Off Road Bikes & the Law

On 4th April, officers on foot patrol in Maryport were getting the run around by an off road bike driving antisocially. Officers caught up with it on Camp Street while still on foot and seized the bike.

Rider is off to court for no insurance, no tax and no MOT.

While quad bikes, threewheeled bikes, trail bikes and some other two-wheeled vehicles are built for off-road use, it is against the law to ride them in public parks or on publicly-owned land without permission from the local authority. As with unlicensed powered vehicles, these can only be used on private roads or land



Those involved could face a fine of up to £100 and three points on their licence if dealt with at the roadside. The vehicle would also be



seized. The riders may be banned from driving altogether as offences such as dangerous driving will be considered, along with driving otherwise than in accordance with a licence and driving with no insurance.

Online gaming is one of the most popular online pastimes for children - and it has both positive and negative aspects.

Many online games have multiple benefits for kids, but you and your child need to be aware of how to keep it safe.

• Developing qualities such as strategic thinking, rationalisation, problem solving and persistence.

- Supporting development of a wide range of cognitive and motor skills. • Encouraging creativity.

• Teaching both teamwork and competitiveness, in the case of many multi-player games.

• Socialising with friends.

• Learning the value of money and spending it wisely.

All of these qualities are vital not only in gaming but also in equipping our young people for life ahead of them. Gaming can also equip children to understand and embrace the latest technology and its benefits.

What do you - as a parent - need to do?



It is very important that you understand and support your child's interest in online gaming. Like many parents, you may have little or no interest in it yourself - but there are things you can do to both encourage them to find the best games as well as helping them avoid the negative aspects.

You may even start gaming yourself and find a new hobby.



What are the risks?

Risks to children who play games online arise largely from the vast number of people both in the UK

and abroad who are also playing and the fact that they are not playing face-to-face. These include:

• Playing games with an inappropriate age rating, potentially exposing them to violent, sexual or other unsuitable content.

Dolly Partons' Connection to Silloth part 2

The song "I Will Always Love You" would go on to be a worldwide hit several times. Up until Whitney Houston recorded it, Dolly has achieved the status of a hit for the track twice. The musical arrangement had been slightly altered in the 1982 version which was made for the film she did with Burt Reynolds– "The Best Little Whorehouse In Texas. This version gave the song a pop injection and was received well with the audience and fans alike.

The split from Porter Wagoner came and went and Dolly moved into a Solo career. 1977 saw the massive hit "Here You Come Again" hit the airwaves with an ultra pop country sound. Some fans and people within the music industry were critical of Dolly saying that they felt she was abandoning her country roots. In quick fire response Dolly said "I'm not leaving country behind – I'm Taking it with me". As she said

in one of the live performances "If it's coming from the heart...it's from the country|".

You see, Dolly Parton wanted to and felt she needed to branch out to different audiences. Country music always was, and still is, her most favourite music of all. Some of this country-pop cross over material was superb. There was a string of cross-over successes after "Here You Come Again" -"Two Doors Down, Heartbreaker, You're the Only One and But You Know I Love You". The 1977 release "New Harvest First Gathering" is one of the best pieces of work Dolly has produced. This and "Here You Come Again" made the cross-over a success. As Dolly said of "Here You Come Again -"It's such a good song that even a monkey could sing it - well here you are, looking at a million dollar monkey".

The early 80's saw Dolly move into the world of movie acting. The country music luminary had been head hunted for the movie "9 to 5". Dolly would star alongside Dabney Coleman, Jane Fonda and the huge stateside star Lilly Tomlin. 9 to 5 was a smash hit at the box office and has continued to be successful ever since. Dolly had, in recent years, delivered us "9 to 5 The Musical" which can still be seen in places around the world today. The song itself, "9 to 5" was written and recorded by Miss Parton for the movie. It's a favourite to this day with radio listeners and although it took a good many vears for RCA to release the dance version it indeed was eventually released to the club scene.

Dolly at this time was subject to the good old rumour mill. Apparently, she was lesbian, had many affairs, was really a man dressed up as a woman, and lots of other stories. There was speculation that she'd had an affair with longtime music partner "Porter Wagoner". When asked "Did you and porter ever have sex?" She said "Yes, many times – but never with each other!". Dolly was happily married to the only man for her – Carl Dean. A long and successful marriage that continues to this day.

Over the years Dolly has felt it important to reinvent herself. This was often achieved by changing management and record label. Dolly had been with RCA music for a long time and just on the horizon was an opportunity to be signed with Columbia Records. Fine work in the form of "White Limozeen, Eagle When She Flies and the highly acclaimed "Slow Dancing with the Moon came our way. The latter 1993 album had a fantastic track list and featured some of the world's biggest country music stars. Just for indulgence's sake the most favourite track of mine from that album was the title track "Slow Dancing With The Moon".

The 80's and 90's period for Dolly Parton was in the main successful. Indeed there were many high times. Also, some lows.

Although the 1982 movie "The Best Little Whorehouse In Texas" was fairly successful, it had been a journey of stress for Dolly. Much turmoil had troubled the film and massive changes in staff across the production were a regular occurrence. Being a sensitive and empathetic person – Dolly picked up on all the bad vibes. However, the film was eventually completed and became fairly successful. It has a cult-like following to this day. The original motion picture sound



track album is a firm hit with Dolly's ardent fans.

In 1984 Sylvester Stallone partnered up with Dolly for the movie "Rhinestone. A disaster at the box office. However, the music was something else. Dolly had written some of her best ever music to be featured in the film. "One Emotion After Another, Tennessee Homesick Blues, What A Heartache and of course God Won't Get You" all came from the sound track to the movie. Fans will affirm to this day that these are "diamonds in a rhinestone world" set of songs.

RNLI Kept Busy

The RNLI has released its rescue figures for 2023, which show that lifeboats launched 9,192 times across the UK and Ireland, 447 of which were in the North West.

In Merseyside, Lancashire, Cumbria and the Isle of Man, volunteer lifeboat crews at 16 lifeboat stations around the coast launched 447 times in 2023 – an increase of 13% compared to the previous year, saving 22 lives.

The charity is now putting out its own Mayday call as it faces yet another busy year ahead.

Jo Partner, Head of Region for the RNLI in the North West, says: 'Summer is our busiest time of year, with thousands of people at risk of getting into danger by the water. Having recently marked the RNLI's 200th anniversary, we're putting out our call for help to raise the funds which will help keep our lifesaving service going today and into the future.

As a charity we rely on the support and generosity of the public to take part in events like the Mayday Mile and raise the funds that allow us to be there when we're needed most.

Whether you choose to walk, jog, hop or skip, a mile every day in May will help raise vital funds for RNLI lifesavers, so that they can continue to keep people safe at sea.

Jo added: 'It's clear from these new figures that demand for our services remains high, with our lifesaving volunteers dropping everything to run to the lifeboat station when the call comes. Every penny raised through our amazing supporters' Mayday Miles will go towards ensuring we are ready whenever the call for help comes in.

Good News for Landowners, **Refuse Charges Scrapped**



Households no longer have to pay to get rid of small-scale DIY waste at council recycling centres, boosting recycling and making it easier for people to dispose of their waste in a responsible manner.

The Government has abolished the fees which around one-third of local authorities previously charged to dispose of DIY waste at household waste recycling centres (HWRC's). All councils in England will now treat DIY waste the same as other household waste when it meets certain conditions, such as not exceeding 2 x 50L rubble bags. This change has the potential to save households hundreds of pounds, with charges that were up to £10 an item, such as a piece of plasterboard, now scrapped.

Today's changes are the latest in a string of Government reforms to make it simpler and easier to recycle. That includes a consultation launched last week to make it easier to recycle household electrical items and simpler household collection rules announced in October. The DIY

waste changes came into force as of 31st December Cumberland Council

plans to amend legislation.

Recycling Minister Robbie Moore said: "We have delivered on our promise to make it easier and cheaper for people making home improvements to get rid of their waste properly. Removing charges for DIY waste at council recycling centres will help New Year home improvement projects become a reality and ensure that those disposing of waste responsibly aren't being penalised for doing so".

The removal of the fees is part of the wider Government aim to tackle waste crime and flytipping, which is estimated to cost the economy £924m per year in England. Among other measures, last year the Government announced grants totalling £775,000 to help councils roll out a range of projects to crack down on fly-tipping, with an additional £1m for grants being made available this



vear.

The Government has also

consulted on reforming the waste carrier, broker, dealer regime and on introducing mandatory digital waste tracking and is developing a fly-tipping toolkit with the National Fly-Tipping Prevention Group to help spread best practice on tackling the issue among local authorities. The toolkit is being extended to raise awareness of waste duty of care among householders and businesses. Elsewhere, the Government has increased the maximum fines for fly-tipping, littering and graffiti, while concurrently ringfencing of the proceeds from those related fixed penalty notices so that fines can be reinvested back into enforcement and local clean-up activities.

Friends of Silloth Green Garden with Raised Beds



In recent years we have all seen or even employed the concept of gardening in a bed that is raised up higher than the surrounding ground. The reasons for this are many fold. Gardeners come in all shapes, sizes, ages and abilities and raised beds are a way of overcoming some of life's difficulties by bringing the planting area closer to hand. Everyone will have seen the raised beds on the Community Garden and realised how convenient it is to see, smell and touch the plants as well as making it easier for us, the volunteer gardeners with our various limitations, to plant and maintain them. The beauty of raised beds is you can control the type of growing medium you use. For example if your surrounding soil is too heavy and stony to grow carrots, which like a stone free, light sandy growing medium you can manipulate the soil in your raised bed to suit. Also, the beds warm up quicker in Spring so you can get sowing earlier!

Probably not as familiar are the raised beds we have created on the Friends of the Green allotment. On the allotment we have a serious flooding issue every winter and it is hoped that by building raised beds the upper level of compost will dry more quickly and enable planting to take place earlier than if the beds were at ground level.

Growing in raised beds does come with issues. The soil dries out more quickly during the summer. Nutrients drain away at a much faster rate so need replenishing and the soil structure, the fibre









and humus, needs regular seasonal upgrading just like we need to do with potted plants. Last Autumn we emptied all the old stale compost out of our raised beds on the Community Garden and replaced it with new compost and Spring bulbs.

The design and size of raised bed is a personal decision, the only advise would be make sure you can reach at least half way across the bed from either side. What you use to construct your raised bed depends on what materials are available and personal ingenuity.

We would like to thank everyone who has supported Friends of Silloth Green over the last year.

The Re-Birth of the Much Loved Silloth Lockheed Hudson Bomber Flying Over The Green

The model Lockheed Hudson on The Green at Silloth has become somewhat of a tourist attraction of its own. The original metal model installed a few years ago suffered all the blasts of wind, rain and seaspray which gradually attacked its paint and skin.

When it came to me just before Christmas it had been sand blasted ready for repair. The answer this time was to encapsulate the Hudson in fibreglass to try and give it a more robust future. In the process it was possible to also put an underside on the fuselage and wings as the original was a fairly simple design that lacked these elements.

In painting the model, I researched the correct colours and the model depicts a Lockheed Hudson of 1 (Coastal Command) OTU which was based at Silloth. Interestingly, the enthusiast might notice that squadron code letters are missing – it would seem the unit did not paint these on. Although the model looks new, it retains the shape and dimensions of the earlier model and all credit should go to the original builders. In the refurbishment it was possible to also paint on representations of the glass panels on the nose and the side windows. These remind us that the Lockheed Hudson was originally developed from a pre-war civil airliner.

It has been a pleasure to have been involved in this project. As a teenager I spent many hours wandering around our local airfields and finding pieces of aircraft and items left behind after the war. Silloth plays its part in nurturing my life-time interest in aircraft.

The Hudson project is a little smaller than some of my recent enterprises. Some readers might recognize me as the man who built a full-sized Spitfire in his garden near Carlisle. The Hudson although less familiar in the eyes of the public than more 'famous' aircraft, is an important part of our local heritage.

Crime Down By 8.4%

Cumbria Constabulary has cut crime in the county by more than eight per cent -with the dedication and work of officers and staff producing some of the best results recorded.

Offences that cause real concern in communities including burglary, violence, public disorder and criminal damage to property are all down significantly.

Arrests, stop-searches and offences resulting in a positive outcome such as a charge have all gone up.

Other results include:

96.5% of 999 calls were answered in 10 seconds during February.

Convictions in domestic abuse cases heard at court sat at 85.7% in November – the latest figure available. This is above the national average

Convictions in cases involving violence against women and girls heard at court sat at 81.3% in November - the third best in the country.

The results follow a range of measures brought in over the last eighteen months to improve the service to the public.

These include:

The launch of a rural crime team, dedicated to tackling rural offences.

The continued rollout of community beat officers, who have proved crucial in tackling issues such as anti-social behaviour.

The launch of a new, dedicated roads policing unit - made as part of a commitment to making Cumbria's roads safer for all. A force restructure and

increased focus on issues such as meeting response times. Chief Constable Rob Carden

said: "Cumbria is currently one of the top performing forces in the country and this is due to the hard work and professionalism of our officers and staff who are doing their utmost to deliver an outstanding policing service to keep Cumbria safe. I am extremely proud of what the force is achieving, and I am delighted with the improvements we have achieved in key areas such as proactivity, response to calls, standards of investigation, victim care and criminal justice outcomes.

Arrests are going up and key crimes that cause some of the most concern to people, such as burglaries and violence against others, are going down. We are also doing our best to protect vulnerable people, with encouraging results at court in cases involving domestic abuse and violence against women and girls." He added: "One of the key ways

we are going about this is by being more visible in our communities. The continued roll out of

community beat officers as part of the expansion of neighbourhood policing is something I am particularly proud of. This has been at the heart of our success in reducing anti-social behaviour, an issue the public cares about deeply.

I'd like to thank our officers and staff for their ongoing hard work and professionalism; their proactivity and commitment is allowing us to police on the front foot and it is clear that this approach is producing some outstanding results. The most important result in this is that the public of Cumbria are receiving a continually improving service, meaning more suspects are being arrested and crime is going down.

I'd also like to thank the public for continuing to support and engage with the Constabulary, providing the information we need to stop crime happening and keep people safe."

Cumbria's Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall, said: "I am, of course, delighted to see crime reducing across the county as a result of impressive policing and increasing resource. Cumbria has consistently been one of the safest counties to live in across England and Wales and we are determined to keep it that way, together we can make Cumbria an even safer place for evervone."

With an improvement in the weather it was good to see a growing number of ship spotters at the waterfront during the month. The arrival of VERTOM KARIANNE was greeted by a perfect spring morning.

Conditions were ideal to be out with a camera, which was greatly appreciated after a long winter. The cargo vessel was bringing fertiliser from Rouen. It had made previous visits to Silloth but under a different name and ownership.

Sailing from the inland port of Rouen involved an initial 75 mile passage along the twisting River Seine to reach the sea before heading west along the Channel to the Irish Sea. The ship's arrival off Cumbria coincided with stormy weather, as has often been the case this year, and it had to wait for conditions to ease before continuing up to Silloth. With clear visibility across the Solway the passing ship looked a picture as it approached with Criffel as a backdrop. The usual turning manoeuvre off the port was followed by the ship lining up to enter dock at high water. All went smoothly and the ship was soon being secured at the quayside.

KARIANNE is one of a fleet of almost one hundred vessels operated by the Dutch company 'Vertom' Only a few of them carry the Vertom prefix, and these also bear female names, including Marjolin, Odette and Patty. Spotters look forward to seeing more of these at Silloth to add to their lists.

Our featured ship has been seen at Silloth before, but under different ownership as WILSON ASTAKOS. The port of registry of landlocked Luxembourg has remained the same. When logging their photos ship spotters have to be careful about identification as a ship can have several name changes during its lifetime, but one feature that remains constant is a unique identification number which is painted on the stern.

When previously seen at Silloth the ship was probably undergoing transfer of ownership from 'Wilson' to 'Vertom' as features of both company's livery were visible. Who knows, but the same ship may return to Silloth in the future with yet another name, but it can be guaranteed its identification number will remain unchanged.

£6.7m Ticket Fraud

New data released by Action Fraud reveals £6.7 million was lost to ticket fraud last year. (www. actionfraud.police.uk/ticketfraud)

Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a ticket fraud awareness campaign, warning people to be alert to fraudsters trying to catch out people planning for popular and sold-out events. Last year more than 8,700 people reported they had been a victim ticket fraud, with a total of £6.7 million lost. This works out to an average loss of £772 per victim.

How to protect yourself from ticket fraud: Only buy tickets from the venue's box office, the promoter, an official agent or a well-known and reputable ticket exchange site. Avoid paying for tickets by bank transfer, especially if buying from someone unknown. Credit card or payment services such as PayPal give you a better chance of recovering the money if you become a victim of fraud. The password you use for your email account, as well as any other accounts you use to purchase tickets, should be different from all your other passwords. Use three random words to create a

strong and memorable password, and enable 2-step verification (2SV). Be wary of unsolicited emails, texts or adverts offering unbelievably good deals on tickets. Is the vendor a member of Society of Ticket Agents and Retailers (STAR)? If they are, the company has signed up to their strict governing standards. STAR also offers an approved Alternative Dispute Resolution service to help customers with outstanding complaints. For more information visit star.org.uk/buy safe.

Overall March was a good month for the Port of Silloth with five vessels in port, all the cargoes being for Origin Fertilisers and some of them just being part cargoes.

Busy times ahead with most of these vessels on their first call here, just the Wilson Leith being a returning customer.

As most of our local followers will be aware, The Fox Group has formed a new company called FoxJackson Ports and placed an offer for the port along with that of the Port of Fleetwood in to ABP, who have agreed to sell the port subject to approval by the Government. The process can take up to twelve months and so in the near future nothing is likely to change in the running of the port, cargoes arriving or any other routine.

Should the approval process stall, there will be questions to ask and also if the process goes through without any issues, there will still be many questions that people may want to ask. At this time, I am personally unable to answer any questions, however as soon as I know anything that is not commercially sensitive, I will pass it forward so that the local community will know.

FoxJackson have intimated that they would like to meet with the town council and potentially hold a meeting for locals to ask questions should they wish to do so. A new future for the port looms not too far ahead and I for one am looking forward to working with Fox Group and their various teams.
