) will be subject to community involvement and consultation. Those site suggestions which are submitted will be mapped and included in a second stage consultation process that will take place in early 2014.

Councillor Mark Fryer, Executive Member with responsibility for Economic Growth, said: "We are asking organisations and individuals to let us know of any sites in Allerdale which they think are suitable for development or in need of protection in our future plans. We know that planning developments are one of the things which can divide or unite a community, and we also know how important our green open spaces are in our towns and villages. That is why I would encourage as many people as possible to take part in this process – give us your views on which areas really need our protection, as well as those which you think could be developed."

How Secure is Your Shed?

Police often find that as winter approaches and the nights are darker and longer, garden sheds and their contents become a target for thieves. People often do not realise just how much the property in their shed is worth. How secure is your shed and the property inside it? Consider some, or all, of these tips, depending on how valuable your shed's contents are to you.

Security measures will not be effective if your shed is not in sound structural condition, so sort any weaknesses first.

Fit a robust, good quality lock to the door. The more time and noise it takes to force entry, the more effective the deterrent.

If your shed has an opening window, consider

fitting a metal grille to the inside.

Postcode your valuable items or use a forensic coding product such as Smartwater, SelectaDNA, or CrimeStoppers Property Protector to make them uniquely identifiable, and worth much less to the thief.

Consider fitting a shed alarm, but remember these are the last line of defence and should be additional to, and not instead of, good physical security.

Gravel paths in your garden can make it very difficult for a thief not to be heard.

If your shed is in view of your house, use a low-energy dusk to dawn light to illuminate your garden, - they don't use much electricity, and are an effective deterrent.

TOP TIP: Purchase a security chain or cable to secure together larger items such as bicycles and mowers, and anchor the chain using a shed shackle or ground anchor and a closed shackle padlock. Look for the Sold Secure logo to be sure of buying a quality product.

Wetlands Centre Opened

The £1.9m Solway Wetlands Landscape Partnership has now opened the doors of its new Wetlands Centre.

On 9th October, Cumbria Tourism chairman Eric Robson cut the ribbon recalling his childhood spent on the Solway.

He said: "I used to come out and camp on the shores here and have a picnic. It's a magical place and this area has a real other-worldliness about it."

The Solway Wetlands Centre, near Bowness-on-Solway, is part of a major environmental programme, which is conserving and restoring rare wildlife found in the area. Created in a converted Victorian barn, the centre promotes this wildlife with information on the area's natural heritage contained within a visitor centre and education room.

The building was restored using environmental friendly methods including wool insulation, hempcrete plaster and lime pointing. The project was financed by the Heritage Lottery Fund, Natural England, the RSPB and Cumbria Waste Management Environment Trust.

Stephen Lund, team leader at Natural England and chairman of the partnership's steering group, said: "There's a lot of history to the area dating back to the monks and them coming to Holme Cultram Abbey. It's exciting to see this project unveiled. It's the first big thing since the funding was confirmed. This is one of the focal points and a place to teach people about the area."

RSPB Campfield Marsh Reserve provides



the backdrop to the new visitor centre with fantastic opportunities for spotting wildlife all year round. Boardwalks have been built over the coast's peat bogs to improve accessibility, and an education programme is being rolled out to increase knowledge about the area's wetlands.

Current projects being delivered through the Solway Wetlands Project include an archaeology programme with research into the influence that monks had on the area, a series of events to help people experience the wildlife within this landscape and training in traditional skills such as hedgelaying.

Naomi Hewitt, project manager of the Solway Wetlands Landscape Partnership, said: "We have already had so many people come out to see the building and experience the new visitor centre. It has been a great start and we are all really excited about the other projects being delivered over the next three years"

A new scheme is launched to boost the profile of independently-owned businesses in Wigton. The Wigton 'Totally Locally Campaign' (TLC) has been developed by the Chamber of Trade, with support from Allerdale Borough Council.

Customers who make a purchase from participating businesses get a loyalty card stamped with their purchase. Once they have collected 10 stamps they can drop their completed card into Christies, Bron-ja's, The Glasshouse or Stitch & Print to be entered into a monthly prize draw to win gift vouchers ($1 \ge 25, 1 \ge$ $\pounds 15 \text{ and } 1 \ge \pounds 10$ to spend in one of the participating businesses. Arthritis Support Group

Vice Chairman Mary Peile welcomed everyone to the November Meeting.

Andrew Hoye who is part of the Physio Team at Wigton Hospital was introduced and advised us that people with osteoarthritis should exercise as a core treatment irrespective of age, infirmity, pain severity or disability. Exercise should include local muscle strengthening and general aerobic fitness. People should have access to education, advice and information on how to exercise for example what to do for muscle strengthening and where to go for aerobic fitness training.

Weight loss for those overweight is helpful as the more weight you carry the harder your lower limbs have to work. Andrew then told us of the various benefits of exercise. It helps to reduce pain, increases joint range of movement and flexibility and can help to reduce falls. Some favourite are simple exercises at home, walking, swimming (Age UK hold classes at Stanwix Park once a month) cycling, Tai Chi/Yoga/Pilates and the local Gyms. Exercise

The most common reason for failure was due to wear and tear. Problems included poor wiring, defective controls or lack of protection against overheating.

Angela Jones, Cumbria County Council's Trading Standards Service Manager, said: "This was a really

successful event in terms of safety and preventing fires. The results clearly highlight how important it is to make sure your electric blanket is safe. We urge residents to regularly check the blanket for any signs of wear or damage, loose connections or scorch marks. Older blankets in regular use are much more likely to have faults and

The electric blanket testing campaign has now finished, but owners can check the safety of their own electric blankets by looking for the following warning

- · fabric is worn or frayed • there are scorch marks
- tie tapes are damaged or missing
- flex is worn or damaged
- any connections are loose • the heating wires have been

damaged or displaced. To check, hold the blanket up to the light. The wires should be evenly spaced and should not touch each other anywhere.

Older blankets in regular use are much more likely to have one or more of the

above faults. If your blanket is over 10 years old or it is showing any of the warning signs it is recommend that you replace it with a new one.

Safety Tips:

• Never buy second hand electric blankets, they may not be safe and you can't be sure they meet current safety requirements.

• When choosing an electric blanket always buy it from a reliable source and check it has a UK safety standard mark.

· Always read and follow the manufacturer's instructions before use

• Examine your blanket regularly for signs of wear or damage.

• Don't use the blanket while it's still folded or creased.

• Don't use a hot water bottle at the same time as using

your electric blanket.

• Don't touch the blanket if you have wet hands or feet, and never use the blanket if it's wet or damp.

Hadrian's Cycleway Open



A brand new £800,000 cycle path has got the thumbs up from young cyclists in Allonby at its official opening. The new 3.7 mile stretch of dedicated cycleway running alongside the B5300 coastal road from Allonby to Maryport completes the 'missing link' in the 174 mile Hadrian's Cycleway stretching from Tynemouth to Ravenglass through some of the world's best Roman heritage country.

The new cycleway was opened in an event attended by all the partners involved in delivering the cycleway, alongside other community representatives, including schoolchildren from Allonby Primary and Cumbrian elite wheelchair athlete Simon Lawson.

Guests set off southwards along the new route towards The Wave, Maryport.

Previously cyclists had to share the B5300 with motorists in a stretch of the road which had been difficult and potentially dangerous, with fast-moving vehicles and the risk of cyclists being unseen by motorists at some locations. This meant that the route did not come up to the standards of the Hadrian's Cycleway and was not officially designated as part of it. The new route runs alongside the road, but is separated from it to allow cyclists and pedestrians to move freely along without worrying about cars. It crosses the road twice to avoid sensitive ecological and archaeological sites and

places where there is the potential for coastal erosion. According to economic

modelling, the new route between Maryport and Allonby is expected to bring in well over £100,000 a year in new visitor spend to West Cumbria.

According to cyclist head count data compiled by Sustrans, the usage of the Hadrian's cycleway is almost the exactly the same in the North West side of the route as the North East, with 81,000 cycle journeys made every year in the North East and 79,000 in the North West. Most people cycle on part of the route rather than its entire length (around 5% of cyclists using the route are doing the whole length of the cycleway), meaning it is an important local amenity for day trips and also commuting or accessing amenities by bike.

A 2007 study by Sustrans on the economic benefits of the Hadrian's Cycleway, which opened in 2006, said it generated £6.5m for the local economy along the route and created or safeguarded 105 full-time equivalent jobs.

Cllr Keith Little, Cumbria County Council's Cabinet member responsible for highways, said: "West Cumbria really has something to celebrate in this new path. It is already being well used by locals and will be a major asset next year when the tourist season sees more and more cyclists doing the full Hadrian's Cycleway and enjoying what was previously a gap in their

access manager for the Hadrian's Wall Trust, said: "There's plenty to see in this section between Maryport and Allonby alone. As well as the fantastic scenery, visitors can go to the Senhouse Roman Museum, home to the famous Maryport Roman altars and next to the Roman fort Alauna, and Milefortlet 21 along the route."

Brian Irving, Manager at Solway Coast AONB, said: "The opening of the cycleway is testament to partnership working and the level of what can be achieved. Through generous landowners, businesses and the local community, we as a ground-up partnership with support from national funding streams have delivered a high quality and sustainable asset to the highly valued North Cumbrian coast. It is a very proud moment for the organisation I represent."

Some of the bikes used for the launch were loaned from the new bike hire scheme run by the Hadrian's Wall Trust in partnership with Carlisle Leisure. The scheme is part of the trust's eco-tourism project for north and west Cumbria, funded by Defra's Rural Development Programme for England to develop the area as a world-class ecotourism destination. Bikes for adults and children, including 20 power assisted electric bikes for over-16s, can be hired from The Wave Centre in Maryport and Bitts Park in Carlisle, right

Following the recent deaths of young people after they have taken the 'fat burning' substance 2,4-dinitrophenol, known as DNP, Trading Standards is urgently warning the public not to take any tablets or powders containing this ingredient.

DNP is an industrial chemical. It is not fit for human consumption.

However, 'fat-burner' capsules, tablets and powders containing DNP appear to be marketed at the bodybuilding community, and those wishing to lose weight, as a quick way of burning fat.

When consumed, DNP can be extremely dangerous to human health, possibly leading to coma and death. Signs of acute poisoning can include nausea, vomiting, restlessness, flushed skin, sweating, dizziness, headaches, rapid respiration and irregular heartbeat. Consuming lower amounts over longer periods could lead to cataracts and skin lesions and impact on the heart, blood and nervous system. Anyone who believes they may have taken DNP should seek medical advice immediately

The Food Standards Agency in partnership with Trading Standards are taking action to crack down on the illegal sale of DNP.

which became known as Port Carlisle. Over a period of time, relatively larger and deeper vessels needed to gain safe passage through the upper Solway, especially following the opening of Silloth Dock. Following an Admiralty survey of the Solway in 1837, it was decided that a safe channel marked by buoys and shore-marks, (lighthouses), should be established. The Admiralty recommend that a lightship rather than a buoy should mark the outer entrance to this channel. So in April 1840, Mr William Bell, a shipbuilder at Bowness (on Solway), was commissioned by the Carlisle Canal Company to build such a vessel. It was robustly constructed in wood and

As I have mentioned before in previous articles, the safe navigation of the upper Solway Firth, above Maryport and towards or from the harbours at Port Carlisle, Annan and later at Silloth, was and still can be a hazardous business for those without up-to-date local knowledge. Strong currents and moving shallows with sandbanks will readily thwart the efforts of the unwary mariner. The low-lying Cumbrian coastline, which ought not be approached too closely due to extensive shallows strewn with large boulders, offers very little in the way of distinguishable landmarks from which the mariner can take bearings with his compass to assess his vessel's position. Consequently, the port authorities, needing to provide a safe access to their facilities, had to indicate by some means, a navigable route through the hazards, whilst giving the mariner frequent means of confirming his position en-route. The Carlisle Canal opened in 1823, linking Carlisle to the sea at Fisher's Cross, thus opening up new trading opportunities for the city. Rudimentary port facilities grew at the seaward end of the canal,

was registered at about 80 tons. It was launched on 15th December 1840 and named SOLWAY.

The lightship joined a small list of other navigational aids recently established on the upper Solway Firth. They were the 'Lees Scar' and the 'Cote' lighthouses at Silloth Bay (no dock planned at Silloth yet), and the lighthouse at Barnkirk Point, at the mouth of the river Annan. The small lightship was placed on station and anchored to the east of the Robin Rigg shallows and crewed by six men, three or four serving on board the vessel, whilst the others would be ashore on leave, all on a rotating duty system. The lightship was painted white, with the name SOLWAY painted boldly in black on its sides. Marking the entrance of the channel to Port Carlisle, it displayed a black ball by day and a fixed red light shone from a central tower at 25 feet above the water at night. It was also equipped with a large brass bell, to be rung in poor visibility. With the gradual demise of Port Carlisle and the opening of a dock at Silloth in 1859, the management of these navigational aids was transferred to Silloth, and all were of equal value to shipping using this port. Lightship crews were relieved using the Silloth paddle tug 'Arabian', to be replaced by the paddle tug 'Solway' in 1886, which itself was replaced by the paddle tug 'Petrel' in 1893. Towards the end of its useful life, the wooden lightship

was herself replaced in 1895 by an iron built converted barge called 'Tobin', (but with the word SOLWAY freshly painted on her sides). She had been purchased from the Mersey Docks & Harbour Board. The working days of the old wooden lightship, now in poor condition and laid up in Silloth Docks, were not over yet, as she occasionally replaced the 'Tobin' when that vessel was withdrawn for maintenance. The wooden SOLWAY lightship's exposed location meant that it did occasionally break away from its anchor and get blown off station, beaching and having to be refloated. Her last gasp of active life was in 1920, when having once again broken free she was towed back to languish in Silloth Docks. That same year, the 'Tobin' lightship was sold off and replaced by a navigation buoy. The old wooden SOLWAY was eventually bought around 1922 as a hulk by a Mr Ferguson of Silloth, who had her taken out of the docks and beached a little further up the coast, near

her old copper hull sheathing. However, before the scrapping process really took a hold, the hulk, which still looked much like a lightship, was converted into a small tearoom and lemonade bar, with a short ramp allowing public access from the beach. The final scrapping process of the old SOLWAY lightship took place in early 1929, when she was totally dismantled and removed from the beach. Only the old brass fog bell, inscribed SOLWAY LIGHT SHIP 1841, was saved and given to the Silloth on Solway Golf Club, to be used as a signal bell on the first green, to indicate to following golfers that the green was clear. Sadly, during the early 1980's, this historical relic was stolen from the Golf Club and has never been recovered. These days, the entrance

to the navigable channel to the port of Silloth is marked by a large green navigation buoy, located about 2.5 miles south-west of Dubmill Point. At night, the solar-powered green light mounted on the

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Fight Environmental Crime

Satellite technology and QR codes are being used by Allerdale Borough Council in a hi-tech fight against environmental crime.

The unique software, created by the Council's IT team, allows the public to file on-the-spot reports about everything from dog fouling and fly tipping, to graffiti and missed bin collections.

And what makes the reporting system special is that it can all be done from a mobile phone, so that residents don't even have to enter an address to report the problem – the technology does it all for them. The public can use QR, or Quick Response, codes to report problems, or head straight to the Council's website. The interactive map also identifies clusters of reports so council officers can target hotspots, and those reporting the problems can see their complaint 'pinned' to the map and even check whether it's been cleaned up.

The software is bespoke and the Council's IT team is now planning to share it with other local authorities. It is also the only local authority in Cumbria using this type of technology, rather than the traditional customer service phone lines or lengthy online forms.

Councillor Phil Tibble, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive Member for Customer Services, said: "This technology is brilliantly



interactive - you see a map on the screen of your mobile phone or tablet computer, then hit the 'locate me automatically' button and report a problem on the spot. That means it's perfect for those who are just visiting too – they don't have to know road names to report an issue. We try to promote the 'Council in a Click' message and encourage people to report problems to us online - this takes that initiative to another level."

Councillor Michael Heaslip, the Executive Member for Locality Services, added: "We know how angry people get about things like dog mess and fly tipping and the Council's made no secret of the fact that it has a zero

Information cards and posters containing the relevant QR code will soon be available from all Allerdale Borough Council offices, as well as libraries and tourist information centres. Temporary signs containing the code will also be displayed in problem areas, encouraging people to report issues. Alternatively, people can go direct to www.allerdale. gov.uk/report to use the interactive system.

The 'Rebalancing Our Cultural Capital' report finds that the government spending on arts and culture in London is £69 per resident, compared to the rest of England where it is £4.60 per person.

Councillor Bell said: "At a time when local government budgets are seeing big reductions in central government funding, the way national funding for the arts is distributed is more important than ever. This report found that Arts Council England shared £163 million of government arts funding with organisations in London last year. This adds up to £20 per head and dwarfs the £3.60 per head which Arts Council England distributed to the rest of England at the same time. This is not about spending more money but it is about making sure the existing pot is shared more equally with areas outside London, including Cumbria."

Protect Your Family From Flu

People in Cumbria are being urged to take a free flu vaccination. Cumbria County Council is appealing to all the vulnerable groups to protect themselves this winter by getting vaccinated.

For the first time a nasal spray vaccine will be offered to healthy two and three-year-old children, and those at primary school in Cumbria, in a bid to slow down the spread of the virus. This marks the first step in an extension to the national flu vaccination programme, which will eventually include yearly vaccination of all 2-16 year olds.

Councillor Patricia Bell, cabinet member for Public Health and Communities at Cumbria County Council, said: "For the majority of people, flu is an unpleasant, but not life-threatening illness. However, it can be very serious for older people and those groups at risk of developing complications. They include those with weakened immune systems as well as underlying conditions such as neurological disorders, liver, lung or renal

disease, heart problems or diabetes and pregnant women. Vaccination remains the best way to protect against the potential serious harm from flu this winter." Nationally almost

800 people were admitted to intensive care with complications of flu last year. Each winter hundreds of thousands of people see their GP and tens of thousands are admitted to hospital.

Dr Rebecca Wagstaff, acting Director of Public Health at Cumbria County Council, said: "Severe winter flu and its complications can make people really ill and can kill. You are eleven times more likely to die from flu if you are in a clinical at-risk group. I urge everyone who is eligible, to get the vaccine and help protect themselves and their family."

The flu vaccine changes every year to fight the latest strains of flu, so even if you had a vaccination last winter you need another one this year to stay safe from flu. Simply contact your GP or local pharmacist to arrange a convenient appointment and get you or your child vaccinated. It's quick, safe and free for those at risk from the virus, two and three year olds and primary school-age children.

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Work Started on New Silloth BMX Track

Up until Autumn 2011 youngsters in Silloth used the old Pines behind the lifeboat station as a make-shift BMX track. This track was not provided by Silloth Town Council and did not comply with any safety regulations. For these reasons, it was removed and fenced off to make way for the play area now in its place.

Subsequently, young people and parents in Silloth approached Silloth Town Council and attended several meetings to voice their disappointment at losing the dirt track and make a case for a new facility. Youngsters proposed to raise money for the creation of a permanent and compliant track, and asked for the council's support. Parents who attended these meetings also voiced support for the proposal.

Silloth Town Council were impressed by the enthusiasm and the responsible approach the youngsters were taking. They expressed strong support and asked the youngsters what they would like and where a possible location might be. The children, along with some parents, visited several tracks in the county looking for design ideas. Their experiences provided the framework for a suitable design.

In November 2011, the young folks along with Cllr. Stuart Graham and other parents, completed a sponsored bicycle ride and raised £550, demonstrating the high level of commitment from youngsters, parents and adults in the Town.

Given the high levels of support, a committee for Silloth BMX Club was formed. As a constituted group, the club were now in a position to seek further funding from organisations in the community and elsewhere. Committee members include Stuart Graham, Deputy Mayor (Chairperson) David Baker (Treasurer) and Diane Graham (Secretary). Silloth Town Council

suggested the proposal for the BMX track could be included as part of the Green re-generation, and Cllr Stuart Graham, Jason Dixey, the project manager for the Green's refurbishment and Anna Malina, the Community Engagement Officer for the Green began to submit ideas to HLF for approval.

Posters and adverts were distributed around Town and the youngsters presented their ideas at a public meeting. The community consultation was supplemented by an online consultation set up by the Community Engagement Officer.

Heritage Lottery approved the draft proposal and all the relevant

procedures have now been approved, including ROSPA checks, topographical surveys, wildlife impact surveys, impact on the community, and appropriate plans/designs.

All of the above work took a great deal of time and effort to accomplish, however, Silloth Town Council is now in a position to move the project forward to completion. The aim is to provide the best track possible within the budget available.

The contractors have now started the build phase. It's expected the build will take around three weeks.

To ensure their safety, the Council and parents ask that the youngsters be patient just a little bit longer and keep

off the site until the track is completed.

The Lights Committee are kindly organising a raffle, with a BMX bike the main prize. The draw will take place during the Christmas Lights Switch-On, planned for November 30th.
