# **Dialect Winners**

During the afternoon of Saturday 9th October, at the Golf Hotel at Silloth, the Rotary Club of Silloth-on-Solway held the 2010 Cumbrian Dialect Competition.

This is an annual event, with free entry for both spectator and contestant, held to promote and sustain the unique dialect of this region. Every year, contestants are asked to present and read to the audience and a panel of judges, an original yarn or piece of poetry.

The three noteworthy judges this year were Lakeland Dialect Society Journal retiring editor Ted Relph, "World's Biggest Liar" John Graham and Silloth Rotary Club president Jim Aird. The Master of Ceremonies for the afternoon was Silloth star of stage and screen, Tim Barker.

After hearing the contestants perform their pieces to a capacity audience, the judges went into hiding to deliberate on the high quality of the entrants. The rest of the assembled throng were served non-alcoholic refreshments courtesy of the Rotary Club. There was a collection during the break and over £80 was raised to help cover expenses with any surplus going to Rotary charities.

On their return to the arena, the judges declared their decisions, and trophies were awarded to the winners in each of the categories.

The overall Winner of "The Best Spoken Dialect" was Colin Armstrong of Harrington, who related a rather amusing anecdote about a particularly annoying dove. The "Most Humorous Story" in a Cumbrian dialect went to competition veteran Pauline Mole, from Silloth, with a tale about computers, the essence of which will have been familiar to many of the audience.

The prize for the "Best Newcomer" this year went to Willie Studholme, from Wigton with a story concerning childhood games.

Last but most definitely not least was the "Under 16" category which went to Miss Abigail O'Reagan from Aspatria, whose piece on the pros & cons of a prospective baby brother or sister raised more than a few laughs from a very receptive audience.

Should you fancy an afternoon of excellent entertainment, might like to make a note that the next "Cumbrian Dialect Competition" will be held at the same venue, on Saturday October 8th, 2011. Local artist Tim Stead entered a competition that was held by the Cromarty History Society to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the birth of famous writer Sir Thomas Urquhart. They wanted an illustrator to illustrate a childrens book that would educate the children of the Black Isle in Scotland.

### 10,000th Grant

The Cumbria **Community Foundation** celebrates its 10,000th grant, to Flookburgh based Bay Search and Rescue to help with training its swift water rescue team. The team was very involved with the rescue activities at Cockermouth in the floods of 12 months ago.

After the latest grant, Gary Parsons, chairman and founding member of Bay Search and Rescue, said: "We're very grateful for the donation and it's difficult to explain how important it is to keep receiving this money for training.

The Foundation, which is based at Dovenby, has been making grants since 1999. With more than 50 separate funds set up which raise money through 160 businesses, 300 individuals

and 30 voluntary groups, the CCF has a vast network which is helping it become one of the county's most prominent trusts.

CCF Director Andy Beeforth said "We want people to know that if they want to give to local good causes then they could do it through the Community Foundation. I think people get a buzz out of giving money through CCF because they know it will make a difference locally."

The CCF has also responded rapidly to disasters such as the Cumbria floods of last year with around £2.8 million being raised, the first million of which was collected in just 10 days. To help distribute the cash, more than 40 volunteers sit on the foundation's grants committees.

### Vehicles on Banks & Beaches

Nature lovers are being asked to help the Solway Coast AONB Partnership, Allerdale Borough Council and Cumbria Police to prevent vandalism destroying parts of the Solway Coast Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

Over the past few weeks, residents and visitors have reported seeing four-wheeldrive cars, quad bikes and motorbikes driving onto the beach and destroying the fragile habitats of the Mawbray Banks Dunes, which are designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest.

Councillor Sam Standage, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive member with responsibility for the Solway Coast AONB, said: "Such acts of mindless vandalism are ruining the enjoyment of the Mawbray Banks Dunes for everyone. This area is supposed to be

a pleasant place for people to relax and appreciate the beauty of wildlife in its natural habitat. To see it being destroyed in this way by a selfish few is just heartbreaking. Tyre tracks have been seen along the front of the dunes near Mawbray, damaging this habitat where specialised plants grow on the shingle shore. The vehicles have also been seen to drive up the front of the sand dunes, which erodes them, and also over the dunes which are the home to the rare and protected Natterjack toad. In the spring, shore birds nest on the shingle beaches and lay their eggs which are completely camouflaged. Vehicles could all too easily drive over these hidden nests and destroy our unique and precious wildlife."

PC Andy Robertson, of North Allerdale Neighbourhood Policing Team said: "We have

listened to the concerns of the local community who have told us through the Safer Stronger Community Meetings that vandalism of Mawbray Banks is something they would like us to focus on so we have stepped up patrols in the area to tackle the issue. We are committed to cracking down on the issues that matter most to our communities so are warning offenders that they will be caught and if necessary their vehicles will be seized under the police reform act. I would urge anyone with information which could help us to get in touch with me or anyone at North Allerdale Neighbourhood Policing Team by calling 0845 33 00 247."

# Don't Miss Out

#### Residents in Allerdale are being reminded to count on their vote ahead of next year's local council elections.

Allerdale Borough Council is urging people to join the electoral register – which not only gives them the right to vote but can also help them get access to everyday financial products such as mobile phone contracts, loans or even mortgages.

The Council sent out Annual Canvass forms in August and, whilst it has already had a good response, more people need to return their electoral registration information if they are to have a voice in the next local council elections, which are to be held on 5th May 2011.

Councillor Chris Garrard, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive member with responsibility for Democratic Services, said: "Many of our residents find they can't get a contract for a new mobile phone or apply for a loan or a mortgage simply because their name's not down on the electoral register. Just because you pay your council tax it doesn't mean you are automatically registered to vote. In fact you could risk a fine of up to £1,000 if you do not respond to the canvass or give false information. So it's worth giving us a quick reply if only to save yourself the hassle in the long run."

In addition, parents sometimes forget that if their children will have turned 18 by the time of the next election, they will also be eligible to vote and should be added onto the registration form.

Councillors from around Allerdale have appeared in an online video to explain to residents just why it is worth taking up their right to join the electoral register and make their vote count.

The video can be seen on the internet at Allerdale Borough Council's website: www.allerdale.gov.uk as well as its YouTube channel: www.youtube.com/user/ allerdalebc or by searching for Allerdale Borough Council's Facebook page.

Residents can make sure they are on the electoral register by checking the form that came through the post. If there are no changes to the information printed on the form, registration can be confirmed via telephone, text or internet. This reduces the cost to the council tax payer, and is better for the environment.

If there are any changes to make, they can be marked on the form and posted back to the Council in the envelope provided. The new register will be published on 1st December.

If a resident misses the electoral registration form for whatever reason and wants to register at any other time in the year, they can pick up a rolling registration form from any of Allerdale Borough Council's offices or download one from its website: www.allerdale.gov. uk. Alternatively, they can ask the Council's Democratic Services team to post a form out to them by telephoning 01900 702550 or emailing elections@allerdale.gov.uk.

# **Heatseekers Vehicles**

An award-winning and revolutionary energy efficiency detector which helped homeowners to pinpoint heat escaping from their homes is set to save Allerdale residents more than £1million in energy costs.

The unique HeatSeekers vehicles - which feature state of the art technology developed by the Energy Saving Partnership - used thermal imaging to identify homes that could benefit from improved insulation.

Allerdale Borough Council supported the initiative - which ran from October 2009 to September 2010 - to help residents cut their household carbon emissions and save on heating bills.

Councillor Margaret Jackson, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive member with responsibility for Housing, said: "As a result of the HeatSeekers scheme 157 homes across Allerdale have been fitted with the recommended

depth of loft insulation and 203 have benefited from having cavity wall insulation installed. These energy saving measures have cut down on carbon emissions in the borough by roughly 249 tonnes per year – working out at a saving of 6,225 tonnes over the next 25 years. In addition, the initiative could give the households involved an estimated combined saving of £46,895 per year on their heating bills - adding up to £1,172,375 over 25 years. Allerdale Borough Council has a vision for a lower carbon future and is seeking to help address climate

the quality of housing, saving energy and reducing carbon emissions. We encourage homeowners to consider the benefits of properly insulating their properties not only can it help to save the environment but it could save them money too."

Operating at night, during the colder months, each HeatSeeker vehicle was able to assess up to 1,000 properties an hour. The thermal imaging technology highlighted where heat was escaping from a property and identified if it would benefit from more insulation

hospitals, housing, roads and emergency services. The 2011 Census is less than five months away. We need to give people help and support to complete and return the census questionnaire and this means recruiting the right people for this important nationwide project."

Sarah Beattie, Allerdale Borough Council's **Democratic Services** Manager, said: "Like all local authorities in England and Wales, Allerdale Borough Council relies on census

population statistics to get the government funding we need for public services. related to how many and what kind of people the census shows live in our area. So even if the census were to end up just a few households short, it could make a very real difference to people's lives. The MAIKE then brought wheat from Rostock and the FLINTERBALTIC brought fertilizer from St. Petersburgh. The BEN VARREY arrived with another cargo of wheat from Liverpool and the MERMERDELEN brought fertilizer from Batumi in the Black Sea. The TAIGETA was next with fertilizer from Gdynia and the CELTIC VOYAGER brought fertilizer from Sfax in North Africa. The WILSON GDNIA

brought a cargo of wood pulp from Antwerp, the tanker ZAPADNYY brought molasses from Dunkirk and finally the SALINE brought fertilizer from Sagunto.
