Following an order from officials at Allerdale Borough Council, The Rotary Club of Sillothon-Solway is being forced to take down a longstanding sign, welcoming visitors to the seaside holiday town of Silloth on Solway. This is despite Silloth Rotary Club members having paid from their own pockets, the cost of the planning application demanded by the Council. A subsequent appeal to the Council received an equally terse rejection.

This inoffensive, clean and compact sign, displaying the internationally recognised Rotary Club emblem, (a symbol for all that is good and caring in this otherwise troubled world), and the words "Welcome to Silloth-on-Solway", has been mounted alongside a commercial hoarding on the B5302 approaches to Silloth for several years now. Whilst the adjacent commercial advertisement is being allowed to remain in place, the friendly welcoming gesture offered by the Rotary



Activity in the Docks

HMS "Biter", Silloth's affiliated Royal Naval patrol craft will be arriving for a courtesy visit on Sunday 25th March at 5:30pm. She will be open to visitors during Monday 26th March, sailing at 7am on Tuesday 27th March.

The heritage trawler "Jacinta" will be calling at Silloth on Thursday 7th June for a week long visit during which time she will be open to the public. "Jacinta", normally based at Fleetwood, is one of the few remaining examples of Britain's past deep-sea trawling fleet. She spent a lot of time in Icelandic waters, breaking records for tonnages landed during the 1970-1990's, and has now been specially modified to accept public and educational visits.

Unlicensed Taxi Driver

An unlicensed and uninsured taxi driver was fined £200 and received 12 penalty points at West Allerdale Magistrates Court.

At an earlier hearing in December 2006, Robert Tinnion, 45, of Frizington, formerly of Pica Cottages, Pica, pleaded guilty to the charges of driving a hackney carriage when not a licensed driver and without insurance on 24th and 25th April

Mr Tinnion received six penalty points and

Marketing Award Short-list


Allerdale Borough Council's Communications and Marketing Officer, Helen Murphy, has been short-listed for a national marketing award.


Council Website Best in Cumbria

The Garden in Early Spring

The Garden in Early Spring

The days lengthen, daffodils abound, buds burst, plants unfurl and blossom appears on the trees. There is interesting activity in the pond. At this time I always wish I'd planted more bulbs last autumn and vow to get it right for next year. My favourites for March are the small blue and white Chinadoxa luciliae.

Though the weather in March is not likely to be extreme, anything is possible from snow to warm sun. The biggest problems for new tender growth are frost and wind. The beautiful flowers of spring shrubs such as Camellia and Magnolia, may be damaged not so much by the frost itself, but by a sudden thaw caused by the early morning sun.



This causes the cells to rupture and the petals to discolour. For this reason early flowering shrubs are better planted facing west, allowing the frost to melt and evaporate at a less damaging rate.

The other big problem for tender new shoots is strong biting easterly winds. Easterly winds tend to dry and often scorch new growth. This may not be apparent for a couple of weeks but the chances are that distortions on new growth, or brown patches at the ends of

leaves, will be due to a strong easterly. Fleece is probably the best protection during these spells but do peg it down securely.

March notes Planting

Still time to plant bare rooted shrubs, which are often much cheaper than container grown ones.

Lawns

At this time of the year the chances are that the lawn is not looking its best.

o Give it a fairly high cut, then scarify. Scarifying removes the dead grass or thatch and moss. This is best done with a powered scarifier or by a man with calloused hands, as it's hard work using

is quite amazing how much debris can be removed. The lawn will look even worse after this treatment but it will soon make a good recovery.

- o Any compacted areas need to be spiked with a fork. This too is hard work, but well worth the effort.
- o Brush in sharp sand mixed with a little grass seed.
- o It is also worth re shaping the edges of the lawn with a half moon edger. A clear definition to the edge of the lawn makes a big difference to the general appearance of the garden. Slugs and snails enjoy lurking in unclipped grass at the edge of a lawn. The fewer places they have to hide in close proximity to the borders the better!
- o Weeding and feeding is probably best left until April.

Pruning roses There is much debate about both how and when to prune roses.

If you haven't done so already, now is the time to prune all types providing frost is not forecast. Generally speaking you can't go far

wrong if you remove the 3 D's. Dead - Diseased - Damaged, followed by the weak and crossing stems. Apart from climbers and ramblers, cut down the remaining stems by about a third.

When pruning anything always cut to either a bud or a branch.

Other Shrubs

As a guide, if a flowering shrub flowers in the second half of the year, cut it back now to encourage strong new growth which will bear flowers. If it flowers in the first half of the year cut it back after flowering.

Kitchen Garden Time to sow main crop potatoes, tomatoes and onions and other early veg.

Interesting facts Plants Improve Air Quality

A large tree can remove 20 pounds of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere annually, equalling 11,000 miles of car emissions. Landscape plants, including shrubs and turf, remove smoke, dust, and other pollutants from the air. One study showed that 1 acre of trees has the ability to remove 13 tons of particles and gases annually.

Worms

A 200 sq. ft. garden with a low worm population of only 5 worms per cubic foot will be provided with over 35 lbs (about 1/3 lb per worm) of top-grade fertilizer by the worms, each garden year.

Tree Facts

The tallest tree in the world is a redwood in California - it is 112m (367ft) tall. The oldest living tree in the world is another redwood in California which is 12,000 years old. The oldest tree in Britain is a mere youngster at approximately 4,000 years old (the Fortingall Yew in Perthshire).

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Hellrigg Wind Turbines will Tower over Silloth

The SOSAC committee would like to thank the Holme Low Parish Council for organizing the open meeting held in the Golf Hotel Silloth, on February 26th to discuss the proposed Hellrigg development.

It was well attended and a number of speakers brought their various concerns to the meeting. Votes were taken at the close of the meeting, a few abstained from voting and only one person voted in favour of the development. The majority voted the proposal be rejected.

According to the **Cumberland News** on February 9th the Hellrigg development is going to cost £10 million. Would this amount not be better spent around Silloth and District to encourage businesses to generate and create much needed work. After all, these wind turbines are highly subsidised with government money (our money). Let us have a say in how it is spent. This proposed Hellrigg development will not provide work and will



If the tourists should decide not to come vital jobs could be lost

Hopefully, the government will realize that wind power is far from being efficient and stop subsidising it and revise the energy strategy. The money spent on these inefficient monstrosities should be put into research for something that will really work; Tidal, Wave Power or Hydro Electric to try and combat global warming and provide us with reliable power which the country requires to function.

If this development of four Wind Turbines is allowed to proceed it may only be the start. Travel to Workington and see the result. Do not let this beautiful area be blighted

Phil McCavity is our dentist; he is also the village vet, When he's not got his hand up a cow's bottom, It's in your mouth, pulling teeth and making you sweat.


I'm not quite sure about hygiene; he wears long plastic gloves coloured blue, and when he asks you if that feel's better? Sometimes, you want to say: Moo.






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Silloth Tennis Club


