Anjie Rook, RNLI Associate Director, who is overseeing the RNLI's 200th anniversary programmes, says: 'The RNLI has been saving lives at sea for 200 years thanks to its incredible people – the courageous lifeboat crews and lifeguards who put their own lives at risk to save others; the

dedicated fundraisers who raise the income to power those rescues; the committed volunteers who give their own time in a range of other roles such as giving out water safety advice or helping to run our retail shops and museums, and the staff who provide vital support to our volunteers.

Silloth Green awarded the coveted Green Flag Award

Silloth-on-Solway is celebrating after receiving a Green Flag Award for Silloth Green for the 12th year in succession. Silloth Green at Silloth and Castle Park at Penrith, Distington Hall Crematorium and the cemeteries at Alston and Penrith also received Green Flag Awards.

The news that Silloth Green has achieved the accreditation – the international quality mark for parks and green spaces – is testament to the hard work and dedication of the team that care for the green space so that visitors and residents alike can enjoy it.

Councillor Owen Martin, Mayor of Silloth said: "Once again, the town has been given the prestigious Green Flag Award. This shows the council's continued commitment to maintaining the Green to such a high standard. The maintenance team – Dave, Mark and Peter - are doing a great job of keeping it the jewel in the crown. Alongside the dedication of the marvellous Friends of Silloth Green volunteers who maintain the community garden and woodland area. As with any town, we continue to work on a tight budget, but still strive to maintain excellent standards of work which shows.

Silloth Green is one of the largest village greens in the North of England, boasting spectacular views over the Solway Firth to Criffel and the Caerlaverock Hills in the North, and the Lake District to the South. The Green forms a green link between Silloth's grand Victorian townscape and the sea front promenade, for many years attracting visitors seeking fresh sea air and recreational facilities.

Silloth Green boasts a modern Water Splash Park, a woodland adventure play area and a BMX track. There's also a Pirate Ship Play Area, next to the Water Splash Park, for children aged 0-5 years. Another popular attraction is the 'Big Fella' sculpture created by artist Ray Lonsdale and gifted to the town by a local resident to make people smile. There's also the replica Hudson bomber which has undergone extensive refurbishment this year and returns to its prominent position opposite the RAFA club.

Beautiful oak picnic tables and benches are to be found in various locations, with accessible footpaths linking the various features. Along Criffel Street, some Victorian style lighting was installed, in-keeping with the heritage of the town. The Edwardian ladies' toilets built in 1910 and the spectacular Victorian pagoda overlooking the sea were also sympathetically refurbished in 2012.



The Community Garden, situated on the corner of Criffel Street is cared for by the volunteers of the Friends of Silloth Green. It provides a vibrant entrance to Silloth Green and a pleasant place to sit and watch the world go by. The Bee Garden is situated closer to the sea, with a bee hotel in the middle of a striking display of rose bushes, plants and shrubs which have created a haven for the local bee and butterfly population, again cared for by dedicated volunteers.

Silloth Green plays host to several popular events which draw in crowds of visitors to the town. This year we saw the return of the Silloth Green Day event in May, the Solway Coast Cycling Festival and the Silloth Pride event in June. There was also a new event for the calendar – the Firebird Festival in July, also the Silloth Vintage Rally and Soul on the Green in July, and the Carnival in August, including a visit by Circus Montini. Commenting on Silloth Green's success, Councillor Bill Jefferson, who has accompanied the judges on every Green Flag visit said: "I am delighted we have been awarded the Green Flag again, at a time when we have lost a complete layer of local government and funding. The Green Flag is always a rigorous and thorough examination of our work, and we rely more than ever on ourselves. We are blessed with an excellent town team led by Wendy and a dedicated group of volunteers. There have been significant improvements noted yet again in this mystery shopper year and we can all feel rightly proud of our town."

Councillor Melanie Irving, Chair of the Parks and Play Equipment Committee added: "Fantastic news once again to receive the Green Flag Award. Our volunteers from Friends of the Green and our maintenance team work tirelessly every year in keeping the Green and community gardens looking beautiful throughout the year.

Do You Keep Birds?

In England and Wales you must register up to 49 poultry or other kept birds by 1st October 2024. This includes any birds you keep as pets.

You're breaking the law if you do not register.

You do not need to register psittaciformes or passeriformes (such as budgies, parrots, cockatiels and finches) if they are both:

- fully housed in a dwelling (your home or another indoor structure)
- kept indoors at all times with no

By registering:

- the Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) will contact you with updates and guidance if there's a disease outbreak (such as bird flu) in your area
- · you'll help prevent the spread of disease and protect all kept birds, including back yard flocks

We'll ask you for:

- · your contact details
- details of the owner of the birds (if this is not you)

- the location where you keep the birds
- · details of the birds you keep (species, number and what you keep them for)

Registration should take about

- Registering 50 or more birds: · It's a legal requirement to register if you are the keeper of 50 or more
- You must register to be a keeper of 50 or more poultry or other captive birds.



Beware of Phishing Scams!

Over 32 million suspicious emails have been reported to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS), with more than a third of all emails reported in the last year, new figures reveal.

The reports have led to more than 329,000 websites addresses being removed by the National Cyber Security Centre. Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, launched a national phishing awareness campaign on 24th June 2024, as reporting reached its highest level since SERS launched. New data shows a rise of 44% yearon-year, with almost 11,611,400 reports made to SERS in 2023, up from 8,074,200 reports in 2022.

Alongside emails, there has also been a huge number of text messages reported to 7726. In

March 2024, more than 60,000 malicious websites were removed as a result of being reported using 7726. This is a free service, offered by mobile network providers, allowing customers to report

We have encouraged anyone who has some form of involvement with the RNLI to participate in this special One Moment for One Crew photographic event, to capture a record of everyone who, at this moment in time, is playing some part in the RNLI's lifesaving work, continuing its legacy and securing its future.

During our 200th anniversary year we have been remembering our past, celebrating the lifesaving service we provide today, and aiming to inspire future generations of lifesavers and supporters. One Moment for One Crew is very much about

celebrating the people of today's RNLI and, we hope, inspiring those future generations who will take the RNLI into its third century of lifesaving.

Following an appeal from Sir William Hillary, who lived on the Isle of Man and witnessed many shipwrecks, the RNLI has continued saving lives at sea throughout the past two centuries. Today, it operates 238 lifeboat stations around the UK and Ireland, including four on the River Thames, and has seasonal lifeguards on 238 lifeguarded beaches around the UK. It designs and builds its own lifeboats and runs domestic and international water safety programmes.





Crime is Down in Cumbria



Cumbria's newly elected Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner, David Allen, welcomes the drop in crime across the county at his Public Accountability Conference (PAC) on Tuesday 16th July 2024.

Between April 2023 and March 2024, crime decreased by 8.3% with 3,227 less crimes recorded, and therefore victims of crime, compared to the same time period last year. When the public has called 999 over the last year, 94.7% of calls were answered within 10 seconds, the national target being 90%. Between April 2023 – March 2024, 95.7% of 101 calls were answered within five minutes.

Positive outcome rates increased to 19.4% from 14.8% in the same time frame. A positive outcome refers to when a criminal has been correctly identified and has faced the appropriate sanction or takes part in a restorative justice programme, if applicable.

Cybercrime fell in the county by 14.5%, Neighbourhood crime vehicle offences, theft, burglary and robbery – decreased by 3.2% with 261 less recorded crimes. Offences involving firearms has almost halved at 46.4% - 13 less offences than the previous year. Cumbria has seen a 6.8% reduction in violence with injury offences, dropping from 4,942 in 22/23 to 4,607 in 23/24. Drug offences increased by 45.6% in 23/24 compared to the previous year. However, positive outcomes reached 80.2%. Sexual offences including rape has decreased, with 123 fewer reports in 23/24 compared to the previous

year. Cumbria also saw a rise in homicides, increasing from one to four. Offences involving knives or sharp weapons also increased in this time frame, with 11 extra reports in 23/24. Cumbria roads have seen a reduction in the number of killed or seriously injured collisions from 294 to 273. Fatal collisions reduced by 27%. Anti-social behaviour (ASB) has decreased by 6.6% with the majority of ASB reports being categorised as nuisance.

Between April 2023 – March 2024, shoplifting offences have increased by 9.9% compared to the same period last year - the positive outcome rate for shoplifting is 36.8%. In the same time frame. possession of weapon offences has increased by 16.2%, with 75 additional offences recorded. Violence against the person has decreased by 8.8%. Arson and criminal damage have also decreased in this period by 13.2% in comparison to last year. Public Order Offences dropped from 4,702 to 3,337 – a 29% decrease. Domestic abuse between April 2023 - March 2024 decreased by 7.3% compared to the same time period last year with a positive outcome rate of 12.9%. Hate crimes reduced from 917 to 668. Violence against women and girls dropped from 9,378 to 7,797 – a 16.9% reduction.

Drug offences have increased and this is a result of Cumbria Constabulary proactively carrying out a greater number of stop searches since the end of 2022.

Cumbria's Police, Fire and

Crime Commissioner, David Allen, said: "This is my first Public Accountability Conference as Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner with Cumbria Constabulary and I am pleased to see that crime has decreased in the county over the last year by 8.3%. Public Accountability Conferences provide me with the opportunity to publicly hold the Constabulary to account over what the public's concerns are around crime and how they are tackling these issues. Anti-social behaviour is an issue that was continuously raised with me during my campaign for PFCC, so it is positive to see that this has decreased over the last year and, with the extra £1m funding to tackle ASB hotspots, I expect these numbers to decrease even further in our next performance PAC. I am the voice of the Cumbrian public within Policing, so I intend to use these public meetings to hold the Chief Constable to account over the concerns of residents. I want to see the Police to continue to improve and be one of the best Constabularies in the country so that we can continue to protect Cumbria's safety. 

Another Look at the First Firebird Festival this July on Silloth Green

After eleven months of relentless planning and unwavering determination,the very first Firebird Festival was launched on Silloth Green on 6th and 7th July, a modestly sized committee of nine members, along with several kind hearted volunteers, managed to organise a great weekend of entertainment and attractions for all the family.

This included an impressive choice of fairground rides including Dodgem Cars, and the biggest Ferris Wheel to ever appear on Silloth Green, and stalls selling various merchandise and catering, including ice cream and a mobile licensed bar adding to the mix.

The main attraction being a variety of great live music for all tastes, which was kicked off by nine year old Caleb H, who lit the fuse for this new event to explode into action with a high octane set of the extraordinarily phenomenal drumming skills he has honed since he was just two years old. 

Not a cut-off lamp-post in sight, mind, the trees were nearly starting to get as bad as ours, you would hardly credit that we are in the same electoral district.


Silloth and the surrounding area always seem to be at the back of the queue when it comes to repairs and maintenance.

"Every day, our Highways teams perform their duties with dedication and professionalism. Unfortunately, some individuals disregard road closures, trying to bypass them or abusing our staff.




This behaviour not only disrupts their work but more importantly, can also pose an unnecessary risks to their safety.



July was a busy month for shipping at the dock, but unfortunately for ship spotters, it was a procession of ships previously seen at Silloth. As these have been featured in earlier issues of the Buzz, it's an opportunity to look back to earlier in the year when two ships from the 'Wilson' fleet made their first call at the port. 'Wilson' ships are seen regularly at Silloth, which is not too surprising as the Norwegian company is the largest operator of European coasters. It has a fleet of more than one hundred ships. Its company motto is 'We Make Europe Smaller.'

WILSON AVEIRO was the first ship to arrive in 2024. It had completed the sailing from the Baltic Sea during the first week of January carrying fertiliser. The ship was built in 2008 and has changed ownership a number of times since then. It joined the 'Wilson' fleet six years ago. Our second featured ship, WILSON DORDRECHT, has had a similar history of ownership changes. Both are of similar design and cargo carrying capacity, and are named after European cities in common with many others of the fleet.

WILSON AVEIRO arrived off Silloth on a typical dull winter morning. The ship made a well-judged approach in calm conditions. The mood of waiting photographers was raised when a smiling crewman gave a wave as the ship passed by. It appears word is spreading amongst mariners that a wave is required upon arrival at the port of Silloth! Photographers were further rewarded when the skies brightened as the ship was being berthed.

WILSON DORDRECHT arrived later in the month during even worse weather conditions so most photographers opted out, deciding to catch it on departure the following day. Outbound for



Ayr the empty ship appeared a little shabby. This was due to ageing of the anti-fouling paint along the hull, a feature of the specialised paint which helps to slow corrosion and the build-up of marine growth. The unsightly appearance is the price paid for an efficient flow of the ship through water. No doubt a visit to dry dock for a fresh coat of paint is due shortly. None of this prevented a crewman from giving an enthusiastic wave from his lookout position as the ship exited the dock.







Celebrating Young Entrepreneurs | Shipping at the Port of Silloth

The achievements of nine young West Cumbrians who set up their own businesses have been celebrated at an event in Whitehaven.

The entrepreneurs, aged between 15 and 25, all took part in the Positive Enterprise programme, an initiative from Cumbria Community Foundation and the Centre for Leadership Performance (CforLP) to help young people go into business.

David Beeby, Chair of Cumbria Community Foundation, presented certificates to all the participants and praised them for their efforts.

What do Your Kids See on the Internet?

With all the time that children seem to spend online, how can you be sure that the young people in your family are safe from the issues they can encounter every day?

Check out these easy-to-follow tips to help your child enjoy a safe and confident experience online

Sit down and talk regularly with your child about their online activities - and get them to show you what they're doing. Keep abreast of new technologies and trends. Talk about the potential negatives, like oversharing, accessing inappropriate content, cyberbullying, stranger danger, uncontrolled spending and being online for too long. Set a good example yourself.

Steer your child towards safe searching, websites and apps. Check what they're watching or sharing on streaming sites like YouTube and TikTok. Encourage them to use child-friendly platforms like YouTube Kids.

Get familiar with new game

and social media trends - especially those attracting negative publicity because they may be violent, encourage gambling or leave the way open for messaging random strangers, enabling potential grooming or other types of coercion.

Don't underestimate the part social media and messaging apps play in your child's life, nor how what they experience online can make them feel, including affecting their wellbeing and mental health.

Gaming, social media, picture and video sharing and many other apps and websites have lower age limits for a reason, so you should make sure your child doesn't access those for which they're underage.

Some more advice . . Discuss and agree boundaries and rules from a young age, including appropriate online usage. Empower your children, but remember they don't have the experience or maturity to always make the right decisions.

> setting up parental control softwareand apps on computers, mobile devices and games consoles, privacy

Consider

features on social networking sites, safety options on search engines and safe location settings on devices and apps. Turn on your ISP's family filters.

For video calls, ensure your child's safety by updating to the platform's latest version, following its safety advice and checking that call invitations and replies can't be seen by anybody outside the agreed call group.

Online gaming is widely recognised as having many developmental benefits for young people, but talk to them about potential negatives like chatting to strangers, in-game purchases, gambling on loot boxes and excessive screen time.

Warn your child about misinformation, disinformation and fake news - and show them examples. Advise them not to believe or share everything they see or read, especially in these days of sponsored 'news' and AI-generated images, videos and text.

Warn your child about confidential information, personal details and images/ video about themselves or others they share in posts, profiles, messages and chats. Consider what you share yourself.

Download apps only from recognised sources like App Store and Google Play. Add your own email address when setting up accounts and apps for your child.

Without being controlling, keep an eye on your child's online activities and know how to recognise the signs of something not being right. For example, criminals have exploited increased online use for recruiting young people into illegal activities such as malware coding, money/drugs muling or extremism.
