Mary Peile welcomed two visitors to the June Meeting of the Arthritis Support Group, Pauline Mole and Eileen Barton. Gladys Temple then handed around copies of a leaflet Paul Gibson, Rheumatology Nurse had given her.

Mary then introduced Keith Morley, a clinical hypnotherapist who gave a very interesting talk on the history of hypnotherapy and the difference between a clinical therapist and a stage production of hypnotherapy. On stage the hypnotist is there to entertain the audience while a clinical hypnotherapist is only interested in helping the client. He spoke of how the medical profession refused to believe in the help which can be given to patients until recently but now there are many instances when it has

been proved what a benefit it can be. He did several sessions with members who agreed he had definitely hypnotised them. He pointed out that if you refuse to be hypnotised then there is no way it will work and then did a group session to help everyone relax. Most members agreed they had definitely felt more relaxed but two did not.
