

Camp Safely

The Hazards Of The Great Outdoors

As part of the Fire Kills campaign, Cumbria Fire & Rescue Service is asking the people of Cumbria to stay safe this summer as they make the most of the weather and enjoy the great outdoors, whether camping, cooking or exploring.

A long hot summer is what we hope for, however like many changes in activity, it can bring risks. If you're intending to take out your tent, ready your rucksack or get your caravan back on the road, you should go armed with some safety advice before heading for the great outdoors.

By following the Fire Kills campaign's top tips you can ensure that your great adventure is a safe and enjoyable one. Tents

Allow at least 6m spacing between tents and caravans and ensure they are away from parked cars to reduce the risk of fire spreading

Never use candles in or near a tent – torches are safer.

Keep cooking appliances away from the tent walls and never cook inside a small tent or near flammable materials or long grass; they can all set alight easily.

Make sure you know how to escape by cutting your way out of the tent if there's a fire.

Make sure everyone knows how to put out clothing that's on fire – stop, drop and roll.

Don't smoke inside tents. Caravans

Fit and test a smoke alarm in your caravan.

Take special care when cooking – don't leave pans unattended.

Turn off all appliances before you go out or to bed.

Make sure ashtrays are made of a material that can't burn or topple over -never

smoke in bed. Don't dry clothes over the stove.

Remove any litter and rubbish near the caravan to reduce the risk of fire spreading.

Make sure the caravan is ventilated, and never block air vents, to avoid a build-up of poisonous gases. **Open Fires**

If you must have an open fire:

It should be downwind, at least 10m from the tent.

Clear dry vegetation, leaves, etc, to form a circle of earth around the fire. Build a stack that will collapse inwards whilst

burning. Do not leave fires

unattended. Make sure that fires are fully extinguished after use. If a fire should breakout:

Call the fire and rescue service and give the exact location. If necessary give a map

reference. If this is not possible a landmark such as a farm or pub etc, will help them locate you.

Grass and forest fires spread rapidly:

Never throw cigarette ends out of a car window - they could start a fire and ruin surrounding countryside.

Don't leave bottles or glass in woodlands. Sunlight shining through glass can start a fire. Take them home or put them in a waste or recycling bin.

If you discover a fire:

Do not be tempted to investigate. Leave the area as quickly

as possible and call 999 and ask for the fire and rescue service.

Do not return unless the Fire and Rescue Service tells you that it is safe to do so. For more information on

Be Considerate in the Sunshine!

Allerdale Borough Council is calling for people to take extra care and consider others whilst enjoying the summer sunshine in public places across the borough.

There have been some recent instances of large amounts of litter being found in public parks, gardens, and along river beds including smashed up glass bottles, which could result in injury to both children and animals. Crisp packets, disposable barbecues, and piles of cans and bottles are just some of the many items being left lying around by a few irresponsible people in places like Workington's Curwen Park and Mill Field, Northside football field and the jubilee field next to Harrington nature reserve.

In addition, the Council's Nature Partnership Officer, Raegan Mckay has found evidence of two cygnets being killed by dogs on the Mill stream in Workington Hall Parklands.

Raegan says: "It is great

that this recent spell of good weather is encouraging more people to enjoy the outdoors by spending time in some of our beautiful parks and open spaces. However, we would urge people to consider other park users and clean up after themselves as well as being aware of local wildlife and bird life who inhabit the same areas."

Allowing your dog to attack a wild animal is an offence and owners should take necessary precautions by always having their dogs under control whilst in a public place and on lead when around wildlife.

Allerdale Borough Council has a zero tolerance approach to littering and anyone caught will face being given a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to £80. Members of the public can help to tackle littering and other types of environmental crime by reporting it as part of the Council's Spot the Grot campaign via www.allerdale. gov.uk/reportit or calling 01900 702702.

former leader of Cumbria County Council which took the decision stated: "The new policy is clearly aimed at preventing such an "inconvenient" democratic decision affecting the process again, yet still claims to be based on voluntarism. The "incentives" being offered are a transparent attempt to divide and conquer communities such as Cumbria. It won't work."

Incentives/Bribes Cumbria Trust believes that the process should be sufficiently robust and safe so as not to require what it regards as "bribes" to parts of communities. Disposal

Cumbria Trust notes the new White Paper clarifies that the proposed geological disposal facility is for DISPOSAL not storage and that the waste will not be retrievable. It must therefore be in safe geology bearing in mind no engineered barriers will last 100,000 years and that geology is the final barrier to contain the leaks which will occur.

The Country's New Build Waste

The White Paper clarifies beyond doubt that the Government views the facility as being for ALL the country's nuclear waste including new waste from nuclear new builds taking place all over the country. This emphasises that this is a national issue not a Cumbrian one.




chips will be issued from 9am on race day at registration.

The exhibition is in a newly-opened room and marks an extension of Silloth's unique visitor attraction.

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Silloth Primary School Energy Club

Energy Club has just trained its 6,000th leader for the programme that empowers a new generation to get active and make their own healthy choices. The 6,000th Energy Club Leader to be trained was Joanne Brooks, PE Co-ordinator at Silloth Primary School in the Allerdale area of Cumbria.

Sports Leaders UK helps leaders at primary schools and community groups set up their own Energy Clubs. By providing leadership training, equipment and activity card resources, organisations have the ability and the confidence to lead children in their school or local community to sign up to the 30 minute extracurricular sessions.

To date, over 45,000 children have enjoyed getting active at one of over 1,172 Energy Clubs throughout the UK.

Silloth Primary school had eight leaders trained, including two teachers, four support staff and two parents, and twenty of the school's Year 6 pupils who have completed the Sports Leaders UK PlayMaker award course will assist the leaders in running the Energy Club.

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GREEN CONE food waste digester

Cumbria County Council is now offering food waste digesters for sale to residents in Allerdale, Barrow and Eden. These are great products which enable householders to safely dispose of all of their food waste at home. The digesters can take absolutely everything including pasta, bread, meat, fish and even bones

Food waste is a particular problem to society. We throw away 7 million tonnes of edible food and drink in the UK every year – and while treating it at home is the best option when we have it, the ideal scenario is not to create it in the first instance. By not creating food waste at home, a household could save around £50 a week

There are two types of digesters on offer - the Green Johanna creates rich compost, and you can put in garden waste and food waste. The other unit is called a Green Cone and is great for households with limited outdoor space. You dig this unit in the garden or in a large plant pot if you have a yard and put only

food waste in this unit. So there should be a digester to suit everyone, even those that don't have gardens. The digesters will help everyone become that little bit greener.

The digesters usually retail at around £100 each but thanks to a DCLG grant we are able to offer them for just £15 for the Green Cone and £20 for the Green Johanna.

There have been Launch **Events** already taken place in the three districts to introduce the digesters to residents. These events were very successful, and there was a lot of interest in the digesters.

If you would like further information about the food waste digesters we can either send some leaflets about





Green 'One of the Best'

Silloth Green is still one of the very best in the UK - and that's official.

The award, handed out by environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy, recognises and rewards the best parks and green spaces across the country. A Green Flag flying overhead is a sign to the public that the space boasts the highest possible standards, is beautifully maintained and has excellent facilities.

Three separate park areas, namely: 'The Green,' 'Harbour Green' and 'Skinburness Green' are collectively known as 'Silloth Green.' The park is one of the largest village greens in the North of England. It boasts spectacular views over the Solway Firth to Criffel and the Kilavorick Hills in the North and the Lake District to the South. The Green forms a green link between Silloth's grand regency townscape and the sea front promenade, for many years attracting visitors seeking fresh sea air and recreational facilities.

Successful funding bids in 2010 resulted in a two-year programme to refurbish the Green and restore its heritage buildings. Heritage Lottery Fund put forward £1.1m and the Rural Development Programme for England provided funds of £100k. The Edwardian ladies toilets, built in 1910 and the spectacular Victorian pagoda built on a mound overlooking the sea have been sympathetically refurbished. The Green also now boasts a modern waterplay area, an entertainment area in local Cumbrian sandstone, a woodland adventure play area, a Putting Green and



newly revamped BMX track. Beautiful oak picnic tables and benches are to be found in various locations, all accessible by new paths. Paths lined with shrub beds allow disabled access to all main areas

After consultation and a great deal of input from local people in 2013, the Community Garden was professionally designed by 'Moota Garden Centre' It was landscaped and planted, with local people and youngsters from the school adopting and planting their own plant. The garden opened in May this year and is now being cared for by 'Friends of the Green,' who are making sure it continues to look its very best. Regular events, organised by volunteers, are held on the Green and a number of free festivals are held annually, including Silloth Green Day, the Vintage Rally, Kite Festival, Summer Carnival, Santa Dash and Christmas Market. In addition, the popular Silloth Music and Beer Festival is held annually. General information and more details about events can be found on the Silloth Green website at www. sillothgreen.co.uk



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



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50th Anniversary of Silloth Railway Line Closure

John N.M. Charters travelled on the last train from Silloth.

On Sunday September 6th 1964 I travelled on the last passenger train to and from Silloth (the 6:55pm from Carlisle), hauled by CLASS 4, 2-6-0 locomotive No. 43139, with about eight or ten coaches. All well filled and in the hands of Driver James (Jimmy) Lister, Fireman Michael Bulman and Guard Archie Brand.

Before we departed Tender First from platform 8 myself assisted by locomotive Inspector George Gordon, who rode on the footplate with a Cumberland News photographer affixed a 10/-(50p) wreath to the lamp bracket on the front of the engine's smokebox. I remember standing on the engine's buffer beam, where I was photographed straightening the wreath.

I travelled with members of the Silloth Group, an environmental body, who opposed closure. I as well as various bodies in Silloth had opposed this retrograde step. I set out a plan to cut costs on the 21.5 mile route and sent it directly to the British Railways Board, who eventually replied thanking me for my initiative, but rejected the idea. I still have the letter.

We departed Carlisle more or less on time; at Canal Junction Signalbox the single line tablet for Drumburgh Junction was collected for the last time. Kirkandrews Station passed without a wave from Leading Porter Bob Hope who had lived there since about 1911 and whose father James Hope was the last Station Master here. A little crowd greeted our train at Burgh-by-Sands Station, some with cameras at the ready and others waving. At Drumburgh Junction Signalbox tablets were exchanged for the first time; the station here had closed completely on July 4th 1955, but trains could pass each other in a quarter mile passing loop. On the way bystanders waved to the train from over bridges, roadsides and fields. Kirkbride Station was awash with people waving and a goodly crowd greeted us at Abbeytown, where tablets were exchanged with Relief Signalman Bob McVittie. Approaching Blackdyke Halt, the south wall of the crossing keepers cottage bore in large letters this sign: 'We Want 'The Line!' Our train then passed quickly over the Mill and Causewayhead level crossing and approached Silloth Signalbox, where Earnest Bowman received the Single Line section tablet. The road bridge short of the station was crowded and



a group of demonstrators blocked the track into the station bringing our train to a shuddering halt. Police removed the protesters and we moved slowly into the long single platform, which was packed. Kate Roberts prospective Labour candidate for Penrith & the Borders was inflaming opinions and she and her young activists were ordered off the premises. Police hung off the engine and carriages to fend off protesters. Our engine had great difficulty running round the train and taking on water. Jimmy Lister used hot jets of steam to clear those lying across the track, aided by the police. I remember our engine crawling at less than 5 mph as she negotiated the passing loop. Four extra coaches were attached by Head Shunter Derek Gass assisted by Kenny Aitken for the return journey. These gentlemen along with relief Station Master Tommy Powley were the last men on duty at Silloth a Class 1 Station and the only one then staffed.

There was more drama near Abbeytown, when the communication cord was pulled on two occasions by some youths. B.T. Policeman H. Thursby eventually got the truth out of some young lads, the carriage door was opened they were told get out. Near Abbeytown the train was halted and searched for about 15 minutes by both civil and B.T. Police, as someone had telephoned Silloth Station to say a bomb was on the train. This was of course a hoax. We eventually reached Carlisle about 45 minutes late and on entering the station all the engines present, steam and diesel sounded their whistles or horns in unison. On September 7th 1964 (official date of closure to passengers; goods had been withdrawn on June 1st, all the furniture was removed from Silloth and other stations by a special train. I recall on the night of the last train George Gordon Locomotive Inspector was most unfortunately stoned by some wilder sections in the crowd.

Archie Brand Remembers... When I worked on the Silloth line as a passenger guard, there were quite a lot of passengers coming from Carlisle but very few from Silloth, just a few shop girls travelled on the first train every day.

The reason I was guard on the last train was only because the chap who was scheduled to do it had an accident I was the reserve.

It was just an ordinary run out to Silloth. We stopped at the country stations and exchanged the tablet on the way. When we got to Silloth, the engine ran round the train and we waited to come back.

There were an awful lot of passengers aboard and I couldn't get the carriage doors shut. Every time I closed them, they were opened again. When I got to the back of the train, our boss was there. "Give the right-away, Archie," he said, "They'll shut the doors as we're moving out."

There were still people sitting on the line in front of the engine. Jimmy Lister told me he just opened the steam cocks to scare them off. Finally we got away but on the way to Abbeytown the passengers were doing all sorts of things - pulling the communication cord and the like.

There was more trouble when we stopped at Abbeytown. They didn't tell me it was a bomb scare. Then the train set

off without me – somebody on the platform must have had a green flag. Cedric, a porter from Burgh-by-Sands was travelling in the guard's van with me; I yelled for him to get out of the way and jumped on. I couldn't see the driver because of the crowds on the platform and the curve in the line there. I don't know if the police threw anybody off there - I just couldn't see a thing. I was raging mad when we finally got to Carlisle. We were so late back that I couldn't get a pint. It was

after half-past-nine and the

pubs closed early on Sunday

in those days.

Dear Buzz,

During the winter months of 1953/54, I travelled on my motorbike to Parkhead farm near the Blackdyke crossings each morning.



Sailing Ship Identification (Part 2)


Well here it is. I know it's what you've all been waiting for! The second part of this topic shows a few more sailing vessels, with their own particular rig of masts and sails.



2 masted Schooner



3 masted Schooner Schooner - Vessels of all sizes could be 'schooner rigged, but all would have two or more masts and 'fore and aft' sails on all masts. In the golden age of sail, i.e. the mid to late 1800's, very large schooner-rigged cargo vessels were built, with up to seven masts! Although not so fast, they were easier to handle compared with square rigged ships and so required fewer crew members to manage the sails.



2 masted Topsail Schooner

two masted 'Vilma', which featured as a pirate ship in the 2009 Dock Anniversary celebrations.





Ketch and Yawl - Similar looking small sailing vessels, both fitted with two masts and 'fore and aft' sails. The Yawl has a very small mast at the rear of the vessel, mounted behind the rudder simply to balance

the steering quality of the vessel, whereas the rear mast of a Ketch assists with driving the vessel. Ketches were regular small cargo carriers, whilst the yawl rig was predominantly used on fishing boats.

I hope you found these rig descriptions interesting and not too heavy going. There are however, several more that I haven't mentioned but enough is enough, *es*pecially as I will soon be stopping you in the street, to test that you have been paying attention. --- ok, just joking!





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Nuclear Dump Views

SPAND'S view of the Government's White Paper on the Geological Disposal Facility. On 24th July 2014 following on from several months of consultation the Government released a White Paper outlining the process by which a site for a Geological Disposal Facility (nuclear dump) will be selected.

The key points contained in the White Paper are: • The Government is

looking for a "safe, secure, long-term solution" to the storage of the nation's nuclear waste.

• The proposed geological disposal facility is for DISPOSAL not storage and that the waste will not be retrievable.

• The amount of legacy radioactive waste which needs to be dealt with in the UK will amount to the equivalent of filling six Albert Halls, while new planned reactors will produce at least another Albert Hall's worth.

• A national geological screening survey will take place over the next two years, to find suitable sites.

• Construction is likely to start by 2030 at the earliest, with the first waste likely to be stored in the site from 2045.

• The planning process of a nationally significant infrastructure project means there will be no power of veto from one authority.

• Positive community support will be needed before a final site is selected.

• From 2016, communities will be invited to come forward to talk to Government about hosting a site.

• Those communities who want to be considered will receive up to £1m a year if local people engage with officials.

• The figure could rise to £2.5m a year if drilling of bore-holes to assess the suitability of a site went ahead.

• This money needs to be spent on community projects which would not have otherwise been done.

A figure of 570 sustainable



jobs is being quoted.

SPAND is concerned that after the previous failed MRWS process and several months of consultation the Government still does not appear to be listening to the people of Cumbria.

• The White Paper clarifies beyond doubt that the Government views the facility as being for ALL the country's nuclear waste including new waste from nuclear new builds taking place all over the country. This emphasises that this is a national issue not a West Cumbrian one.

• It is clear that the proposed geological disposal facility is for DISPOSAL not storage and that the waste will not be retrievable. It must therefore be in safe geology bearing in mind no engineered barriers will last 100,000 years and that geology is the final barrier to contain the leaks which will occur. This must certainly rule out West Cumbria!

 The Government states that a national geological screening survey will take place over the next two years, to find suitable sites. However, this screening will only use existing data and will be overseen by the British Geological Survey the people who have previously manipulated the data to include the Solway Plain as a viable site for a GDF. We have no confidence they will come up with a different answer this time.

• If construction is planned to commence in 2030 then property sales both domestic and commercial will be blighted in the selective community for an unacceptable period of time.

• The planning process has been taken out of the hands of the local authorities thereby placing the final decision regarding the suitability of a site solely in the hands of Government. This effectively disenfranchises local communities and their representatives.

• The reason why no community will be able to volunteer until 2016 is that the Government at this point in time

appears to have no idea what a community is. They intend to set up a working group consisting mainly of civil servants, politicians and academics. They have indicated that they may allow representation from other interested organisations. SPAND will seek to have representation on this working group.

· As an inducement the Government intends offering bribes of up to £2.5 million per year to any community who agrees to the stage of intrusive, borehole investigations but they do not state for how long this would be. This is not a significant amount of money when it is to be spent on local infrastructure projects. The recent Silloth Green refurbishment cost £1.25 million and does put the £2.5 million offered into perspective.

• There is no evidence offered that a GDF could create 570 sustainable jobs and this number they quote appears to have been picked out of thin air. At no time in the White Paper is there the suggestion that these jobs would be offered to the local community. There is every likelihood that the majority of these sustainable jobs would be filled by experienced nuclear specialists from outside the county and even possibly from other countries.

Finally, last week the Government has announced its intention to grant licences for fracking explorations in a great many areas of England. However, it is interesting to note that they have **Excluded** National Parks and AONB's. We have to question why if they can make this exclusion for fracking they can't make it for a GDF.

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
