Could a Carers Assessments help you? All Adult Carers are entitled to an assessment from their local authority regardless of how much care they are providing.

In Allerdale and Copeland West Cumbria Carers carry out Carers Assessments on behalf of Cumbria County Council.

What is a Carer's Assessment? If you look after a relative or friend who could not manage without your help and caring has a major impact in your life then a carer's assessment could help you. Cumbria County Council may be able to help to make things easier for you, in certain circumstances they can provide services to the person you care for. They can also provide services for you!

To work out what services would be helpful we would discuss:

- What the person you care for needs help with
- What help you are giving
- at the moment
- How we or other local
- organisations could help you. • The way this is done is

Peter McCall Joins Big Sleep

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner will mark his upcoming birthday by spending a night under the stars to raise money for charity.

Peter McCall will join up to 200 other fundraisers as he beds down by Lake Windermere for a night of sponsored discomfort at Cumbria Community Foundation's annual Big Sleep event on 28th January.

The Big Sleep is held in aid of the charity's Winter Warmth Appeal which helps vulnerable older people in Cumbria who struggle to heat their homes during the cold winter months. The appeal helps keep older people in our county warm and safe in the winter.

Fuel poverty is a serious issue in Cumbria. Recent figures from the Office of National Statistics revealed a sharp increase in the number of excess winter deaths in Cumbria. Bad winters have seen as many as 300 excess winter deaths in the county, but this figure has leapt 50 percent to 460 in the latest figures for the winter of 2014 /15.

Peter McCall said: "The Big Sleep event is a great idea, and I am looking forward to taking part because I believe it is such a worthwhile cause. By



raising money for the Winter Warmth Appeal, so many people show that they care for others in our community and it helps to raise awareness that we need to look out for our elderly neighbours. I hope we may be able to help prevent some of the 300+ deaths that sadly occur in Cumbria each winter due to the cold. It is also a novel way to spend one's birthday!"

Andy Beeforth, Chief Executive at Cumbria Community Foundation said:

"I am delighted that Peter has chosen to spend his birthday with us at the Big Sleep. It's a great challenge and also a lot of fun. There's live music, family entertainment, a film plus more surprises on the evening. I'm sure it will be a birthday he'll never forget."

It's not too late for teams, families and individuals to take on the fundraising challenge which will be held in front of the Low Wood Bay Hotel in Windermere next Saturday.

For the first time, a heritage bus service operated between Workington and Skinburness on Boxing Day 2016

Operated by the Workington Transport Heritage Group the service utilised the trusts 1978 built Leyland National Mk1. This vehicle was built at the Leyland National factory at Lillyhall on the outskirts of Workington and was built as a demonstrator vehicle for a new type of transmission that Leyland

were at the time looking to offer to bus operators around the country. After its days as a demonstrator it was converted back to a conventional bus and entered normal passenger service.

The Workington Transport Heritage Trust acquired the bus a few years ago and set about restoring it to its original livery.

The Boxing day services, which were partially supported by Silloth Town Council, ran four round

trips along the coast and carried over 100 passengers, some visiting relatives, some travelling to the Boxing day sales and others just enjoying a ride along the coast in a vintage bus.

The success of the vintage bus operation in Silloth will hopefully lead to other occasions where they appear in the town, possibly at one of the summer events held on the Green, giving visitors to the town an opportunity to ride on a bus from a bygone era.

It's Time to Save

New Year, **New Energy Costs**

Residents across Allerdale are being encouraged to sign up to the latest 'Big Allerdale Switch' initiative this winter, which has been rolled out for the New Year to help people save money on their energy bills.

During the most recent auction held in October 2016, householders in the borough saved an average of £223 on their annual energy costs. The 'collective energy switching' scheme groups people together to help them save money on their gas and electricity bills and can be used by those on dual-fuel, separate supplier contracts or on pre-payment meters.

The Big Allerdale Switch is completely free to join, really simple to do, and at no point in the process are residents under any obligation to actually switch energy providers if they decide to change their minds.

Anyone wishing to join the scheme should register online by Monday 13th February 2017 by visiting www.allerdale.gov.uk/ warmhomes and follow the links. Full details of annual energy consumption and current supplier is needed to sign up.

The next auction will be held on Tuesday 14th February 2017 and residents will then be informed of how much they can save should they decide to switch.

Councillor Carni McCarron Holmes, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive Member for Housing, said: "This is the fourth year that the Council has run the

scheme and year on year people have been able to make considerable savings on their current energy deal, so we are delighted to be able to continue offering this opportunity to residents. It costs nothing at all to register your interest to switch and you could end up saving hundreds of pounds in the long run. It's really simple - the more people who sign up, the more the potential savings may be."

Councillor Barbara Cannon, Executive Member for Corporate Resources, added: "One of the Council's main priorities is tackling inequality, and so we will continue to promote, champion and co-ordinate schemes like this to ensure people are getting the best possible value from their energy supplies. We recognise that following the Christmas period purse strings are tight and people often struggle to make ends meet. We will therefore do what we can to help our residents to cut their fuel bills and reduce the fuel poverty risk for the people of Allerdale."

Allerdale Borough Council is running the switching initiative as part of the Big Community Switch, a scheme involving a number of local authorities throughout Great Britain. The Big Community Switch is operated by i-Choosr, an independent company with experience in collective switching schemes. It works by setting up a reverse auction and inviting energy suppliers to offer their cheapest dual fuel and electricity only deals.

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Did You Register?

Serious about safety? Remember to register at www.registermyappliance.org.uk

On Register My Appliance Day (19th January), appliance manufacturers were reminding their customers that they can instantly improve their home safety by taking a few minutes to register the white goods that they rely on every day, have never registered, and completely forgot they own.

As part of the Fire Kills campaign, Cumbria Fire & Rescue Service is backing this sensible and simple precaution, to ensure that householders can be contacted swiftly if a safety repair is ever needed.

As a bonus, to tempt owners to register their January sale bargains or the thousands of older models already running in their homes, many of the 60 leading brands on www. registermyappliance.org. uk are offering to enter registrants into free draws for a range of desirable prizes.

The latest YouGov survey for the Association of Manufacturers of Domestic Appliances (AMDEA) has found that less than half (43%) of British adults usually register their large domestic appliances with the manufacturer. Of those that don't always register, 39% said this was because they forgot and 29% didn't think it was necessary. Potentially they all



risk missing out on product safety warnings.

According to recent official estimates, UK homes are currently using around 93 million (92.7m) wet and dry large appliances. They are kept for ten or many more years yet, unlike cars, the vast majority are untraceable and have never had a health check.

The YouGov survey also revealed that 70% of British adults with a fridge or fridge freezer over ten years old have never had a professional review or check to verify if they are safely connected or running correctly.

The Register My Appliance web portal was designed by AMDEA to make it quicker and easier for the public to register both new and older appliances. By simply clicking on the brand logo the user reaches a data entry form linked directly to the relevant manufacturer, where the vast majority accept registrations of products up to twelve years old. It is supported by the Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy, along with the majority of safety and consumer groups.

Cumbria Fire & Rescue Service urges the public to register any recent purchases and not to forget about their older appliances:

Remembering to register household appliances is a vital part of keeping one's home and family safe. These products are the workhorses of the home, often running daily and for many years, but it is all too easy to forget about them. Getting into the habit of spending a few minutes on www. registermyappliance.org.uk guarantees the household will receive any relevant safety messages from the manufacturer and they should respond immediately. This simple admin task should become second nature to anyone who is serious about home safety.

On Register My Appliance Day manufacturers sent reminders to over 4 million consumers. With supporters including RoSPA, Trading Standards, Citizens Advice, Electrical Safety First and the National Landlords Association using both regional press and social media to promote registration on www.registermyappliance. org.uk

Brian Gets His Big Chance

Making it as a musician is difficult, especially when there are thousands of others just like myself who all have the same goal in mind, becoming a professional record selling artist.

Most people don't make it to the "big time". Some make a great living singing and playing in pubs and clubs, I certainly don't blame them, it's great when you have a packed-out pub all dancing and cheering to your performance.

As much as I admire fellow performers and their accomplishments around the county, I couldn't settle for that. I had to revive my lost trade and put it to good use once again. I entered the Soundwaves music competition, with the chance of playing a major gig at the O2 academy in Newcastle to win a variety of prizes. Apparently for the 2015 competition over 1,000 people from the North of England alone applied. 3,000 people applied this year in total, not all of them made it to the audition stage, I had very little hope. An email changed that. I had been selected into the final 300 based on my experiences alone. Considering I hadn't played a concert in over four years I was over the moon. I needed practice and quick, with only four weeks for the first audition. I began reviving the one thing I felt good at and to date, since May the gigs have been rolling in.

Exactly as I expected I made it to the live performance audition. Along with the first audition this one also took place at The Head Of Steam in Newcastle. I had been playing a lot more by this time, gaining more confidence. I had recently stopped smoking (I've stopped smoking for six months in total now) and had a brand new voice, or at least one I hadn't heard in years. A brand new range of songs I couldn't have sung before. I aced it. It was a long anxious wait for the next set of results. Again it was great news. I did it.

Next, I had to post a video in my own home with a selection of songs I believed



Bed Of Roses. A song I could captivate an audience with, along with the select few judges. Now it was a week long wait for a phone call. Never had a week of staring at a phone been so long and nerve racking.

I got my phone call, yes I am going to the O2 academy and yes I am going to do my best to bring a win home. I've only lived in Cumbria for seven years, I do see it as my home, however, I'm actually going to be playing in home territory as I'm from the North East. I need to perform a ten minute set in front of a maximum of 2,000 people. I can't do it alone and would like to invite you all to watch me perform.

It's not often an act from this area gets an opportunity to play in what could be such a major life changing show, which record label scouts will be attending, then I could end up becoming a signed recording artist. The prize for the competition is a luxurious days recording session in a top recording studio. I just want to show what this area in terms of talent has and do us all proud. Win or lose I hope I have your support.

I have tickets readily available for general public sales, the show starts at 6pm and ends at 10pm on the 4th of February. Tickets are £6.50, so for a 4 hour show that's not bad at all.

Lloyds Bank Fraud Letters

Lloyds customers should be on the lookout for a new sophisticated fraud that involves fraudsters sending fake bank letters.

The convincing letters being sent are a replica template from Lloyds and include their logo, address and signature from a customer service representative.

The letter tells recipients that there have been some "unusual transactions" on their personal account and asks them to call a number highlighted in bold to



confirm they are genuine. When victims call the

number, an automated welcome message is played and the caller is asked to enter their card number, account number and sort code followed by their date of birth. Victims are then instructed to enter the first and last digit of their security number.

The fraud was spotted by the Daily Telegraph who was alerted to it by a reader who had three identical letters sent to an office address. On separate occasions the Daily Telegraph ran some tests using fake details and were passed to fraudsters who claimed to be from a Lloyds contact centre. The bank has confirmed that the phone number and letters are fake.

The letters are essentially a sophisticated phishing attempt and serves as a warning to consumers to question written correspondence from their banks.

If you are ever suspicious about correspondence from your bank you should call the customer serviced number on the back of their card.

Fire Kills: Top tips for staying safe in the kitchen

During February half term, many children across Cumbria will be spending more time in the kitchen with their parents, carers and families. Whether they're lending a hand or simply seeking a snack, it's important to make sure that they know the hazards of a hot hob. So as part of the Fire Kills campaign, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service is encouraging parents and carers to make any kitchen activities a chance for kids to learn about cooking safety.

Mark Ducie, Community Safety Manager, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service, said: "There are lots of creative ways to teach kids about cooking fire safety. And, it's absolutely vital that they know what to do if the worst should happen. So alongside the melting, mixing and making, why not take the chance to pass on your fire safety know-how? Test your smoke alarms as part of the activity. And remember, never leave a child alone with a hot hob, and help keep them safe by moving matches and saucepan handles out of their reach."

Children don't have to be in the kitchen to change the way you work – distraction while cooking is a main cause of fire call-outs right across the country.

Mark Ducie continued: "Half of all accidental fires in the home start in the kitchen - often because of distractions like phone calls or family. So whatever happens elsewhere in your home, always make sure you have one eye on the hob or oven."

The Fire Kills campaign's top tips for staying safe in the kitchen are: Take care if you need to leave the kitchen whilst cooking. Take pans off the heat or turn them down to avoid risk.

If a pan catches fire, don't take any risks – Get Out, Stay Out, and Call 999. Double check the hob is off when you've finished cooking. Keep tea towels and cloths away from the cooker and hob.


Take care if you're wearing loose clothing – this can easily catch fire. Avoid leaving children in the kitchen alone when cooking. Keep matches and saucepan handles out of their reach to keep them safe. Take care with electrics keep leads and appliances away from water and place grills and toasters away from curtains and kitchen rolls. Keep your equipment clean and in good working order. A build-up of fat and grease can ignite a fire. Don't cook after drinking alcohol. Hot oil can catch fire easily - be careful that it doesn't overheat. Never throw water on a chip

pan fire. In the event of a fire, have an escape plan in place.

Don't take risks by tackling a fire. Get out, stay out and call 999.

Make sure you have at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home and test them monthly.

Community Projects Get £100,000

Cumbria Community Foundation recently awarded £100,000 to community projects and individuals across West Cumbria at their latest Grants Committee.

The West Cumbria Grants Panel approved applications from twenty charitable organisations that run a range of projects, including a new dementia initiative and a support group for young carers.

Age UK West Cumbria received £5,000 to develop volunteer led dementia support groups across Allerdale. A Dementia Action Alliance is formed by a group of stakeholders in a community who come together to identify and take forward initiatives that can make a community more dementia friendly. Groups have already formed in Aspatria, Workington, Cockermouth and Maryport. The funding will go towards the initial volunteer and venue costs, as well as a launch event which is planned for later this year. Mary Bradley, Chief Executive of Age UK West Cumbria, said: "The number of people with dementia is increasing and the disease has become the primary diagnosis for death in later life. People with dementia experience different issues

depending on the stage of the disease. They are often marginalised because people think that inability to do one thing means they can't do anything."


West Cumbria Carers received £11,246 from the Solway Fund to deliver three support groups for young carers in the Maryport and Workington area. The groups will give youngsters the opportunity to meet with other young carers and talk about similar issues in a supportive environment, while also taking a break from their caring role. The sessions will also encourage school staff and students to develop a better understanding of young carers and the issues they face. Clare Edwards, Project and Funding Development Manager at West Cumbria Carers, said: "Being a young carer is physically demanding and emotionally draining. Many young carers struggle at school and leave with low grades or no qualifications. The group sessions aim to instil young carers with confidence and reduce feelings of isolation by developing a peer support network. Young carers will be able to better engage with school or college because their educational environment will have a better understanding of

their caring role and how it impacts on their school life."

Among the many other grants awarded was £13,680 for the refurbishment of Allonby Village Hall.

Annalee Holliday, Grants & Donor Services Officer, at Cumbria Community Foundation, said: "We are grateful for our fundholders' generosity to enable us to support the many and varied community projects in our area."

Applications for the next round of funding need to be submitted by Friday 24th February 2017 to be reviewed by the panel on Wednesday 22nd March 2017. For more information or to apply visit www. cumbriafoundation.org or contact the grants team on 01900 825760.





The national smoke alarm campaign began in 1988 to encourage people to install smoke alarms in their home. Since 2003, the primary message of the Fire Kills campaign has been regular testing of smoke alarms.

Smoke alarms save lives, but only if they work. Test yours monthly to make sure they are in good working order.

There are a number of other smoke alarm messages that sit alongside testing:

• The easiest way to protect your home and family from fire is with working smoke alarms - get them, install them, test them. They could save your life.

• Fit at least one on every level of your home and test them monthly.

• Ten year sealed battery smoke alarms are the best option. They are slightly more expensive, but you save on the cost of replacing batteries.

• If it is a ten year alarm, you will need to replace the whole alarm every ten years.

Unfortunately Abbeytown members found the mats a challenge and the final score was Wigton 72 and Abbeytown 11.


Michael Faulkner thanked the Wigton members for a friendly evening and invited them back to Abbeytown soon.



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Silloth Seagull Old Boys 3-1 Young Boys

Once again it was time for the annual Silloth A.F.C. (the Seagulls) Boxing Day match between the old boys and the young boys. The game would take on extra significance this year and it would mark the first time the sides would compete for the Michael Aird Memorial Trophy and it was a fitting tribute to our good friend that this inaugural fixture would be of such high quality.

Such is the youthful nature of the current Silloth side that only those under 25 qualified to be a 'young boy' and so that left the Seagulls' top scorer Adam Carr to spearhead the veteran's attack, a decision that in the end would prove decisive. Having lost the toss skipper Robbie Carter knew his old boys side would have to take full advantage of playing the first half down the slope and with the wind to have any chance of being victorious. Thus the veterans started at a high tempo and got their reward early on through Lee Johnston. Jono expertly swept a 35 yard free-kick straight into the top left corner of the goal and the old boys had the lead.

The veterans looked to push on but it was now that the young guns began to get a foot-hold in the game. Calum Casson, Ken Lau and Dave Pearson were controlling possession in the centre of the park



and the returning Graeme Dixon looked in his pomp galloping across the Eden Street Bastion. The real threat though was always the lightning pace of Reece Blake and though rightback Gareth Lewis had so far limited him to only a few half chances it was no surprise when the flying winger was first to react to a shot rebounding off the bar and equalised with a tap-in from two yards.

Now the young Gulls



were in full flow and committed more men forward as they looked to add to their tally. The old boys' defence stayed resolute and with the conditions in their favour the 'route one' counter-attack was always on the cards. Twice the veterans spurned great chances to score before Adam 'Cloyter' Carr ghosted through the heart of the youngster's defence to give the old boys a 2-1 half-time lead.

Playing into the teeth of the wind and up the slope in the second half the veterans knew they had to dig in and prepare for an onslaught. The young Gulls were able to release the talents of Calvin Rowell and Stuart Johnson into midfield to further impose their dominance on a 45 minutes of football which was predominately being played in the old boys' defensive third. The threats were coming from every angle with full-backs Kieron Carr and Carl Lightfoot getting in on the act at every opportunity. Under such relentless pressure the veteran's defence began to bend but it did not break.

With a back four straight from the title winning over 35's side (Philip Scott, David Minnican, Andrew

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Pearson and Lee Johnston) the young boys were facing a defence with experience that was second to none. Minnie and Panda especially showing once again that they form one of the most formidable centre-half partnerships that Silloth has ever produced. In front of them was a solid bank of four across the midfield. Liam Wilson, Mark Glencross, Kris Nichol and Graeme Horsley working tirelessly in the trenches to break up as many attacks as they could. Finally, in the sticks was Chris Walsh. A striker by trade Walshy made for an unorthodox but effective custodian whose determination to not be beaten saw him pull off a string of saves, the highlight of which was palming a 40 yard, rasping volley onto the post.

The only respite from the young gun's pressure came from the outstanding holdup play of legendary Silloth goalscorer David Wise. His link up play with Cloyter

was providing the veteran defenders with a much needed break. Still, though it looked like a matter of when not if the young boys would make the breakthrough. They were now camped on the edge of the old boys' box, hit the bar and Jono was forced to make two stunning clearances off the line. Then the sucker punch came.

Committing so many men forward in an attempt to win the game the young Gulls would always be vulnerable to a counterattack and in a rare instance of forward play the old boys extended their lead. A quick pass out of defence left Cloyter one on one with his marker and youngster's half of the Bastion at his mercy. His pace took him past his man and straight into the heart of the 18 yard box where he made no mistake in lashing home past Luke Stockdale who was given no chance by the venom of the strike. That was a brace for Cloyter and the veteran's third goal.

With a two goal lead and only 15 minutes remaining it was all hands to the pump for the old boys. Wave after wave of attacks poured down on their goal and

Reece Blake (who must have slipped out of Philip Scott's pocket) took him past the veteran's defence allowing him to slot home from 10 yards. The old boys stayed resolute though and saw the game out to become the first winners of the Michael Aird Memorial Trophy.

This was also the first year in which the Eden Shield (kindly donated by local businessman and long time friend of the club Lyndsey Scott) would be presented to the 'man of the match.' So many of golfs great legends have been associated with or played in this tournament. I don't know if this was the pinnacle of Tim's golfing but it certainly has to

Every year we get thousands of visiting golfers who make the journey to Silloth and this is not only good for us as a business it is very good for the town as a whole.


