

There are over 1,500 different Fair Trade products sold in local shops and now the large Supermarkets also.

Several Towns in Cumbria are now Fair Trade Towns and many shops, cafes and organizations in Wigton use Fair Trade produce. We only need the backing of Wigton Town Council to join them. Allerdale has produced a Fair Trade Directory so you can find which shops or coffee shops sell or use Fair Trade Products, you can support people in Third World Countries.






through the doors, some a to report matters, and others having a look to see what we were doing in the Fire Station. It went well.".

The Garden in Winter

Africa Dances at Holme St. Cuthbert

This is the time of the year for reflecting on the past years garden successes and failures and planning for next season.

So much in our gardens for both good and bad depends on the weather. As I write this article, the sun is enhancing the best autumn colour for many years, roses are in bloom and it is pleasantly warm outside. There are reports of spring flowers blooming in various parts of the country. Yet it is mid November. It has been a strange year weather wise, producing some superb displays and an abundance of fruit, berries and nuts. Spring was bitterly cold, while July, September and October broke temperature records. August was tempestuous, bringing much needed rain.



However regardless of the weather, the shortening day length will ensure that most plants have their winter rest, though some will continue to put on a show until they are knocked back by the frost.

The interest in the garden at this time of the year is much more subtle, but there are a number of plants which come into their own, including many ornamental trees such as Prunus serrula (the Tibetan cherry) and Betula jaquemontii (the white barked Himalayan birch) which have a beautiful bark most noticeable in the winter months, acers, rhubus and dogwoods which are grown for their coloured stems, broad leaved evergreens, some of which flower in winter such as mahonia and viburnums, a variety of blue, gold and green conifers and winter

die leaving a gap or an imbalance, or become too big. Now is the time to think about what needs to be removed and what re planting is necessary. Having decided what needs to go and what can stay, enjoy browsing seed catalogues to find something a little different to grow next season.

Maintenance Check the supports of climbing plants and erect




flowering heathers. Garden art can often be appreciated at this time of the year without the distraction of the summer planting. Notes

Now is the time to take a critical look at the garden and plan for next season. At this time of the year with many plants resting, the skeleton of the garden is revealed and changes can be planned. A well laid structure will enhance any planting scheme. Over time, a plant may on the lawn over winter. If weather conditions are favourable the lawn can be trimmed but keep the blades set high. Don't walk on the lawn if it is frosty as this could leave brown patches.

House plants Many flowering houseplants (Azalias, Poinesettias, Solanums) can be bought at this time of the year, but they have been grown under optimum and artificial conditions to stimulate flowering. Do not expect these plants to be long lived. They often resent being moved to your window ledge and quickly give up the ghost. To give them a chance, always protect a houseplant from the cold on its journey home, read and follow the instructions on the care label, do not keep them behind drawn curtains at night and give azaleas rainwater, not water from the tap.

Enjoy your gardening.



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
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Silloth Rugby Club Youth Training
