Silloth RNLI Call-Outs & News



Silloth RNLI lifeboat crew were paged on Tuesday 16th August at 10:18am, tasked to attend to two people seen on the sandbanks off Borron Point on the Scottish coast.

The Coastguard were alerted by a member of the public, who feared for the safety of the walkers due to the strong tides that occur in the Solway Firth.

Due to the lack of water outside the lifeboat station, the crew had to launch the boat from the West Beach, consequently going through the town and Silloth Port.

The RNLI lifeboat launched but not long into the journey towards Scotland, was stood down by the Coastguard, as the two people had successfully made it safely back to shore.

The lifeboat returned to station and was made ready for service again. Silloth RNLI lifeboat crew pagers went off at 6:38pm on Thursday 25th August, tasked to attend a paddleboarder seen off Silloth Port entrance, who had fallen into the sea and was not seen to come up again.

The RNLI crew assembled and were preparing to launch the boat, when the Coastguard alerted them that the paddleboarder was found and was safe and well. The lifeboat crew were stood down at 6:45pm

Silloth RNLI lifeboat was called out at 12:16pm on Monday 12th September to two people cut off by an incoming tide at Burgh by Sands. They were approximately one mile off shore near Redkirk Point. The RNLI lifeboat launched at 12:24pm and quickly made their way up the coast.

Annan, Burgh by Sands and Maryport Coastguard were also involved. Nith Rescue were tasked to launch their boat, which is smaller than the Silloth lifeboat and they were able to take the boat round the coast by land, and launch at a spot closer to the casualties.

Burgh by Sands Coastguard also decided to take their Argocat - an amphibious eight wheeled vehicle. By 12:50pm Silloth lifeboat was struggling to find enough water to carry on, although by this time they had reached Redkirk Point and had spotted the two casualties, although were too far away to speak to them.

The casualties were recovered by the Burgh by Sands Coastguard in the Argocat and Silloth lifeboat was stood down. They returned to station at 2:20pm and made ready again for service.

On Bank Holiday Sunday 28th August the Fundraisers and crew members from the RNLI were thrilled to receive a cheque for £1580 from Beth Lockhart and her family. The family all enjoyed a tour of the boat and boathouse on a beautiful sunny day.

Beth lost her father in February 2021 and wanted to raise money in his memory to support a local charity. He lived nearby with her mother and always enjoyed seeing the lifeboat go out and admired the brave volunteers of the RNLI who risk their lives at sea to keep others safe. Beth took part in her first ultra-marathon, which was an event called 'The Lakeland Trails 55K' around the Lake District, which included 2,000M of ascent. The sponsorship has raised this amazing amount and the RNLI at Silloth are thrilled to receive it. Thank you Beth it was a pleasure to meet you all and thank you personally.

Further thanks to Silloth residents and visitors who came to the Green on Bank Holiday Monday and visited our RNLI Marquee. It was a fun day with the shop sales over £80, bucket donations at £75.21 and the treasure hunt and naming the dog raising £139.60. The winner of the dog was Paul who insisted that the RNLI should keep it and use it for another fund raising event. Thank you Paul for your generosity. Thank you volunteers for manning the stall.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat station would like to thank Richard McDowell and Daniel Anderson for their very generous donation of £500 to Silloth RNLI lifeboat, which they raised by walking 100 kms (about 62 miles).

Altogether they raised a total of about £2,500, which was divided between Workington and Silloth RNLI lifeboats and Maryport Rescue.

The pair walked a circular route - starting at Flimby and taking in places such as Allonby, West Newton, Aspatria, and Workington, eventually returning to Flimby; starting at midnight on Friday 19th August and finishing at 8pm on Saturday 20th August, a total of almost 18.5 hours walking time. The weather started off fine but forty miles from their target, it rained heavily and made the going tough.

Both men came to Silloth lifeboat station on the morning of Sunday 11th September to present the cheque and were given a tour of the lifeboat and the station.

Energy Rebate Scam

Action Fraud is warning the public about a sharp rise in reports relating to fake emails purporting to be from Ofgem, the independent energy regulator for Great Britain. The emails claim that the recipient is due a rebate payment as part of a government scheme and provides links for the recipient to follow in order to apply for the rebate. The links in the emails lead to malicious websites designed to steal personal

and financial information. Between Monday 22nd August 2022 and Monday 5th September 2022, a total of 1,567 phishing emails related

> to this scam ActionFraud National Fraud & Cyber Crime Reporting Centre

have been

reported via the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS). All the emails display

the email subject header "Claim your bill rebate now".

Offenders are

using the Ofgem brand logo and colours to make the emails look as authentic as possible. However, the emails ask recipients to "apply for an energy bill rebate before September 2020", which is what prompted many recipients to realise the emails weren't genuine.

As Friends of Silloth Green we are keen to promote biodiversity by providing suitable food and habitats for insects and wildlife. We choose pollinator friendly plants, create bug hotels and do not use pesticides or chemicals. Birds are a particular focus and we have created two feeding stations, including ponds, one in the Community Garden and one by the Edwardian Toilets where there is a bench, a pair of binoculars and a bird guide so you can do a bit of bird watching in comfort!

Autumn is the time to think about feeding birds, as well as food they need, water to bathe and drink. Once you have established a feeding routine keep it up as the birds get used to it and it is also important to keep the feeders clean to prevent the spread of disease. Lots more information can be found on the RSPB website.

We have welcomed some new volunteers in recent weeks and we hope they are enjoying working with us. Garden Tips from Friends of Silloth Green

October/November is a good time to sow sweet peas as you will get larger, more robust and earlier flowering plants next year. Sow in root trainers or small pots and leave in a frost free place over winter. Pinch the tips out when they reach about 10cms tall to encourage bushier plants.



Make up an outdoor pot of winter flowering plants for example, winter heather, hardy cyclamen, Christmas rose, winter pansies, Ajuga, dwarf conifer and Carex grasses. All underplanted with your favourite Spring bulbs. This can be placed near the front door for colour and interest throughout the Winter into Spring.

Is Your Chimney Fire Safe?

As autumn approaches. Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service is asking householders to ensure their chimney is fire safe. Chimney Fire Safety Week aims to reduce chimney fires by raising awareness of safe chimney use, including the importance of ensuring that chimneys are swept regularly, kept clean and appropriate quality fuel is used. Efficient sweeping prevents chimney damage, and, in worse cases, household fires. Un-swept chimneys can also lead to gases from the fire not being removed properly and can lead to Carbon Monoxide poisoning.

With the number of people using open fires increasing, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service recommend these top tips to keep you safe from chimney fires: • Have your chimney swept regularly by a Certified Sweep before the colder months set in and you begin to use your fire again. • Always keep chimneys, flues and appliances clean and well maintained. Chimneys that have been lined still require regular sweeping.

• Never interrupt the air supply by blocking air vents.

• Should a fire start, a working smoke alarm can give you the early warning. Have at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home and test them weekly.

As well as a smoke alarm on each level, each room that has a solid fuel burning appliance should have a working carbon monoxide alarm.
Always use a fire guard to protect

against flying sparks. • Don't store wood to close to fires, radiated heat can cause a fire. • Ensure the open fire is fully extinguished before going to bed or leaving the house. Never leave a

fire unattended. Don't keep this advice to yourself - pass it on. Is there anyone you can help to organise a sweep or test their alarms?

Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service's Group Manager for Prevention, Angela Opie explains: "Although we are experiencing warmer weather at the moment, the colder winter months will soon be upon us, and more people will begin using open fires and their chimneys again. To keep you and your family safe from fire and carbon monoxide poisoning you need to take necessary steps to ensure your chimney is safe to use

again. So, let's prepare for the winter months and ensure your chimney is clean and safe to use. Sweeping your chimney up to twice a year and using a quality assured fuel is the key to fire prevention."

Sweeping frequency recommendations: • Smokeless coals - at

least once a year • Wood - up to four times a year

Record Sailing of 3,800 Miles to Silloth

General cargo vessel RHODANUS had spent 18 days at sea sailing from the Romanian port of Constanta in the Black Sea, which is a new source of fertiliser for the port.

At 90 metre in length, RHODANUS is typical of the size of ship calling at Silloth. A little research suggested the unusual name derives from the ancient Greek for the River Rhone. The sailing from Romania took the ship the full length of the Mediterranean with a brief stop at Gibraltar to refuel, a total distance of 3,800 miles.

RHODANUS arrived off Silloth on the early morning tide. The ship made a well-timed approach and entry to the dock at high water. It was 7am, and with low light and cloud cover, photographers struggled to get good quality images. As the ship approached the outer dock, the owner's name 'West-Trade' could be seen across the wheelhouse. The German company operates a fleet of seven similar sized vessels.

Cargo was unloaded the following day and the ship made ready to sail on the evening tide, giving photographers a second chance to record the visit. The ship was observed squeezing through the dock entrance as it made its exit, illuminated by the setting sun. Crew were positioned at their lookout stations as the ship powered away into the Solway, while the master gave a farewell blast on the horn.

Following this first visit to Silloth, the ship's next stop would be Teignmouth to load cargo for Morocco. This unassuming little ship certainly has a busy life sailing a wide variety of routes.

August was a fairly good month for the port of Silloth with five commercial vessels, three fishing boats in for repairs/holidays, the sailing vessel La Malouine en-route to Annan for a courtesy visit and to drop off crew and also the Furness Abbey visiting again to look at Buoy maintenance.

Top of the list for the port this month was two shipments of Clinker Ash for the concrete block manufacturing process, an unexpected delivery of French wheat for the mill was a nice surprise and has boosted our income a little. Our old favourite Zapadnyy popped in again with some molasses and another parcel of fertiliser was also most welcome.

Other port matters are the ongoing issue of parking on ABP land, this has been tentatively agreed to be moved and made more formal by leasing a piece of land to the local town. This has not yet been confirmed, so we will update when this has happened. In addition, Natural England, in conjunction with Cumbria County Council and the government have provisionally agreed to create a public right of way across the land to the south of the port as part of the Coastal Access project for a footpath around the UK/England coast.

The MV Elise had a bit of a bumpy arrival, stopping to collect shells on the beach for a few hours, however she re-floated without further incident on the following tide and entered the port to discharge her cargo.

Silloth FC moved to their present Eden Street headquarters in 1954 away from their old ground at Bank Ends, West Silloth (where Stanwix Park now stands).

The most historic match in the clubs history took place two years later.

In the mid 1950's regular European football was a mere pipe dream.

The first European Cup fixture in England took place at Maine Road Manchester in October 1956 (Manchester United v RSC Anderlecht which Manchester United won 10-0).

Prior to this less than a handful of visionary clubs held one off challenge matches against continental visitors. They were first division giants Arsenal and

Wolverhampton together with Carlisle League Division 2 (West) minnows Silloth Football Club!

In 1953 Wolves had met Racing Club (Argentina) and Budapest Honved a year later.

The Gunners had entertained both Zurich

Grasshoppers and Spartak Moscow in 1954. Silloth's claim to fame arrived in late September 1956 when they staged the first international club match in the

county. Earlier that month the MS 'Tirian' (Registered Vigo, Spain) was held up in the Port of Silloth due to technical problems. The crew took to kicking a football around the Playing Field to help alleviate their boredom. Silloths' committee picked up on this and a friendly was hastily arranged, the seamen being billed as Los Espanoles (The Spaniards).

The local rag at the time "The Carlisle Journal' whetted appetites with a preview. Interest was further whipped up by the widespread rumour that all the Spaniards would play barefooted (they didn't). And so, on a cool cloudy mid-week autumn evening the "Tirian XI' ran out before a bumper Eden Street crowd - and straight into the history books, becoming the first Spanish Club side to play on English soil.

The post match celebrations saw the Spanish visitors sample the dubious delights of State Management mild and bitters (they both looked like medicine and tasted much the same if you really want to know).

The Silloth victors wrestled gamely with the intricacy of vino drinking from the

Porron.

Six months later in April 1957 another bunch of Spanish hopefuls rolled up at Old Trafford, Real Madrid becoming only the second Spanish Club side to play on English soil. The 'Tirian' crew had beaten them to the punch!

Detractors may criticise the gap in status and ability of the teams and they may have a point. But this would be unfair to Real Madrid who showed a lot of promise and went on to a bright future.

The "Tirians" in contrast literally sailed off from local fame to European obscurity. This may all change however as a copy of this article has been sent to the Sports Editor of "Faro De Vigo", Vigo's local newspaper.

Again some may accuse the club of being too liberal with the stardust sprinkling, but in its own little, localised way the match was an early step towards the huge, vampire European conglomerate in place today.

Silloths match took place in natural conditions, possibly making it the very first daylight continental club clash in England.

Once again, many may scoff but none could disprove the claim.

Goalkeeper Ken Johnston was Silloth's youngest player. Ken was a sixth former at Wigton Grammar School and also turned out for the town rugby side, and played full back for Cumbria school rugby union team. The son of local Headmaster Bill Johnston, Ken was one of the last school boys to be conscripted. He sat his 'A' Levels prior to two years National Service in the Army, before qualifying as a teacher at Ponteland College over on the North East.
