Councillors have elected Independent councillor Marion Fitzgerald as Leader of Allerdale Borough Council at last night's [22 May 2019] Annual

7 Died in N. West



Annual coastal fatality figures released today by the RNLI lifesaving charity reveal seven people lost their lives off the north west coast last year- over 70% of whom were male. The 2018 figures are identical to 2017, with statistics showing similar gender divides back to 2014.

Over half of those who sadly lost their lives did not intend to enter the water (57%) Activities such as running or walking or some waterside activity or in water play are contributing to people losing their lives.

As the RNLI's national drowning prevention campaign Respect the Water launches for 2019, the RNLI is urging the public to take action and follow this potentially lifesaving advice if they find themselves in trouble in cold water:

• Fight your instinct to swim hard or thrash about – this can lead to breathing in water and drowning

• Instead, relax and FLOAT on your back, until you have regained control of your breathing

Chris Cousens, RNLI Community Safety Partner for the north west says: 'No one should have to lose someone they love to drowning. Many of the tragic deaths at the coast can be avoided if people understand the risks and prepare themselves by practising

the Float technique. We've been contacted by people who say they recalled the Float safety message while in serious trouble in the water, and that following the RNLI's advice helped save their life. But we can't get complacent, we all have a role in getting behind coastal safety education, investing in initiatives and sharing survival skills to help save lives from drowning?

Chris continues: 'A worrying trend shows men make up most of the fatalities at the coast every year; last year five males lost their lives off the north west coast. Figures show 57% hadn't planned on entering the water, with slips, trips and falls catching them unaware while out running or walking. Knowing what to do if you fall into cold water can be the difference between life and death. The instinctive human reaction when you fall into cold water can cause panic and gasping for breath, increasing the chances of breathing in water. Although it's counter intuitive, the best immediate course of action is to fight your instinct and float on your back.

Residents Concern Over Dog Walker

Silloth RNLI lifeboat was called out at 9:10 on the morning of Tuesday 21st May by Belfast Coastguard, who had been contacted by a member of the public from Skinburness.

Someone had been seen walking far out along the sand banks with four dogs at Skinburness and the tide was coming in. The exposed sand out in the Solway Firth towards Grune Point looks a very desirable place to walk but with the tide turning, it can be extremely dangerous

red and yellow flags – the area most closely monitored by the lifeguards. And if you see someone else in danger in the water at the coast, fight your instinct to go in and try to rescue them yourself, instead call 999 or 112 and ask for the Coastguard'.

The Respect the Water campaign will run throughout the summer with advertising across cinema, outdoor posters, radio, online, and catch-up TV channels. and the sea can cut you off very quickly.

Due to the low water, the sea was too far out for the lifeboat to launch from the boathouse slipway, so it had to be taken round to the secondary launch site at West Beach. Despite being a working day, twelve members of the crew had arrived, which is an amazing achievement.

Launching from the West Beach means some operational changes have to be made to the tractor and trailer and this all takes time. Silloth RNLI lifeboat crew have been working hard to perfect launching from West Beach, since the original secondary launch site has had to be moved from Skinburness Road, due to the lack of water there when it is low tide.

Silloth Port, which the lifeboat has to go through in order to launch from the West Beach, was very busy and some careful negotiation of port vehicles had to be made. The lifeboat was launched in just over ten minutes from the West Beach; this was the first time the lifeboat had used this site in an emergency, since the new slipway has been built.

The lifeboat went up towards Grune Point as far as it could with the low water but the walker and dogs could not be seen. Some of the crew also went by road up towards the Point to see if they could see them.

Contact was also made with several residents of Skinburness to see if they could see anyone out walking with dogs.

As no one had been found and the walker and dogs could no longer be seen, Belfast Coastguard stood the lifeboat down at 9:55. It was recovered from the West Beach and taken back to the boathouse, where it was made ready for further service.

The sand banks in the Solway Firth change considerably with every tide and nothing is stable, with the movement of tonnes of soft sand and mud, it is very easy to get stuck very quickly. It is advisable in the circumstances to avoid walking on them although they do look inviting.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat exercises regularly to keep up to date with the ever changing sands but even from day to day there are drastic changes. The upper reaches of the Solway Firth is an area of uncharted water, due to the constant shift of sand.

Kayaker Causes Concern

After spending the morning on exercise with the RNLI lifeboat from Workington, Silloth RNLI lifeboat was called out for a real 'shout' in the early afternoon of Sunday 19th May.

A single kayaker had been seen to leave Silloth at 10:00 heading North towards Annan. He had not returned by 13:30 and with the tide now ebbing and the wind becoming fresher, it would have proved difficult for the lone kayaker to make it back to Silloth and his car.

A member of Silloth lifeboat crew went up by road towards Grune Point to look for the kayak. The coastguard at Burgh was also called to see if they could see him. It was decided to call the coastguard at Belfast, who subsequently requested the launching of Silloth RNLI lifeboat, they also informed the Police, who were able to trace the address of the owner of the vehicle left in Silloth.

Meanwhile the Silloth lifeboat was searching Moricambe Bay and the area towards Annan; Burgh coastguard were searching the upper reaches of the Solway. Members of the shore crew at Silloth RNLI were looking at Grune Point and along the Creek. Silloth lifeboat was trying to contact the kayaker by VHF radio but without success. At 14:08 Silloth RNLI lifeboat reported the sighting of a kayak at

Bowness on Solway, moored under

Silloth RNLI lifeboat crew were a little unsettled, as although the kayak had been found and was safe, there was no sign of the kayaker.



the life ring at the car park. The public house and various Guest Houses in Bowness on Solway was contacted to see if there was anyone there who fitted the description of the kayaker. The crew of the lifeboat were unable to go ashore as this would have proved to be too dangerous with the ebbing tide.

The coastguard in Belfast was contacted at 14:10 to inform them of the kayak sighting.

The lifeboat was stood down at 14:13, it returned to the boathouse

Apparently this particular kayaker parks his car and then paddles up to another place further along the coast, leaves the kayak and walks back to his car, which can take several hours. He then drives back to recover his kayak.

It is always wise to inform the coastguard before going out to sea, telling them where you are going and roughly what time you are expecting to return, particularly on a solo trip. It saves a lot of unnecessary anxiety.

His biography says: Dr Smith trained at the University of Oxford, gaining his medical degree as well as a degree in Physiological Sciences. As a junior he worked in Oxford, Newcastle and a number of London teaching hospitals. Dr Smith came to The Christie as a junior doctor in 1999, and after further training was appointed as a consultant in 2007.

His interests include lymphoma and other haematological disorders (giving

chemotherapy and radiotherapy). He has a particular interest in treating young people with

lymphoma, and patients are referred to the service from across the region. Dr Smith also practises

paediatric radiotherapy and has a particular interest in using advanced

MRCP(UK), FRCRusing advancedrseasradiotherapy to reduce the risk ofso alate effects of treatment, as wellast;as an interest in particle therapies(including Proton Therapy). Sinceof2009 he has been Clinical Lead for

Courier Fraud, Bogus Police and Bank Officials Alert What you need to know Individuals have been receiving phone calls from people claiming to be a police officer or banking official

The suspect will say either: •There has been fraudulent activity at the victims' bank and the staff at the bank are involved, the victim is then asked to withdraw money to either keep it safe or assist the police with their investigation

•A business such as a jewellers or currency exchange is fraudulent and they require the victims' assistance to help secure evidence by purchasing jewellery or exchange a large amount of currency to hand over to the police

•The victims' card has been compromised and used to purchase goods by a suspect, the victim is requested to withdraw their money to keep it safe or hand over

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their bank card to the police What you need to do Your bank or the police will never:

Occasionally the victim will be told to dial a non-emergency extension of '161' to receive confirmation of the individual's bogus identity, the bogus official will advise the victim to lie about the reason for the withdrawal or purchase if challenged by staff, as the staff member is involved in the fraud

A courier attends the victim's home address to collect the goods the same day Often the victim is given a code word for the courier as a way of authentication •Phone and ask you for your PIN or full

A lot of other events had been cancelled over the weekend but that was not the case with the Silloth Vintage Rally....we simply had a slightly later start.

There were lots of exhibits on show and thousands of visitors making the most of the wonderful venue. Everywhere you looked there were vintage vehicles and machinery on display. The exhibits included vintage steam engines, stationary engines, commercial vehicles, buses, military vehicles, classic and vintage cars, motorbikes, push bikes and various vintage tractors and agricultural machinery.

On Saturday, there was a children's football tournament which is always popular with the kids and their families, with some very talented and determined youngsters taking part. Unfortunately, the Cockermouth Ukuleles didn't manage to get through to the Rally due to the weather. Entertainment was provided by Greg Chapman, who gave an enjoyable and entertaining display of escapology, juggling, storytelling and witty banter. On Sunday, the Border Concert Band performed in the main arena and were a pleasure to listen to. Adrian Smith aka Mighty Smith, who

came 5th in the World's Strongest Man and three times Winner of UK's Strongest Man Competition, also performed in the main arena on Sunday. He organised a £1,000 open challenge if anyone could perform all the feats of strength that he does in his act. Noone succeeded, although there were a few keen contenders. Ichabod Steam and his

Steampunk Submarine was at the Rally on Sunday and attracted quite a bit of interest. Paul also performed on the stage. The Fairground was on the Green over the weekend, along with donkey rides for the kids.

Our thanks go to Carr's Flour, Silloth for having a Museum Open Day on Sunday in support of the Vintage Rally. They raised a total of £256 which has been split between Silloth RNLI and Silloth First Responders. Members of the public had an opportunity to investigate the rare 'Carel' steam engine with giant flywheel that once powered the giant Carr's flour mill plant at Silloth-on-Solway. The museum also contains artefacts reflecting the company's history of flour, bread and biscuit



manufacture over the years. Cllr. Christine Bowditch,

Chair of Cumbria County Council attended the rally on Sunday and picked the overall winner which was no easy feat in view of all the amazing exhibits on show. Christine chose the 1924 Aveling & Porter C Type Steam Roller (reg JS 2044) from Ross & Cromarty County Council owned by Jim & Audrey Smith of Skerrington Mill, Cumnock. The Living Van was bought in March 2017, now fully restored and apparently built by Alex Laurie & Sons, Falkirk. This was their first steam rally, so quite an achievement for their first visit to Silloth.

Funding for this annual event is often hard to find but this year we were lucky enough to secure grant funding of £3,000 from the Hellrigg Community Fund and £500 from the Silloth-on-Solway Community Shop. A very big thank you to West Silloth Motors at Causewayhead, Silloth who sponsored this year's event. Thanks also to our programme advertisers and everyone who bought the programme. Thanks also to everyone who popped along to the caravan and gave a donation.

Mr Wood raised £78 in donations for the Rally with his De Merel fairground organ. We can't charge for admission to the event due to the nature of the Green, so

any financial support received is always appreciated. The other way we generate funds is by charging stall holders and food concessions. We had a good mix of stalls this year, who seemed to have a successful weekend, despite Saturday's weather.

In addition to enjoying the Vintage Rally, visitors were able to enjoy what the Green has to offer, the gardens, the Fairy Trail, the Woodland Play Area, the Water Splash Park and the new Pirate Ship play area. We are so lucky to have Silloth Green which is a perfect location for events and we're grateful to the Town Council for allowing us to use the Green for the Vintage Rally.

A very big thank you to all our visitors, exhibitors, traders, entertainers, sponsors, advertisers and funders. The Plastic Pollution Solution at Silloth Primary School

Silloth Primary School is a Global Learning School and that means that we think globally about issues effecting the world but act at a local level to help solve the problems (Think Global, Act Local!).

At the moment, we're working on a project called The Plastic Pollution Solution, as plastics in the oceans and seas is having a devastating effect on sea creatures and the amazing underwater world that we are so lucky to have on our planet.

In January, we launched our campaign by having an art/creative week called, 'Inspired by Oceans & Seas' and we made an exhibition of this work to show our parents and friends and to encourage them to think about their use of single-use plastics at home and at work.

Our aim is to become a Single-Use Plastic Free

School by January 2020 and we're hoping that the entire community will join our campaign and together, we could become the first Single-Use Plastic Free Town In Cumbria!

We are in the process of writing to all the businesses in Silloth to ask them to make a pledge to reduce their use of single-use plastic or replace them with sustainable



alternatives, we've asked the Town Council for their commitment & support in the campaign and we're asking you to help us achieve this important status as a seaside town.

As part of this campaign, we're following the guidelines set down by Surfers against Sewage (SAS), who have established key objectives that communities must achieve in order

to qualify for the status. The objectives are as follows: Objective 1: Town Council/Parish Council passes a resolution supporting the journey to Plastic Free Community Status, committing to plastic-free alternatives and plastic free initiatives within the constituency. Fake HMRC Refunds

ncrease in the reporting of malicious calls and voice mails, to members of the public purporting to be from Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs (HMRČ).

•Fraudsters are spoofing genuine HMRC telephone numbers to deceive their victims over the phone. The fraudsters state that as a result of the victim's non-payment of tax or other duty, the victim is liable for prosecution or other legal proceedings in order to settle the palance. The fraudsters suggest victims can avoid this, by arranging payment to be made immediately by methods such as bank transfer or by purchasing iTunes gift cards.

• If the victim is hesitant or refuses to comply, the suspect makes a threat such as immediate arrest, sending bailiffs to the victim's address or, in some cases, deportation.

• Often, the period for which the tax s allegedly due is distant enough to guarantee the victim will have little, if any, paperwork or ability to verify the claims. Once the money is paid the suspects sever all contact with the victim.

• In genuine cases, HMRC will initially make direct contact with you via post/letter and potentially follow up that letter with a phone call at a later date.

• If HMRC contact you via telephone they will quote the reference number on the initial letter you should have received. HMRC will not discuss something you are not already aware of, like a tax investigation, and will NOT demand mmediate payment.

It is vital that the public exercise caution when receiving messages or telephone calls of this nature.

What you need to do •Always estion unsolicited requests

Action Fraud has experienced an for your personal or financial information. Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and contact details), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Instead, contact the company directly using trusted methods such as a known email address or phone number

> • Legitimate organisations wouldn't ask you to pay taxes, bills or fees using an iTunes gift card, or any other type of voucher. If you're contacted by anyone that asks you to do this, you're likely the target of a scam

• Don't be rushed or pressured into making a decision. Under no circumstances would a genuine bank or some other trusted organisation force you to make a financial transaction on the spot.

• Report Phishing attempts. If you receive a call, text or email of this nature and have not lost money, you can report this as phishing to Action Franc



Residents across Allerdale are being warned about fake text messages suggesting they are due a refund on their council tax. These texts are false and appear to be a phishing scam. An example message reads: "You are due to receive a refund from your council. Visit our secure website to begin the process."

These texts have not been sent on behalf of the council and residents are advised not to click on the link and to delete the message. If customers are due a refund the council informs them by post. If the council has the customer's bank details it pays the refund direct. If not, the customer is asked to contact the council direct to arrange a refund. These texts have not come from the council, and the council's IT systems have not been compromised in any way.

The speaker at our June meeting was Steve Doyle who gave a talk and photos of his trips to South America in 2009, 2015 and 2019

He explained that most of South America is Spanish speaking and the towns are very proud of their town squares known as Plaza Mayor. They are on the whole very religious and even small towns often have very big churches.

Lima on the Pacific Coast is not usually too busy with tourists as it is usually a landing place for onward travel. Steve travelled from here to Cusco to visit Machu Pichu. As he and his wife were here overnight they decided to walk up a small hill to see a field of Llamas, although not steep they found it very tiring because of the altitude. They found it amusing that they could get a full signal on a mobile phone when they can't in Durdar, Carlisle. There was a lovely train journey and then a bus journey up a snaking road up to Machu Pichu. They were lucky to get good views as this is often covered in low cloud.

It was fascinating to see the photos of Lake Titicaca on the

Peru/Bolivia border. The islands and boats are made from reeds.

> As La Paz is 15,000 feet up not many football teams like playing

there because of the altitude. At Iguazo there is a border with Argentina, Brazil and Paraguay, and the biggest waterfall system in the world. Here can also been seen butterflies, geckos and coati.

One of Steve's personal highlights was a visit to the Perita Moreno Glacier one of the oldest glaciers in the world and the only glacier that is not shrinking. It is 38km long approx 78m high and 1.5km wide.

We also saw photos of Rio De Janeiro, Santiago and Tierra Del Fuego.

Online Vehicle Sales

Fraudsters have been advertising vehicles and machinery for sale on various online selling platforms, this includes vehicles and machinery used by the agricultural industry.

The victims, after communicating via email with the fraudster, will receive a bogus email which appears to be sent by a trustworthy third party, often Paypal or Escrow.

The emails are designed to persuade victims to pay up-front via bank transfer rather than through a protected payment method via the website. The victim pays the deposit before visiting the seller to collect the goods, believing there is a 'cooling off' period to reclaim the payment if they change their mind.

This gives victims the false sense of security that their money is being looked after by this trustworthy third party, when in fact, it is not and the money has gone straight to the fraudster.

It is vital that the public exercise caution when receiving emails or messages of this nature.

What you need to do •Never transfer money for a vehicle you haven't seen in person. • Avoid paying for the vehicle by

bank transfer as it offers you little protection if you become a victim of fraud. Instead, use a credit card or payment services such as Paypal. • If you're purchasing from a

Aspatria and Silloth are next in line to get a spruce up from Allerdale Borough Council's successful Facelift Scheme.

Business and home owners located in the centre of both towns can apply for funding to help pay for improvements to look of their property.

The Facelift Scheme provides up to £900 for each property, with the property owner match-funding this with 10% of the grant total. Therefore a £500 grant requires match funding of £50.

The money can go towards things like materials such as paint and any labour costs, the repair or replacement of damaged items like drain pipes or guttering, and any external lighting. The grant is not eligible for some work and it is best to consult with the council before making an application.

The scheme has already proved popular in Maryport and Wigton in recent years.

Mark Jenkinson, deputy leader and executive member responsible for economic growth, said: "This is a great scheme which has worked really well in other towns and shows how a small investment can make a huge difference. I'd encourage everyone eligible to take advantage of this money which we are providing."

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There has been plenty of shipping action at the dock recently, the highlight being the arrival of four ships over the May Day weekend. Anyone walking the road to the west beach on Bank Holiday Monday would have seen three of those ships occupying berths. Cargos being delivered were grain and fertiliser from Europe, and molasses from a little further afield, India via transshipment in Belgium. Silloth regular, ZAPADNYY brought the molasses and was quickly turned around, whilst the three new visitors, EEMS STAR, ALECTO and VEDETTE stayed over the weekend.

The arrival of EEMS STAR coincided with dramatic lighting conditions. Waiting photographers were able to capture the ship brightly lit against dark clouds across the Solway. Thankfully rain held off and the ship passed smoothly into New Dock on the lunchtime tide. She was tied-up at a temporary berth alongside the mill as other berths were occupied. EEMS STAR would have to wait her turn to unload her cargo of fertiliser from Belgium. The ship which was built in 2008 is one of sixteen coasters operated by her Dutch owners on busy European routes.

ALECTO was the one nighttime arrival of the weekend resulting in only dockside photos which is always a disappointment for enthusiasts. The ship had the longest sailing to reach Silloth, seven days from the Baltic port of Klaipeda via the Kiel Canal and English Channel. ALECTO was seen in the traditional orange livery which many Dutch owned ships bear reflecting the national pride of the Dutch people. Coincidentally, ALECTO and another weekend visitor, VEDETTE, described below, were built to the same design at the Damen Shipyard in the Netherlands six years apart.

The fourth ship of the busy weekend, VEDETTE, arrived on a gloomier day from the French Atlantic port of La Pallice, a three day sailing. La Pallice is one of six French ports which regularly supply Silloth with wheat. The ship made easy work of entry to the dock and was soon brought alongside. She was photographed entering the dock, and in brighter conditions the following day whilst unloading. VEDETTE is an unusual visitor being owned by a UK company, 'Faversham Shipping' based on the Isle of Wight. She is one of ten vessels operated by the company which describes itself as a 'friendly little fish in a very big pond.

Another good month in Silloth Port.

This month has seen nine vessels calling here in Silloth, with the return of the TN Trawler Philomena and two calls by the Liva Greta with Lime from Larne.

Liva Greta is the smallest cargo ship that has arrived in the last year or so at 64m in length, she is also the only one that has no bow thruster to assist with turning in the dock.

Due to a rush of vessels over the first bank holiday weekend, we had to bring back Chris Puxley to assist with some of the vessel pilotage as we have strict rules on hours of rest.

We are due to start a dredge campaign in June where we are aiming to get the mud down by at least 80cm throughout the dock, this will enable us to bring vessels in on neap tides and reduce the number of times vessels will sit on the bottom in the dock due to lack of water and a leaky gate.

Ashraf Hossain, our latest addition to the team of Silloth pilots is now qualified for bringing vessels in and out of the port and will also act as the Deputy Harbour Master here in Silloth and a second pilot for Ayr and Troon.

This has been a good month for the port, with approximately 22,000 tonnes arriving in the month. Looks like the weather is playing an important part in the requirements for fertilisers and we hope a warm and mostly dry summer will bring additional demand for barbecues, bread rolls and French sticks!



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Highways & Transport Survey

Local people are being asked for their views on Cumbria's highways and transport services - from the condition of roads and footpaths to the quality of cycling facilities. Their answers will be compared with the views of other members of the public across England and Scotland, thanks to the National Highways and Transport Public Satisfaction survey.

Cumbria County Council is one of 111 Local Authorities to sign up to a standardised survey that will ask members of the public exactly the same questions, wherever they live in Cumbria.

The survey, which is being run for the tenth year is the largest collaboration between Local Authorities offering the opportunity to compare results, share in best practice and identify further opportunities to work together in the future.

The questionnaire will be sent to a minimum random sample of at least 3,300 of Cumbria's residents from Friday 7th June, followed by a reminder, with local and national results to be published in late-October 2019. Since the survey is based on a sample, residents that receive a copy are being urged to take part.

Residents that receive the questionnaire can complete the survey on line if they prefer, a short URL link will be printed on the front of the questionnaire and they will be required to enter a code before completing the questionnaire.

The results will enable us to find out what people in Cumbria think about these important services. This will provide one of several ways Cumbria County Council can assess how it is performing. It gives the public an opportunity to say which services they think the council should prioritise, and improve.

Cllr Keith Little, Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport, said: "There are clear benefits to conducting a public survey in this way. As well as providing excellent value for money, it also enables everyone involved to identify areas of best practice and spot national, regional and local trends. This is not about producing a league table to champion one geographical area over another, it is about understanding customer views better and working together to deliver the most satisfactory yet efficient outcomes for local
