# **Caring Colleagues**



At any one time 1 in 7 people who work, will also be caring for someone. Trying to juggle caring responsibilities and work life can be difficult, as a result 1 in 5 carers give up work to care full time.

Employers can help carers continue to work by ensuring they know of available support services and sharing information on carers rights. One way to accomplish this is by training workplace "Carers Champions".

What are Carers Champions?

A Carers Champion is an employee who can act as a voice for unpaid carers in the workplace. Through training they will: • gain an understanding of what

it means to be a carer

 identify the signs of someone who, perhaps unknowingly, is an unpaid carer

• become aware of the stresses and strains a working carer can

face.

• learn how to assist carers in taking the first steps to seek help and support

Giving your employees access to someone with these skills could lead to a culture in which they can talk openly about their caring role, responsibilities and any struggles relating to it.

West Cumbria Carers have trained workplace Carers Champions across several local employers including Sellafield, Iggesund, PPM, Kaefer, Morgan Sindall, Franks Portlock, Hertel, LLWR, Inspira, Adult Social Care and the NHS.

# Be A Champion for | Funding for Discharged Patients

Money from the NHS has been made available to support patients leaving hospital through its partnership with local charities.

The NHS Hospital Discharge Support Fund was set up by the NHS in north Cumbria and is held by Cumbria Community Foundation. It will provide financial support of up to £300,000 to the charitable and community sector to help people regain and maintain their independence at home and in the community once they are discharged from hospital.

Age UK West Cumbria, in partnership with Age UK Carlisle & Eden, has been awarded £176,942 to meet the current short-term need of patients leaving hospital with no support from family or friends.

The Well@Home project will provide four weeks of support, including transport, daily welfare calls, home checks, prescription collections, food, and basic supplies.

Jane Mindar, Chief Executive at Age UK West Cumbria, said: "By working together, we will be able to make a real difference to around 700 people between now and the end of March – by getting them home and safely settled into their homes rather than spending more time in hospital

which can be quite distressing for people especially in the run up to Christmas. Additionally we can play a larger part in helping the already stretched NHS reduce its burden and free up beds for those who most need them. NHS staff have proven to be complete heroes during the pandemic, and it will be an honour to help them in a small way during winter to carry on saving lives and helping even more people".

Further funding is available and grants of up to £30,000 will be considered (in exceptional circumstances a higher amount might be considered), which must be fully spent by March 31st next year. The funding aims to support voluntary and community sector interventions which promote positive mental health and wellbeing in the widest sense and for all ages.

Funding should achieve one or more of the following outcomes: increased number of patients supported to return home

• improved discharge experience from NHS and other community based clinical services

• patients supported report a more informed knowledge of the discharge process and support available to them

• people able to regain and



remain independent in their home and community

• reduce the number of delayed discharges

• decreased re-admission rates as patient and/or carer receive additional non-clinical support

• third sector capacity increased to deliver and sustain low-level community-based support

Peter Rooney, Chief Operating Officer for NHS North Cumbria Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "Making sure patients leave hospital in a well-supported and timely way as soon as their medical treatment is complete is vital for lots of reasons. We don't want patients in hospital longer than they need to be, we need to ensure those in hospital are those who have the most acute need, and people should be back in their own familiar surroundings as soon as they are well enough. This is fantastic opportunity to strengthen those really valuable relationships between our health and care services and our third sector partners. Working together will really help both our people and our services here in north Cumbria."

Sarah Farragher, Home First and System Flow Coordinator, said: "We are delighted about this opportunity to work closely with partners to support people to return home from hospital, and enable people to live their most independent lives. We really want to encourage our third sector groups to think about new and innovative bids to this fund so we can support more people across north Cumbria."

Dr Jenny Benson, Director of Programmes & Partnerships Cumbria Community Foundation, said: "As a Community Foundation, we are delighted to be able to support this funding to reach where it is most needed. By supporting valuable NHS and community projects, the fund will ease some of the strain on the NHS".

> Car mechanic and keen amateur photographer Chris Mason is raising funds for the RNLI by visiting every lifeboat station in the UK and Ireland. He came to visit Silloth on Saturday 8th January 2022 before making his way to St Bees.

> RNLI supporter Chris who lives in Cornhill-on-Tweed in the Scottish Borders, was so moved by the bravery and efforts of the lifeboat crews in action on the TV programme 'Saving Lives at Sea, he decided he wanted to do his bit to help support the charity that saves lives at sea and on the water.

After watching Saving Lives at Sea, Chris said: "Some things catch the back of your throat and I thought, 'I'm going to raise the RNLI some money.' I love driving and love the coast so this is a perfect challenge for me. I'm visiting every lifeboat station in the UK and Ireland, including all the islands; Orkney, Shetland the Channel Islands and the Isles of Scilly.

I'm looking forward to meeting the crew at each station and having the chance to thank them for the amazing work they do saving lives at sea."

Chris will take a photo of himself at each station as evidence of his visit and post these on his Facebook page.

Chris started his challenge at Bamburgh Castle in Northumberland, which served as the first lifeboat station in the world after castle trustee Dr John Sharp commissioned the first 'un-immersible' lifeboat for Bamburgh in 1786, making Bamburgh Castle the first known lifeboat station of the time.

The countryside code are Government guidelines that outline the appropriate action of



visitors to respect and protect their local landscape. The code covers actions such as

Leaving property and gates as you originally found them

· Do not block pathways or driveways when parking

• Follow local signs and keep to marked paths unless wider access is available

• Do not interfere or feed livestock as this may cause them harm and give them plenty of space • Take your litter home - leave no

trace of your visit • Do not light fires and only have BBQs where signs say you can · Always keep dogs under control

and in sight and pick up any dog waste Cumbria's Police and Crime

Commissioner, Peter McCall, said: 'We live in a beautiful part of the country that attracts millions of visitors every year but we always need to remain considerate of those who live and work in our rural areas. The Countryside Code is a set of guidelines that allows everyone to enjoy the outdoors while remaining respectful. It's essential that we take care of our county so that everyone can continue to enjoy it and make sure that we are not causing any damage. We also need to remember that many farmers in Cumbria rely on the countryside code to protect their livelihoods. Actions such as leaving a gate open when you found it closed, allowing a dog off of a leash or feeding livestock can cause distress to farm animals and can essentially cost a farmer income.

The message is simple – be respectful and leave things as you found them."



# Do You Know Where to Report Scam Messages?

Fake emails and text messages are a common tactic used by cyber criminals, their goal is often to convince you to click a link. Once clicked, you may be sent to a dodgy website which could download viruses onto your computer, or steal your passwords and personal information.

In order to try and convince you that their messages are legitimate, criminals will pretend to be someone you trust, or from some organisation you trust. This could be your Internet Service Provider (ISP), local council, even a friend in need. And they may contact you by phone call, email or text message.

Reporting suspicious emails:

If you have received an email which you're not quite sure about, you can report it by forwarding the email to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service at: report@

phishing. gov.uk. As of 31st October 2021, the number of suspicious

email reports stands at more than 8,100,000, with the removal of more than 67,000 scams and 124,000 URLs.

Reporting suspicious text messages:

You can report suspicious text messages to your mobile network provider, for free, by forwarding the text to 7726. If you forward a text, your provider can investigate the origin of the text and take action, if found to be malicious. If 7726 doesn't work, you can find out how to report a text message by contacting your provider. (On many Android devices and iPhones, pressing and holding on the message bubble should present the option to forward the message)

# Causewayhead WI

The original name for Silloth arose from the days when the monks at Holme Cultram Abbey stored their grain here, and after many variations arrived at the current way of spelling.

In the early 1800's a canal was built to Carlisle with eight locks, these were prone to silting up and later in the century was drained and used as the railway line.

The introduction of the

railway brought a lot of trippers to the town and at one time there were over 115 separate hotels, lodgings and apartments.

I was surprised to learn that at one time you could sail to Dublin and the Isle of Man from Silloth.

Many of our members were transported down memory lane by the photos, those of us from out of the area learned a lot of interesting facts about the town so a very interesting afternoon for all.

# £18,300 Local Grants

The Hellrigg Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund has been helping to transform local communities. The fund benefits the parishes of Silloth-on-Solway, Holme St Cuthbert's, Holme Low, and Holme Abbey.

Silloth-on-Solway Town Council received £5,000 for Silloth Green's Changing Place project, to provide accessible toilets for the local community and visitors.

Cllr. Carol Doran, Chair of the Accessibility Committee said: "This is brilliant news for Silloth and shows how important this facility is, offering those with disabilities the opportunity to enjoy with confidence the town and indeed the Green. The Accessibility

Committee is delighted to know that they are supported in this endeavour by Cumbria Community Foundation."

Changing Places are more than a standard accessible toilet, they offer additional specialist equipment that meets the needs of people with profound and complex disabilities who cannot use the toilet independently. A Changing Places toilet can give new-found freedom as those with disabilities can stay away from home longer, knowing that they can visit a safe, hygienic bathroom.

Holme Low Parish Projects Group received £10,000 to support the renovation of the old waiting room at Causewayhead Cemetery. There have been complaints from members of the public about the poor condition of the building, which has been allowed to fall into disrepair in recent years and about the lack of any toilet facilities and adequate water supply. The project will restore the former waiting room building, provide accessible toilet facilities and a water supply for people putting flowers on the graves of their loved ones.

Duncan Findlay, Project Group Chairman, said: "On behalf of the project group I would like to thank Hellrigg Wind Farm for the support."

Two further projects also received a financial boost. Silloth Youth Club received £3,000 to provide activities for its young members and Holme St Cuthbert Community Group received £300 to make improvements to Newtown pond.

# Description of the state of the



During the year there was plenty of shipping at the port to keep enthusiasts interested, with a mix of new ships and some old favourites. It was no surprise that 'Wilson Shipping' was well represented with one of its ships visiting every couple of months; the Norwegian company is the largest operator of coasters in Europe. However, as usual, the most regular caller was molasses tanker, ZAPADNYY, with her viscous cargos delivered from bulk storage in Amsterdam and Bremen.

Photographers at Silloth are privileged to get a close-up view of passing ships. What's more, as well as the ships themselves, crews provide interesting subjects, and it's not unusual to get a wave from their positions at the bow and stern when they spot a camera pointed towards them. Most ship movements proceeded without incident but there were some dramatic moments reflecting the challenges when approaching the port. They all illustrated the skill of pilot and crews to steer their vessels through the narrow dock entrance. Here's a look back at some shipping not covered in previous issues.

January got off to a good start with a double-header of arrivals. It's not often two ships enter port on the same tide. The calm conditions were ideal for the arrival of KAPITAN SAKHAROV and STÖRTEBEKER, both first time callers at Silloth. The skill of the pilots was tested to get both ships safely docked within the short tidal window.

KAPITAN SAKHAROV entered first and STÖRTEBEKER was held between the dock gates until the Russian ship was secured at the quayside. The KAPITAN, with a cargo of fertiliser from Belgium was the only Russian ship to visit during the year. Registered in Arkhangelsk in the far north of the country, the ship is unusual in having both its name and port of registry only depicted in Cyrillic script. Two months later, KARION was less fortunate with its timing on arrival from Russia. She was met by stormy conditions off Cumbria and forced to shelter at the Isle of Whithorn for three days.

Photographers gathered to capture the long-awaited arrival of this impressive ship. However, strong winds and a heavy swell caused the ship to drift at the dock entrance preventing it from approaching safely. The pilot waited patiently, but after two attempts to carefully manoeuvre, the ship had to call it a day and head back to Workington anchorage and await the next tide. This was frustrating for all involved, but resulted in some interesting shots for photographers watching the manoeuvres.

The port continued to be busy throughout the year with cargos from distant countries such as timber from Latvia, and fertiliser from Morocco.

The visit of the largest ship was reserved until late December, which hopefully bodes well for 2022.

## December Shipping at the Port of Silloth

A good month overall with six cargo vessels calling at the port and the return of TN Trawlers for the Christmas period. This finished the year well for the port with us being only a small amount down on planned cargo volumes for the year and still in pocket!

Main cargoes were again, as usual for us in this community, all to do with farming, with five fertiliser vessels carrying three different types of fertiliser and our old favourite, the Zapadnyy, arriving with a cargo of Molasses.

The port has seen busier times and looks forward to a more active port over the coming year.

How to support heart health. Lifestyle changes you can make to prevent heart disease and heart failure:

Adopt a healthier lifestyle. • Take regular exercise or staying physically active.

- Stop smoking
- Maintain a healthy weight.

• Reduce and managing stress.

• Adopt a heart healthy diet with fruits and vegetables (heart healthy recipes).

 Control your blood pressure and cholesterol.

- Limit alcohol intake.
- · Adopt a low salt diet.

Lyndsey added: "To test

for heart failure a simple blood test can signify stress to the heart and if it is raised you may require a further test called Echocardiogram. If there are abnormalities found, you will need to be seen by a cardiologist who will discuss the findings and may start medication to help your symptoms."

It is important that heart failure is diagnosed early, so that treatments can be started to help alleviate symptoms and improve prognosis and quality of life.

Heart failure is a chronic disease, which will require lifelong treatment. However, with treatment many people can expect to see improvement in their signs and symptoms of heart failure.
