Solway Rural Initiative Ltd. (SRI) has received funding to install wireless broadband into five locations and then across North Allerdale. The whole scheme is a major step forward for businesses and communications in the area.

Solway Rural Broadband offers fast Internet access, quick data transfer with an "always connected" service for a single fixed monthly fee. No telephone is needed. Because the scheme does not rely on telephone links, broadband connections will now be installed to the towns of Aspatria, Maryport, Silloth and Wigton. Links to villages and surrounding areas such as Kirkbride and Ireby will quickly follow depending on how fast users sign up to the new scheme. Only 60 users are needed per town or 20 per village. The faster these numbers are achieved, the quicker broadband can be made available.

SRI, "a not for profit" regeneration company, already has over 300 registrations of interest. The first wireless broadband centre will be established at Aspatria, home of SRI's economic regeneration unit. Maryport, Silloth, Wigton and Kirkbride will follow soon after. The whole operation will be installed, controlled and then

serviced by local firms and SRI's specialist staff.

Businesses involved in SRI's SolwayPages directory had asked why no one was looking at helping the area get broadband. None of the local towns had at that time even been set a trigger level by BT. Support for a pilot scheme was formally granted by the NWDA's North West Broadband Fund at the beginning of July. Formal bid tenders were sent to suppliers across the UK and as far as Norway with the first service due to commence in September.

UCB at Wigton have already supported the scheme by allowing the community broadband equipment to be mounted on one of their tall buildings. This will enable broadband services to be supplied far beyond the scope of BT's ADSL telephone broadband.
