# Slimming World Winner Steven loses 5st 9lbs

A super slimmer, Steven, has been named Silloth's Man of the Year 2020 after losing an incredible 5st 9lbs – in the first ever virtual competition Slimming World has held in its 50-year history.

Since joining his Slimming World group in January, Steven McGregor has gone from just over 24 stone to 18st 5lbs, proving that Slimming World works for men as well as women.

Members would usually vote for their group's winner at their Saturday morning in-person Slimming World group – however this time around celebrations were held online as part of the organisation's new temporary virtual service.

Steven said "I began my journey in January 2020, my wife pointed out that I turned 50 in March, did I really want to be fat and 50. I took her comments on board and acted upon them. I contacted the local GP surgery to see if they could offer any

assistance with losing weight. The GP advised they could offer me a twelve week referral to Slimming World, I

the offer nervously. I had to attend the doctors to be weighed, well that was a wake up call, I was advised I was morbidly obese.

They gave me a phone number to ring Slimming World, I made that phone call, the lady I spoke to made it sound so easy and advised me, if I stuck to plan I would lose weight, she gave me the details for my local group. Again feeling rather nervous I contacted Loretta saying I would be attending on the Saturday morning, she was full of energy and enthusiasm to meet me that weekend.

The Saturday morning came round and I headed for the venue with a few words from my wife including "good luck love", as a new member I didn't know what to expect as I walked in, well what a welcome I received - from grab

a seat and would you like a brew, this totally put me at ease. The new member sign up forms are straight forward and everything is explained to you.

Then came weigh in, I already had a rough idea from the doctor, what weight I was but allowed a little variance between scales, there wasn't a lot of difference, my weight was just over 24 stone, something I am not proud of, however I embraced the Food Optimising plan, our eating habits have changed from frequent takeaways and fast food outlets to eating "Free Food" and knowing exactly what we were putting in our meals rather than the convenience of using processed jars with lots of hidden sugars and oils. I'm never hungry as there's always something free you can snack on from crab sticks to pickles and fruit (I'm now a fruit bat). I'm now six months into my journey and I'm now the lightest weight I've been for years, I have so much

> more energy and look forward to my daily walks, these have increased from 1.5 miles at the start to up to a good ten

miles some days now the weight is coming off. I still have a way to go but every couple of pounds is another step towards the next

Had I not taken the steps to lose weight the way I was going I was heading for the cemetery and an early grave!"

Loretta says "Steven was pleasantly surprised to find that the support provided by the group was practical and encouraging. He also enjoyed following Slimming World's Food Optimising eating plan, which is based on the science of satiety and energy density, enabling him to enjoy generous portions of healthy food like lean meat, pasta, rice, eggs, potatoes, fruit and veg, to satisfy his appetite, so he didn't have to go

Slimming World introduced its new temporary virtual service in March, after announcing it was temporarily suspending its local groups in response to the coronavirus outbreak. Steven says the support and encouragement he's continued to receive in his Slimming World virtual group has helped him stay on track with his weight loss."

Steven said "I was sad to hear that my group had been suspended as I was worried about missing my routine of attending my weekly Slimming World group and nervous about holding on to the changes I'd made without it. So I was delighted when I found out Slimming World was going virtual – now I really enjoy attending my virtual group, it's full of that same group spirit and laughter, and all the usual advice, like new recipe suggestions and ideas to boost our activity levels, that we've always received – only now from the

comfort of my sofa. It's been a real lifeline in helping me to hang on to those healthy habits I've built over the last six months and now I feel certain that - with the support of my group – I can manage my weight whatever life throws at me. I always come away feeling just as inspired and motivated to keep going each week, and love sharing new recipes and ideas with my friends in the group."

Loretta Thompson, who runs the Silloth Slimming World group says she's incredibly proud of Steven: "He has done brilliantly and we're all in awe of his transformation. And while so much has changed in the last few months his determination and motivation has remained the same – he's a real inspiration to the group. Steven has become a whizz in the kitchen and every week the group loves to hear about what he's cooking up. I couldn't be prouder of everything Steven's achieved!"



150 years ago, on 8th September 1869, the foundation stone for Christ Church was laid by Bishop Anderson (not the Bishop of Carlisle). There followed a year of building works to produce most of the building we see today (the spire was added in 1878) and the church opened on 8th September 1870 followed by its consecration in November 1871.

Our striking building takes pride of place opposite the green on Criffel Street and is much loved and admired by residents and visitors alike.

To commemorate this wonderful milestone, we are planning a year of celebrations. These will begin with a service led by the Bishop of Carlisle, the Right

In schools there are no cleaners or janitors the pupils clean everything- the floors, toilets etc.

It is considered bad form to eat in the street. Restaurants tend to close quite early but bars stay open late. The Japanese never jaywalk even at 3am and no traffic in sight they wait for the green man.

In restaurants the food was marvellous and the staff really helpful, in one on their second visit the waitress had tried to translate the menu and where she wasn't sure had drawn pictures. In Japan it is considered an insult to tip. The costs of eating out were similar to eating out in Carlisle, Glasgow or Edinburgh.

All travel they did was via the bullet trains which were also spotless and always spot on time.

As Japan is noted for earthquakes and volcanic activity they had hoped to visit a volcano at Kumanoto but it was too hot on the day they were there. They did witness a small eruption at Kagoshima.

They found the castles fascinating as many had stone bottoms and the upper parts made of wood.

"Our Cozy Creatures is an Exotic Animal Rescue that has been recently launched in Silloth.

Founded by Liam Tanner, 23 and Sophie Hillary, 24, the rescue service was set up to help provide a sanctuary to all kinds of exotic animals in their time of need.

The pair started taking in animals with help and advice from Boos Mobile Zoo in 2018 and have recently decided to launch to the public as a rescue and adoption service. Liam said: "Caring for these animals is a huge part of our lives and we absolutely love it. We really felt like now was the right time to launch a public service and do our absolute best to help creatures all across Cumbria."

They have already managed to rescue a number of creatures and most recently, they've had two Yellow-Bellied Sliders handed over to them. "When they arrived, they were in a tank far too small without any of the specialist lighting or heating they required.

Since then, we've upgraded their tank, their filter, given them specialist lighting and heating and we've even changed their diet from dried food to fresh. This is all thanks to the generous donations from the public. They've really come out of their shell! Pardon the pun!".

They also have a resident rescue Škunk, Niffler, who you can see when out for walkies on the Green every few days, weather dependent of course! If you see Niffler on his walks, the pair are always happy to stop and have a chat or even let you grab a quick snap of the happy Skunk.

# In Memory of Arthur

#### Arthur's story...

On the 25th June 2019, Arthur was five weeks old. We were bathing him and found a lump in his leg. We went to A&E at Carlisle and got quickly transferred to the RVI, where I handed my baby over, leaving him for the first time, with an anaesthetist for a biopsy. We then had to wait a week for results and our worst fears came true.

Arthur was diagnosed with Ewing's Sarcoma of the soft tissue, he's the youngest they'd ever seen with this. We had to pack up our little lives and move into the RVI.

Throughout this time he's caught numerous infection, had an unimaginable amount of scans/ test, he was oxygen dependent for six weeks, had life changing surgery and he's had an unbelievable 91 doses of chemotherapy. However, he's handled it all incredibly well, amazing doctors and consultant with how well he's recovered between rounds. The lump was 100% dead when removed and he only lost part of his quadricep in the process, when they thought it could have been it all.

Arthur was the smallest patient the surgeon had ever operated on, it went textbook and he avoided intensive care. He's been extremely poorly at times, but he's absolutely smashed it.

#### Update...

To write this breaks my heart, where is the justice? On Wednesday we got the news that Arthur's scans were clear! Amazing! However he really wasn't feeling great, so we went to hospital on Thursday night and had a CT on his head. Only to find out he had a huge mass in his brain. Something that no one seen coming and it was unexplainable.

A lot went on in a short space of time and reality still hasn't hit but unfortunately, yesterday, he fell asleep forever lying with, and holding his mammy and his daddy's hands and with family around us.

At 10 months and 1 day old this is beyond heart breaking, words can't say how I feel, my heart isn't whole and my head and body ache. He fought one of the hardest battles known to man and came out fighting, but sadly his tiny, perfect body couldn't take anymore.

He was amazing, incredible, unbelievable! His smile was infectious and he was the cutest. loveliest, most beautiful, best



behaved baby ever.

He was perfect, clearly far to perfect for this bitterly, cruel world.

#### How You Can Help...

Without their help and support it would have been a very difficult journey. We want to help as many other families as possible to ensure their journey is as positive as it can be. As well as these charities we will be donating money to the special care baby unit (SCBU) where Arthur started his life.

On 25th May Adam Pearson completed a 26 mile walk (around the Marsh four times) to help raise funds for these charities



He completed the walk wearing a mask respirator (I use for building work etc,) and also carrying his supplies in a rucksack as well as a football to raffle off to raise that little bit extra.





OK. Can you tell me who that person was?'

'I'm not able to tell you that. That is confidential information.' 'Right. Um... so ....

But you do need to be tested within the next 72 hours. So can I just get the best mailing address so

# Groyne Markers Repaired

On the tranquil Sunday morning of 14th June, lads from Shane Taylor welding contractors and Maryport Groundworks arrived in Silloth to repair the groyne marker, just off the slipway outside the RNLI lifeboat station. The marker had lost its triangular top earlier in the year, due to the bad weather and rough seas that we have experienced.

The current sea defences were initially put in place nearly forty years ago, although the artificial defence of the shoreline in Silloth and Skinburness which includes the groynes, commenced at the beginning of the twentieth century.

Contrary to appearances the triangular green top to the groyne markers are extremely heavy. The old marker top had previously been retrieved by members of the Silloth RNLI lifeboat crew, along with another marker closer to Skinburness. The company from Maryport were then able to use these old markers to reconstruct the replacements.

In order to remove the pole from the old marker so that the

# Clap for carers came to Silloth

An image of clapping hands to support the NHS, has been projected onto Silloth RNLI lifeboat station main doors.

The projection was based on a photograph of the artist Ian Berry's hands, which was taken by his six year old son Elliot. It was first beamed onto a building near to his home in London but has since

been all over the country, including onto the Angel of the North, the sculpture by Anthony Gormley near the A1 at Gateshead, as well as the Theatre By The Lake in Keswick, amongst others.

The projection was done unbeknownst to most people in the town. Clapping for all NHS workers began on 26th March and the weekly clap ended on 28th May after ten weeks.

new one could be attached, they had to get all their cutting gear over to the groyne. This particular area is renowned for the mud and sediment that is brought to the coastline by the tide. Therefore access is extremely difficult. Wooden bog matting had to be placed on the mud, in order to allow the digger to cross to the groyne marker - this was done by using 10 boards laid down, crossing them and then retrieving the boards from behind and placing them in front again. Returning from the groyne - this process was done in reverse. This operation could only be done at low tide obviously. Once across, oxyacetylene cutting equipment was used to remove the top section of the marker, there

were eight barnacle encrusted bolts that had to be removed. The digger was then used to pull the top free from the rest of the marker, after which it made its way back to the

Both contractors returned the following day to install the new steel 20 feet groyne marker. After making their way across the mud, they attempted to attach the marker, however they encountered a series of problems which meant they had to leave and return at a later date. It required the design of an ingenious piece of equipment which Shane Taylor Welding invented, that attached to the digger, which could then be used to lift the marker onto the triangular base. They returned to

# Silloth Rescue at **Port Carlisle**

Silloth RNLI lifeboat was paged at 22:26 on Thursday 16th July, tasked to attend two persons trapped on the old harbour wall at Port Carlisle, where they had been cut off by the incoming tide.

The lifeboat was launched at 22:34, Burgh Coastguard were also in attendance. The lifeboat quickly arrived on scene and located the casualties. With skill and determination, the senior helmsman Steve Henderson was able to manoeuvre the boat close enough to be able to rescue the two stranded people safely onto the lifeboat. This task was made

considerably more difficult due to the submerged structure of the old quay under the sea along with the fact that it was pitch black and there was an ebbing tide.

Having given the casualties all the necessary safety equipment and covid-19 protection, the RNLI lifeboat made its way back to Silloth lifeboat station, arriving at 23:45. Apart from the fact that the two casualties were very wet from their attempts to walk back to the shore before calling the emergency services, they were safe and well.

The lifeboat and equipment were cleaned down, sanitised and made ready for service again by

Silloth a few days later to fit it, this time everything went according to plan. The digger made light work of the job, the pole with the triangular marker was attached to the new piece of equipment and lifted up to the waiting flange on the tripod section. The bolts were tightened and the pole and marker have now been fully restored. The contractors returned to Silloth on 24th June to repair the second groyne marker at Skinburness. The sea was like glass, the sun shining

and there was no wind, ideal conditions in which to work and get the job completed quickly. A very successful outcome to the extremely dangerous situation of the broken groyne markers. A big thank you to Trevor Hurst, Building Surveyor of Allerdale Borough Council for a very rapid response to sorting the issue, also thank you to Shane Taylor Welding and Maryport Groundworks Landscaping Company for their professionalism and expertise.

# 999's Silent Solution

If you are in an abusive relationship and need help but can't speak without getting caught you can still contact the Police through the emergency service's Silent Solution option. Silent Solution allows those in danger and on the phone to the Police to remain silent while the Police track your phone's location and send help.

Simply call 999 and when the operator answering does not get a response you will be automatically transferred to the Police's emergency line. You may be prompted to dial 55 or cough as a sign of understanding. The longer you stay on the phone the more accurately the Police can locate your address and get officers out to help you. Your location can be tracked whether you are on mobile or landline. This is an emergency solution and should only be used if speaking will put you in danger.

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall, said: "We have seen a rise in domestic abuse reports since the covid-19 lockdown came in to place and we know that there are people in Cumbria who could be in serious danger from their partner. The Silent Solution is the most helpful option for anyone trapped with their abuser and is terrified of being caught speaking to the Police. I want this message to be perfectly clear: you do not have to stay in the house with your abuser - the Police will help you leave and get you to a safe location. If you are in immediate danger please call 999 and use the Silent Solution. Please report domestic abuse to the police, your report will be taken seriously. If you do not want Police involvement, you can contact Victim Support in Cumbria for advice on 0300 303 0157, Monday to Friday, 8am to 6pm or through their 24/7 live chat at www.victimsupport.org.uk."



take part it what turned out to be a fantastic event.



# An Eventful Six Months at Silloth Dock





It's developed into a year of contrasts for local shipping enthusiasts. The beginning of the year saw very few ships at the port, and it wasn't until March that the number increased to normal levels. However, during the month the seriousness of the pandemic forced the authorities to take the unprecedented step of instructing us all to 'stay at 'home'. Seafarers were designated as 'key workers' enabling trade to continue at the port. This highlighted the importance to the food chain of the agricultural materials handled at Silloth. All of this was bad news for photographers who just wanted to get out to pursue their hobby. Instead, they could only follow shipping movements on websites at home.

Recalling the early months of the year, there had been some notable visitors. RODAU was the first arrival of March after a seven-day sailing from the Moroccan port of Jorf Lasfar with a cargo of fertiliser. The ship was no stranger to Silloth having last visited two years ago. She belongs to the fleet of German operator 'Strahlmann' whose ships always appear

well-maintained. It was a glorious Spring morning for the arrival with ideal conditions for photography. Ships from this distant port are rarely seen and eagerly anticipated by local enthusiasts. More cargos may be expected in the future as the fertiliser plant at Jorf Lasfar has been expanded to become the largest production unit in the world

Sadly, just as we were confined to barracks in late March, the rate of ship arrivals increased. Ship spotting excursions couldn't be justified and, to add to the frustration, many of the ships were new to the port. After weeks of inactivity it was a relief to have restrictions eased to allow us out to exercise - with our cameras at hand naturally. The shore at Silloth made an ideal location for taking the air, with the additional benefit of watching passing ships. The idea caught on and with the continuing fine weather there was no shortage of interested onlookers watching

ship arrivals, while respecting social distancing of course.

It was good to have our freedom reinstated allowing us to capture some ship movements on camera. SEA HUNTER was a good example. It was a bright afternoon to follow her departure as she powered away into the Solway before heading south to pick up her next cargo at Shoreham. The ship had arrived just twenty-four hours earlier with fertiliser from Antwerp. The ship is operated by 'Gillie & Blair,' a small UK company based in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. The company was formed over a century ago and has its roots in trading coal; today it operates a fleet of eight coasters across northern Europe.

The appearance of RONJA in early June heralded the arrival of the largest ship of the year so far. The 4,500 ton vessel was carrying a cargo of wood pulp from Portugal. The material is used locally for manufacturing food packaging film.

The ship made an impressive sight as she slipped into Marshall Dock at high water. Those waiting with cameras were rewarded with some dramatic close-up shots, while the seamen at bow and stern were greeted with waves from excited youngsters. The ship was soon entering New Dock where she manoeuvred towards her berth. Unusually, it was almost an hour before she was brought alongside and tied up. This indicated her bow thrusters, used to assist turning in tight locations, may have been faulty. The sight of the pilot and crew on the bridge wearing protective face coverings was a timely reminder that the deadly virus was still out there

March was a good month for the port, back up to normal as far as shipping goes, with our old faithful Zapadnyy shouldering her way back into Silloth and the return of



the Mekhanik Pustoshnyy (not very manoeuvrable either!) Figures were back to normal after our very poor performance in February, we have cleared the silt from the entrance to Marshall dock, which is making it significantly easier to approach the port. Towards the end of the Month we went into lock down along with the rest of the country, however as we are designated key workers (or should that be Quay workers?) We continue to work, but in a more restricted way, with none of our staff being on site together unless a ship is arriving or departing.

Many locals will have noted some of the Ship's crew walking about town during this time, please be aware that they are possibly the most safe people to be out and about, having been cooped up on a ship for months on end with very little contact with the world, they are just like us, suffering from long periods (up to nine months on board) without any chance of flights home so please keep in mind that they need fresh air, somewhere to stretch their legs and also need some supplies and creature comforts from the shops.

All ships crews have also been given status of Key workers, however we are now asking of them that if they need supplies, ask their agent to have them delivered and if they need exercise, they can access the beach without going on public land.

We had four vessels calling into Silloth during **April** all carrying Fertiliser. We didn't quite reach our target for the month, but only by a few hundred tonnes.

We are hoping that under the current conditions that all the local farmers out there are having additional help at home in that their children are around as well and not at school, I know my neighbours are very busy with lambing, cattle feeding, grass cutting, planting and many other activities, which, normally I wouldn't see so much of, but working part time from home and part in the office allows me to see much more of what the local community goes through.

The Swallows finally returned April 14th and have started their rituals and re-inhabiting the barns and loft spaces, crows have attacked my chimney again and left me with half a tonne of sticks to clear from the pot!

So, will shipping continue? Whilst we mainly import fertiliser and molasses at the moment, grain for the mill has slackened right off. One of the prime obligations of the port is to remain open for all shipping and at present we have been able to do so without too many changes to our routines. We are looking forward to seeing a change in traffic in the next month or so as the world goes back to work.

Well done to all those in the local area that have continued to provide all the little necessities of life especially fresh milk for our morning cuppa.

I am led to believe that one of our local nurses has had the dreaded virus and come through it and is now back at work and we send our thanks to her and her colleagues for looking after those who contract this nasty bug.

We are still here, still open and helping to keep Britain trading, in whatever form that will now take moving forward.

The port has had a good month in **May** with six vessel calls, three fishing vessels and a visit from the Furness Abbey, who carried out some dock levelling, this has gained us around 0.5m of additional draft these ship to

for vessels visiting Silloth.

All the vessels calling have visited us previously and all calls were expedited in a timely manner, unfortunately we had a slight bump with the Tanja coming in as the tide seemed to want to come in a lot later than usual hence we hit the

South breakwater, damage wasn't

too bad and she sailed as normal.

Overall we are still down on last years numbers, primarily due to a zero call month in February and the loss of our French Grain imports for the mill. We are hoping that the Mill finds new opportunities for us in the coming months and we get a few ship loads in for

As with everything else going on in the world, Port of Silloth remains open, the port running as normal (almost) with us working slightly differently we can achieve the same results without too many issues on distancing or contact with others.

The vessels calling here, have mostly travelled long distances and as long as no symptoms have been evident, we are very confident that none of

these ship types would be carriers of Covid-19.

Each vessel declares healthy prior to arrival and the previous ten ports too so we know where they have been and that they are clear of any infections.

The month of **June** was a fairly bland month, four vessels and almost hit target volumes. The weather provided a few issues for us with strong winds over some of our arrivals and departures, however with a little effort we have managed to maintain our schedule and get all vessels in on time. Wood pulp arrived early in the month on the Ronja, with a few bits falling off

the wagons through town we had a message from the town council to ask us to cover the wagons. Wood pulp is biodegradable, so any remaining pieces around the area would disintegrate and cause no environmental problems. The Pulp was for three separate companies, as far apart as Barrow and Kendal and one in the east of the country. We are now hoping to have a busy July, although this is traditionally one of the quieter months.

We took German wheat for the second time this year and are hoping for an uplift in this product later as the UK harvest is not looking too good at the moment.



# Seagulls Win Lottery with Sport England!

Silloth A.F.C in Allerdale has been awarded £1,000 of National Lottery funding from Sport England's Community Emergency Fund towards the renovation of the changing rooms during the on-going Covid-19 pandemic.

In response, on March 31st Sport England announced a £195m package to help the sport and physical activity sector through Covid-19. Within the package is a £20m Community Emergency Fund, of National Lottery money to deliver immediate

funding to those who have a role in supporting the nation to be active but are experiencing shortterm financial hardship or the ceasing of operations due to the impact of coronavirus.

The grant will allow Silloth A.F.C. to eventually carry out a complete overhaul of the Changing Rooms and to be able to pay team insurance, league fees and pay for new equipment, as the cancellation of the R&T Tours in April and May have taken a considerable chunk of revenue from the

Tim Hollingsworth, Sport England's Chief Executive, said: "As the body responsible for the growth

of sport and physical activity participation, we want the vital grassroots organisations that make sport and physical

activity happen in this country to not just to come through this crisis but to be in a position to thrive again in the future. The £20m Community Emergency fund, made possible by National Lottery players is part of a multimillion pound package of support we are providing to ease the pressure on a huge number of the organisations who are central to the nation's health and wellbeing. We are proud to be able to provide vital funding to Silloth A.F.C. to help it through these extremely challenging times."

Club Vice Chairman Eli 'Bomber 'Baty is doing the presenting.




# Are You Shopping Online?

Almost 34% of all retail sales during May 2020 were carried out online, and new research suggests that only 16% of UK consumers intend to return to their old shopping habits post-lockdown.

Action Fraud, the UK's national reporting centre for fraud and cyber crime, received over 16,000 reports relating to online shopping and auction fraud during

the lockdown, with losses totalling over

Members of the public have reported buying mobile phones (19%), vehicles (22%), electronics (10%) such as games consoles, AirPods and MacBooks, and footwear (4%) on sites such as eBay (18%), Facebook (18%), Gumtree (10%) and Depop (6%), only to have the items never arrive.
