The town was presented to the judges in the best light possible, with advance preparations and presentations before judging tours.

'Silloth in Bloom' set to brighten the town!

Local people have come together to form 'Silloth in Bloom' after hearing the fantastic news that the town has been chosen as a 'Coastal Community' finalist in the UK wide RHS 'Britain in Bloom' Campaign.

The town's selection is a great achievement, since the campaign is one of the largest horticultural operations in Europe, involving a thousand communities across the UK each year. Participating communities work together to make improvements that benefit the people who live, work and visit the town.

The selection of Silloth as a finalist has grown out of successful applications for awards from 'Cumbria in Bloom' and the Royal Horticultural Society over the past two years. Allerdale Borough Council and Silloth Town Council

These efforts behind the scenes bore fruit and resulted in the town gaining recognition. For two years running Silloth has won the Cumbria in Bloom 'Coastal Town' Award. In 2015, the 'Special Category Continental Landscapes Trophy' was awarded to Silloth for the Community Garden and the new Rose and Bee Garden, which were joint winners. In addition these two gardens were individual winners in the Britain in Bloom Royal Horticultural Society 'It's Your Neighbourhood' Category, each gaining a Level 5 'Outstanding' result. These awards compliment the Council, its staff and all the local volunteers in Silloth, who work so hard to support the town, both in a horticultural and environmental sense and in

terms of organising diverse events and supporting the many organisations and clubs in the town.

The Britain in Bloom judges, who will visit Silloth in August, will assess different locations in the town. They will be looking for floral displays and signs of a caring community, eg. picturesque residential gardens, environmentally friendly green spaces and features on the Green, attractive shop frontages, cleaner and greener streets and striking flower arrangements created by businesses and organisations in the town.

Without a doubt, community participation - along with a beautiful setting - is what gives Silloth its vibrancy. Involvement of local people in what happens builds pride in the town. Without participation of volunteers Silloth would lose much of its lustre. Referring to Silloth in Bloom, Bill Jefferson, Chair of the team, says: "it's very important that different people and groups in the town share

responsibility. A light structure, with a minimum of fuss and bureaucracy is needed to kick start the four month period of preparation for judgement day. I would anticipate few general meetings; rather each sub-group getting on with its work. For example, Wendy Jamieson has agreed to coordinate/lead on the allotments. The Women's Institute (WI) are looking after the Discovery Centre Garden, with Ann Winter (representing Friends of the Green) and Vivian Russell leading on the Community Garden and Bee Garden respectively."

Anyone locally can join the 'Silloth in Bloom' Team and develop fresh ideas. The aim is to support existing local developments, and also create new projects that will make Silloth the best and most attractive small Coastal Town in the UK. There's a lot that could be done and people in the town are urged to lend their support. Local residents, businesses, schools, churches, hotels, camp sites, sports clubs and all the different groups in the town have an important role to

play.

Ideas on how some of the bare spots in the town can be improved are important. Anna Malina, who is co-ordinating the Silloth in Bloom effort, says "The whole idea is to have fun while improving how the town looks, and I'm sure if local groups and businesses put their heads together and work towards a common goal, they will be able to come up with some great ideas. The whole town worked together last year in preparation for the Cycle Race and that was huge fun and a great success. We all still remember Ralph. Taking part in improving horticulture and creating flower displays as well as caring for the environment will create big improvements in the town. As the town is recognised regionally and nationally for its improvements and the lively participation of local people, more visitors will come and businesses in the town will thrive as a result. The domino effect is that local people will also gain since the whole town will 'b(1)oom' and have an even more exciting 'buzz' about it."

So, it's really important to get involved. New ideas are really important but to

keep already high standards of care at the same level, the Community Garden and the Discovery Centre Garden urgently need new helpers. People in the town seem to enjoy them, so please give a little of your time to help keep them looking lovely.

Volunteers are also needed to help improve the more down at heel spaces in the town and make them more attractive. Funds can be raised locally to support developments, but some funding is available for special projects such as new floral displays and projects that will make a difference, for example, ideas that will make the town safer, or that improve the local environment by tackling conservation issues, graffiti or litter. Working to reduce anti-social behaviour will also count and will have a positive long-term effect on the community as well as being integral to the Britain in Bloom award scheme. Other possibilities might include photography or art schemes illustrating horticultural, environmental and coastal aspects of the town. Things like art-work and photos, created by adults and children, can be sold to help fund new projects.

Community participation of this kind shows that the town has a positive civic spirit and believes in its own ability to identify problems, come up with solutions and then take action to make things better for everyone. Negative thinkers may believe that everything should be handed to them on a plate without anyone actually doing anything positive to make things better, however, it's very well known that places with positive civic/community involvement that builds pride in the town are those that thrive best.

Future progress for the town is in your hands. Horticultural skills are less

important than a willingness to get involved. Age is not a barrier, and everyone from the older generation to children can do their bit for the town. 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Do You Remember?



This photograph was sent in by Mrs Dinah Wallace of Esk Street who hopes it will bring back memories and be of interest.

The photograph was taken in 1929 and the man is standing on the 'platform' where the train

stopped for people visiting the Convalescent Home. The home is on the left of the platform. The railway line goes on to the 'Battery' where the military tested their large guns, shooting out over the Solway Firth. In the background is Carrs Mill, the

building to the left of Carrs Mill housed the mechanism to operate the dock gates.

The lairage can also be seen in front of Carrs Mill, at that time these were small sheds running east to west, unlike the lairage today which runs north to south.

As most of you will be aware the Coastline around Silloth is a unique and picturesque area, which can compete with the very best that Britain has to offer. Not only is Silloth itself on the doorstep of an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, but the coastline around it is also a jewel in the crown of Cumbria.

Make Sure You Are Registered to Vote Before the Polls in May

Voters will be heading to the polls on 5 May 2016 to elect a new Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Cumbria.

This is the second time PCC elections have been held, following the election of Richard Rhodes as the county's first elected Police

and Crime Commissioner for Cumbria in November 2012.

Some areas of the county will also have local elections on the same day.

Now residents are being encouraged to make sure they are on the Register of Electors so they can have their say in these elections.

As long as your name is included in the Register of Electors you will be able to vote, but if your name doesn't appear on the Register of Electors you won't be able to vote and you may also find it difficult to obtain financial services such as a credit card or a mortgage or even have difficulty opening a bank account.

If you think you're not registered, or if you have moved recently, the closing date for registering to vote in the PCC and local elections is Monday, 18 April 2016.

It is easy to register, just go online to www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

The PCC's role is to act as the public's voice on how policing is carried out in Cumbria.

They will also be responsible for setting the

force's budget and deciding what its priorities and strategy should be.

If anyone would like a postal vote, or wishes to change an existing postal or proxy vote, they must apply to their Electoral Registration Officer in their local authority area by 5pm on Tuesday, 19 April, 2016.

Applications for new proxy votes must be received by 5pm on Tuesday, 26 April, 2016. Applications for proxy votes because of a medical emergency or for work/ service reasons, which have occurred after 5pm on 26 April can be accepted until 5pm on polling day.

All application forms can be obtained from the Electoral Registration Officer at the local authority where the applicant is registered to vote. Completed forms must be submitted to the same Electoral Registration Officer by the relevant date.

Anti-Social Behaviour in Silloth

Recently in Silloth there has been an increase in Anti-social behaviour. There have been several serious incidents. These have included: incidents where youths have banged on doors and have been verbally abusive towards residents, youths hanging around outside of the Co-op and being verbally abusive to staff and customers. There has also been Criminal Damage caused at various locations around the Silloth area, this has included the Junior and Senior schools. Youths have also been involved in setting off the alarms on the Community Hall.

In the past the children and young adults of Silloth have been very well behaved. This recent spell of bad behaviour has unfortunately put ALL of the young people in Silloth in a bad light, even though the vast majority

are very well behaved.

The police, the Town Council and both the Junior and secondary schools are working very closely to address and prevent this sort of behaviour.

Nobody expects children to stay in at home and not to have any fun, however being out in the community should not negatively impact on the other people who live there. All of the young people in Silloth MUST be mindful of their behaviour and should show respect to everyone else that lives in THEIR Town.

Parents please be mindful of the issues that are going on in the area. Please take steps to ensure that your children are aware of what constitutes Anti-Social Behaviour and please make children aware of the consequences that



could be faced if they are found to be taking part in criminal activity. This includes damaging property and using offensive language.

The Police would also like to appeal to members of the public to continue to report any incidents to them on telephone number 101 or in the case of a crime ongoing please call 999. The Police would also like to encourage members of the public who may have information regarding the youths involved in the ongoing issues to contact them on telephone number 101 or via the local PCSO.

A zero tolerance approach will be shown and any offenders will be dealt with robustly.

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What Benefits or Allowances Can I Claim

Attendance Allowance & Disability Living Allowance - Can I claim both?

West Cumbria Carers are now holding benefits clinics throughout Allerdale for people who care for a family member or friend with an illness or disability.

Their Benefits Support Worker Gillian is available to provide help to apply for a host of benefits including Carers Allowance, Personal Independence Payment and Attendance Allowance. She can also assist with Council Tax discounts and referrals to the Department for Work and Pensions.

Gillian recently met with 71 year old Connie* who cares for her husband Geoff*, aged 77. Connie wanted to know if her husband was eligible for Attendance Allowance following a recent diagnosis of Dementia. Geoff already receives Disability

Living Allowance at a low rate. He receives this because he has struggled for years with painful rheumatoid arthritis.

Gillian supported Connie to make contact with the Department of Work & Pensions for a reassessment of her husband's benefit because his care needs had dramatically increased over the last few years as a result of Dementia. Connie didn't feel confident to complete the paperwork and was pleased to gain our support, she was also supported to apply for a Council Tax reduction as a result of her husband's dementia.

If you are caring for someone who was in receipt of DLA before they hit 65 and their care needs have



increased then they can't claim another health based benefit, however they are entitled to a reassessment of their needs if they are on a lower rate and have experienced increase in their care and mobility needs.

Dog Fouling Fine £1,000!

Silloth-on-Solway Town Council are appealing to dog owners to be responsible and to pick up after their pets. Dog fouling continues to be a real issue around the town and Allerdale Borough

Council has been contacted to ask that action is taken against the offenders.

A Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) can be used to help deal with issues such as dog fouling, keeping dogs on leads and excluding dogs from specified areas.

PSPOs specify an area where activities are taking place that are or may likely be detrimental to the local community's quality of life. PSPOs impose conditions or restrictions on people using that area. The orders are designed to ensure that the law-abiding majority can enjoy public spaces, safe from anti-social behaviour. The council can make a PSPO on any public space within its own area.

Any persons found guilty of breaching the order are liable on summary conviction to a fine not

exceeding £1,000. Depending on the behaviour in question, the enforcing officer could decide that a fixed penalty notice of £75.00 would be the most appropriate sanction.

PSPOs may be enforced by police officers, police community safety officers and any officers designated by the Council.

The Town Council would like to know what the local community think about the possibility of the Council employing someone to be a 'local' enforcement officer which would obviously involve some cost.

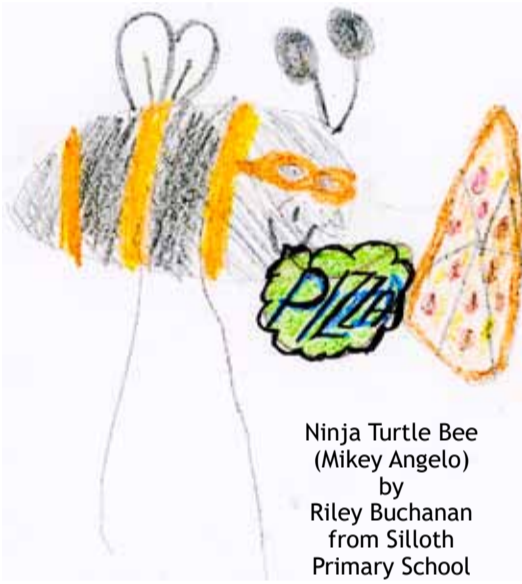
as raffle organizer and Gladys Temple as press secretary. Elsie Donald agreed to carry on as a Committee Member.

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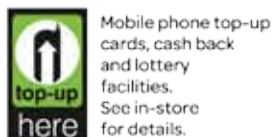
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Arthritis Support Group

Margaret Armstrong welcomed fourteen members of the Arthritis Support Group to Wigton Bowling Club for the first meeting of 2016.

The New Year Lunch held at Greenhill Hotel in January had been enjoyed by everyone and a letter was read out from Hospice at Home West Cumbria thanking them for the donation of £60 sent instead of exchanging presents at the Lunch.

Apologies were received from Joan Armstrong, Edna Marper and Catherine Cheetham.

Paul Gibson Arthritis Nurse from Cumberland Infirmary needed no introduction as he is a regular speaker at our meetings and today spoke on the current thinking on Osteoporosis. He had brought a good selection of books on various aspects of Arthritis and these were shared out. He talked about inflammation of the immune system causing Arthritis and talked of various self help things we could use. There was a discussion about the different things tried by members and what helped one did not help all however some things were helpful to most. Part of the latest thinking is that when people are feeling better it can be possible to cut down on medication but this should only be done with help from your Doctor. Losing weight using heat and taking your pain killers at the correct time seem to be the best way as they also help to prevent mini strokes

too. Some people speak of 'ONLY' arthritis but it is the cause of several thousands of lost work days and lots of disabilities which can be life changing.

There was a lot of discussion among members on how it affected them and several are awaiting operations while others were able to talk about how they were affected after their surgery.

Margaret Armstrong thanked Paul for his useful talk then Heather and Mary H. served refreshments while Paul continued giving advice. Anne Fee was the lucky winner of the Raffle. Several members had to leave early but a relaxation CD provided by Arthritis UK was played before everyone left feeling refreshed.

The March Meeting was a depleted meeting with apologies from Lilian, Edna, Eleanor, Heather, Joan and Eunice, our best wishes were sent to them all.

Margaret Armstrong welcomed everyone but our speaker Pauline Mole being a member did not need any introduction. Pauline is a member of the Cumbria

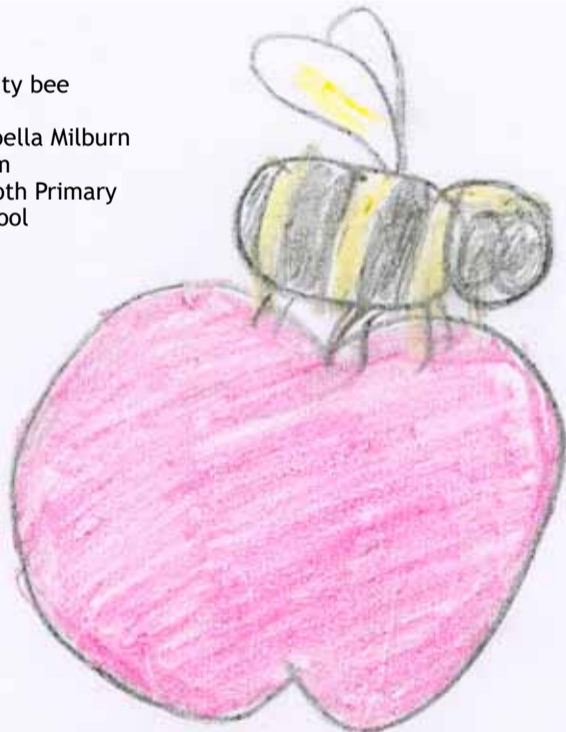
Dialect Society and a past winner of several sessions of their annual competitions.

Silloth and Solway Coast are open for business!

We are told that this mess is from the beach and until the road is swept the road will have to be closed to buses cars and lorries.

Councillors, Officers and Authorities tell us that it is a matter of consideration for safety of road users, as I see it, if the existing debris was removed, the only dangerous time would be when the tide is fully in and splashing over the road

Unfortunately we are being deceived in that the mess is not from the beach. It consists of waste materials from the renovations to the wall last year.

Turf, loam and tar from the road are all materials to be found and these are alien to the beach and so the waste can't be returned to the beach and so they are piled up on the road side.

Two offers have been made in writing to highway authority offering a place to deposit the materials so clearing the deck for future high tides and there being nothing to wash or be blown back onto the road.

These offers have been ignored.

A second suggestion is to deposit the debris on the other side of the road so that it would blow inland rather than on to the road.

A third suggestion is to construct a row of Gabions (wire baskets) from the



railings, along past the Edderside Road to the beck, this would stabilise the debris and offer protection to this part of the beach

This latter suggestion would require a license from Marine Management

and would then have to be actioned by CCC.

I am told that one of their officials is hoping to get funding in the next financial year to start a survey of all of Allerdale & Copeland coastlines. Recommendations

could possibly then be actioned the following year. Who knows if there would be anything left for the northern areas. God help us!

She began by explaining her involvement with the girls and the efforts being made to help them not only to learn to knit but also in their pursuit of education.

Some of the girls make long journeys to get to school. The film showed the long and arduous trek one of the girls got to make something that is difficult for us to imagine. One particular girl who is 15 has to travel 20 miles and could take her as much as eight hours.

A number of the girls are married between the ages of 10 and 19 and stand the risk of getting pregnant and also getting HIV.

When the girls are old enough to get further education a house has been made available for them to stay in so that they can stay there to continue with their studies, and the aim of the charity is to provide more of this accommodation so that more chances can be given to them to enable them to go on to University. All members were impressed by the work the charity is doing to assist these girls and many members had brought along wool and knitting needles which would be taken to Morocco. A tremendously interesting evening and appreciated by all, a vote of thanks was given by Mona Kent.

Easter Memories



The Easter Memories of Patricia Mabel Aikin

In the late 1920's and early 1930's Easter was a very special time for children in the North. Preparation for Easter in our household in Cumberland began weeks before with the collection of onion skins. These were hoarded to be used later for dyeing pace eggs.

In the week before Easter fresh hens eggs would be boiled with the onion skins and then when they were hard-boiled the eggs were rubbed with butter to give them the gloss and colour of chestnuts.

Some households collected gorse blossom for yellow eggs, others achieved green eggs - I don't know how. Commercial dyes were unpopular because although they produce beautiful colours, (I remember purple), the dyes permeated the porous eggshells and discoloured the eggs.

It was the custom to give Pace egg and an orange to school friends.

Most of the houses in the town at that time had sash windows and the eggs were placed on the sash often producing a colourful show and not a little envy as we walked around comparing numbers and colours.

At that time, if there were any chocolate eggs they were beyond our purse.

I remember the appearance of the first chocolate eggs in Wannop's shop on Criffel Street, wrapped in plain silver paper, nesting in a silver cardboard horseshoe with two small celluloid dolls dressed as bride and groom on either

side.

They were coveted by many.

Easter was special for another reason: it was the time for the new clothes.

Little girls would enquire of each other: Are you going to be an Easter baby?? Much excitement if this meant going to church on Easter morning dressed in a new coat, hat and shoes, (Oh the joy of patent leather ankle strap shoes).

But there was a payoff! 'Nip for New' was the cry and custom, so pride was tempered by boisterous nipping - a bit painful sometimes.

I have no real recollection of flowers decorating the church at Easter.

My memory is much more of pussy willows and catkins and hedgerow plants.

The church bells seemed especially joyous at Easter time.

Perhaps it had something to do with our excitement that we could show off our pace eggs and take them to the big hill on the green, (nearest the putting green and donkeys, although neither were about so early in the year), and roll our eggs, hoping they'd break on the way down.

Is there anything less tasty than a cold week-old hard-boiled egg? Nevertheless they were very special to us on Easter Day.

It was years later that the significance of the word pace, pronounced differently, hit me.

In the 20's and 30's we rolled our symbolic stones from the tomb and were full of joy.

Dear Buzz,

Cumbria Trust has been accused of taking a Not In My Back Yard (NIMBY) stance on geological disposal. That is not the case. We do place significant weight on the extensive studies of Professors Smythe and Haszeldine, who reached a clear conclusion that Cumbria's geology is unsuitable for a GDF. A similar conclusion was reached by Chris McDonald, the Lead Inspector of the Nirex Inquiry after a £400m investigation. No subsequent work has effectively rebutted this. In fact we do see the need for the current nuclear legacy waste to remain in our back yard, at Sellafield for the foreseeable future, although we are deeply concerned by the state of some of the storage facilities, a view shared by the National Audit Office and Public Accounts Committee. There is an urgent need for an increase in spending on secure interim storage to mitigate these risks. We appreciate that some of this work is taking place, but a look at the near-surface interim storage facility in Sweden reminds us how far we are from our goal. The 16GW(e) new build programme currently being considered by government appears to increase the waste inventory from an activity of 4.8 million TBq (terabecquerels) in

the 2010 figures, to an estimated 27.3 million TBq, which would require a far larger GDF site than before. While Cumbria Trust remains neutral on nuclear power, as our members have a wide range of views, the increased size of a GDF required to house the resultant nuclear waste is a serious concern. This is particularly so when it appears that the geological screening process currently on the table is deeply flawed, and may be designed to allow a return to Cumbria for a third time.

Solway to Ireland Shipping Services (Part 1)

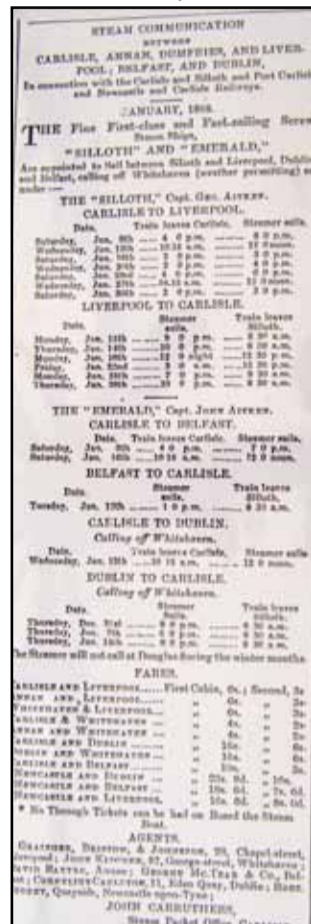
Regular readers of this column will have seen an article in which I described the early paddle steamers and screw ships that plied between the Solway ports and the major port of Liverpool, which began in 1825, two years after the opening of Port Carlisle. One of the two main shipping companies that operated the Solway to Liverpool services was the Carlisle & Liverpool Steam Navigation Company, with their three paddle steamers the 'Solway', the 'Cumberland' and the 'Newcastle'.

In 1838, this company used one of those ships, 'Solway', to open up a new weekly service from the Solway ports to Belfast, calling at Annan, Whitehaven and Ramsey in the Isle of Man. All went well with this service until 1841, when en-route to Belfast, the 'Solway' struck a sandbank off the Scottish coast and was wrecked. Fortunately, all 200 persons on board were saved, but there was talk of the vessel being overloaded. Another steamer, 'Maid of Galloway' then took up the service, supported from time to time by the steamers 'Cumberland' (until 1850) and the 'Prince of Wales'.

When the dock at Silloth was nearing completion, the services to Ireland moved to this facility, which had a direct railway link to the city of Carlisle. In 1856, the Silloth Bay Steam Navigation Company (SBSNCo) was formed, in anticipation of shortly

calling at Douglas (IoM) during the summer months and returning on Tuesday. Then on Wednesdays she sailed from Silloth to Dublin, calling off Whitehaven.

In 1860, the SBSNCo introduced the 'Cumbria' on a twice weekly service to

Belfast, but by 1861, sailings to Belfast ceased due to lack of business. In 1862, this vessel had left British waters and was reportedly being used in gun-running for the Confederate forces in the American Civil War!

In 1862, the North British Railway Company (NBRCo) took over the business operations of the SBSNCo, who were in financial difficulties, then in 1864 the SBSNCo was finally purchased by the NBRCo.

During the 1860's, several ships in succession were employed on the Silloth services to Dublin and

being able to offer services to Liverpool and Ireland. By the middle of 1857, the pier at Silloth Dock was completed sufficiently to allow these services to begin, with a ship called 'Emerald' undertaking the routes from Silloth to Belfast and Dublin. This service departed Silloth to Belfast on a Saturday,

Belfast, including the 'Silloth', 'Ariel', 'Waverley' (1), which was found to be mechanically defective after two trips, the 'Waverley' (2), 'William McCormack' and the 'Prince of Wales'.

A survey by the NBRCo in 1866 proved that the Solway services to Ireland



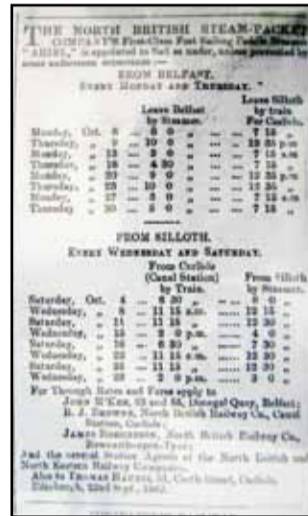

were financially loss-making, whereas the services to Liverpool were making a handsome profit. It was no surprise then, that in 1868, the Silloth to Dublin via Douglas service and the steamer 'Silloth' were sold to the Belfast company 'R. Henderson & Sons', who managed to continue that service for a while. In 1870, they replaced the 'Silloth' with the smartly fitted screw steamer 'Countess of Eglinton'. However, in the early hours of 14th July 1871 and in thick fog, the ship which was returning from Dublin, was wrecked on Langness Point on the Isle of Man. All 50 passengers were saved but sadly there was a considerable loss of the livestock being carried on board.

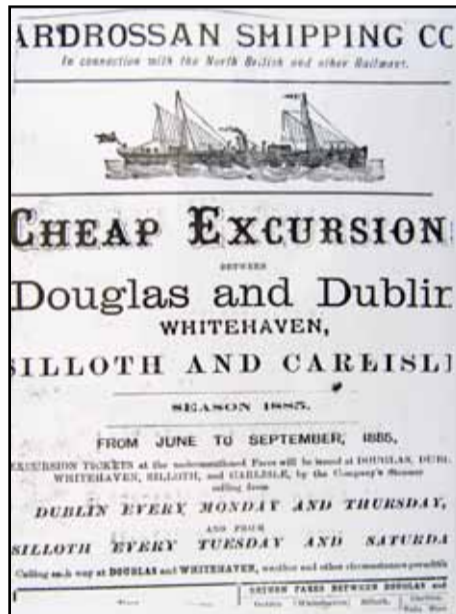
'Henderson & Sons' then chartered the vessels 'North British' and the 'South Western' from the Ardrossan Steamship Company to continue the service. It appears that 'Henderson & Sons' was taken over around 1875, by the Ardrossan Steamship Company (ASCo), who advertised that their ships 'Caledonian', 'Midland', 'North British' and the 'South Western' would now operate from Ardrossan to Belfast and Dublin, calling at Silloth and Douglas IoM en-route.

Yet another tragedy was to befall the Irish service. On 19th July 1879, the steamer 'North British' was badly off course when inbound to Douglas IoM in poor visibility, and was wrecked on rocks off Laxey Bay. All the passengers were saved and later continued their journey to Ireland aboard the 'Caledonian'.

The service from

Ardrossan to Ireland, calling at Silloth and Douglas continued through the 1880's, the last ship of that company on that route being the 'Caledonian', a ship which also took part in the Silloth New Dock opening ceremony in 1885.

In a future issue of 'On the Waterfront', I will detail the continuation of the Silloth to Dublin service, when it was taken over by a ship called 'Yarrow'.

Gray showing the future of the team is in safe hands. Final score was Silloth 4 Whitehaven Amateurs 1.

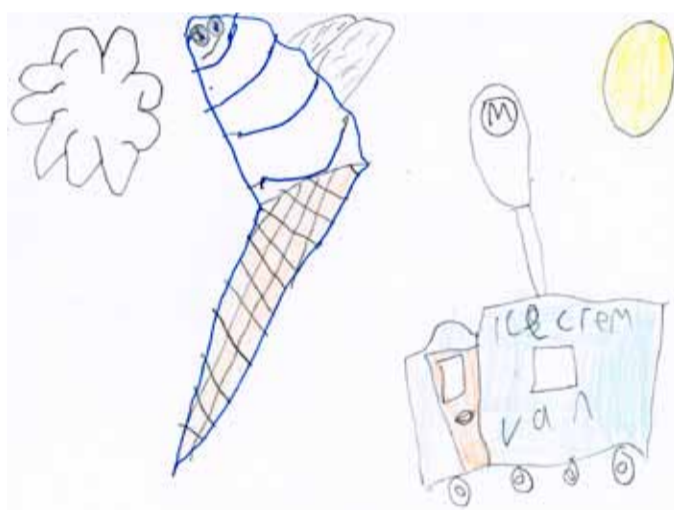
The Seagulls were outstanding as we beat a strong Cleator Moor Celtic Reserves side 5-2 in the Divisional Cup. This was by far the most accomplished performance of the season from Silloth and every player should be extremely proud of their efforts that resulted in an outstanding display of slick passing football. We had a goal of the season contender from Andy Hinde who calmly finished off a sublime team move. Red-hot striker Kris Nichol picked up where he left off last week and bagged a first half hat-trick to leave Silloth in control of the tie. Dean Barton added the fifth with his first ever goal for the Seagulls, an instinctive volley from the edge of the box which capped off a second half in which Silloth were the dominant force. Picking a man of the match was no easy task for manager Liam Wilson but in the end it deservedly went to Stuart Johnson who was immense at the heart of the Seagulls' defence alongside skipper Dan Foster.

Kieron Carr went very close with a couple of headers but Silloth's solitary goal came when Reece Blake slotted home a Carl Lightfoot cross in the 80th minute. Man of the match was skipper Dan Foster who was like a rock in the heart of defence. Also great to see the return of young Greg Ramsay who ran himself

into the ground as our lone striker.

The Seagulls made amends for the previous week's shock loss at Bransty in emphatic style by sweeping aside the West Cumbrian outfit 9-1 to reach the semi-final of the Conway Cup. Back on home soil Silloth looked to make a fast start to the game and did just that thanks to an early goal from Lewis Mulla. However the Seagulls inexplicably took their foot off the gas and when they were pegged backed to 1-1 at half time another shock was on the cards. Manager Liam Wilson rang the changes at the break and Silloth were back firing on all cylinders. Three goals in the first five minutes left the Seagulls in total control of the tie and with their high pressing, passing game in full flow they blew the opposition away with a total of eight unanswered second half goals. Man of the match Lewis 'the Bull' Mulla added three more to his tally (including a left foot curler into the top bin), Kieran Little got one and Adam Carr a brace. Reece Blake also scored two including the pick of the bunch when he calmly swept the ball home from 12 yards to finish off a superb team goal which optimised the quality of football Silloth played in the second half.

The Seagulls put in a workman like performance as they beat Whitestar 3-0 at home to maintain their unbeaten start to the league. Silloth never got out of first gear but had more than enough in hand to win the match comfortably thanks to one goal from Kieran Little and a brace from Andy Hardman. Skipper Dan Foster and man of the match Stuart Johnson where rock solid at the heart of defence to ensure the Seagulls' goal was never under serious threat. This victory leaves Silloth nine points clear at the top of Division One after ten games and in a fantastic position as we reach the business end of the season.
