# Memories of Days Gone By

I remember the road from Blitterlees over the golf course to the Battery, which was in use before the second war started. I remember seeing a big gun on a low loader rail wagon on the railway, which was said at the time it was a 16" gun to be put on the "Rodney" a newly built warship. Armstrong Whitworths were the gun makers. When it was being tested they hoisted a red flag, and also told people at West Silloth to open their doors and windows as the blast may damage the

property.

We had soldiers billeted in Barracks, which were situated between the bakehouse and Betty Tiffens house, which was then known as the Isolation hospital. All this activity took place after the First World War and continued for a few years and then it was finally closed down. Local people occupied the Barracks, until they found somewhere more to their liking and they were then sold off as holiday chalets.

Before the second war started they were building the aerodrome and a great lot of sand and gravel was taken from the land owned by the Golf Club to build the hangers and living accommodation. At that time we had a busy dock, we had the Yarrow sailing twice a week to Douglas and Dublin taking passengers and general cargo, and bringing back barrels of Guinness for Carlisle Brewery to be bottled there. They also brought over cattle to the lairage to be kept a day or so then sent off by rail cattle trucks to various destinations.
