

A Flying Visit to Silloth

A 92 year old Sillothian, Malcolm Wilson, now residing at Barracks Bridge, received a pleasant surprise, when, during September, his eldest son Mark, paid an actual flying visit to the town.

Mark was educated at Silloth Secondary School, and served for 35 years in the fleet air arm, achieving the rank of Chief Petty Officer (Air Mechanic), and serving with 845 squadron in Bosnia and both Gulf Wars.

Thereafter, he joined the Historic Flight of the Fleet Air Arm, now known as Navy Wings and is their assistant Chief Engineer, responsible for the maintenance and restoration of the Historic Naval Aircraft under their care. The Swordfish in the collection being the oldest, and still airworthy example of the type.

The reason for the flight over Cumbria, was due to the fact that Fly Navy were displaying three of their aircrafts at the Ayr International Air Show, a Wasp Helicopter, a Harvard Training Aircraft and a Stinson Reliant Liason Machine. Mark was a passenger in the Reliant and their flight path was directed over Silloth. They overflew Barracks Bridge and performed a circuit of Silloth before heading for Ayr.

On returning to their base at Yeovilton, the Aircraft all had a Malcolm Wilson with Joseph Cork his Great Grandson, Mark Wilson to the left of Malcolm and the rest of the crew

stop-over at Kirkbride. I, along with one of my granddaughter's, her husband and one of my great grandsons, were able to visit them there, and meet Mark with his fellow aviators.

Unfortunately, during the return flight, bad weather was encountered in the Midlands

and they were forced to return to Kirkbride, lodging overnight at Wheyrigg Hall and thereafter, had a good flight to Yeovilton the following day.

Navy Wings have had an active season attending Air Shows almost each weekend between May and October, and perhaps it should be remembered that attending these Air Shows are all done outside of their normal working hours.

Mark and his eldest son
Daniel, are also involved in drag
racing at Santa Pod Raceway,
and are achieving good terminal
speeds in their particular class.
Daniel served in The Royal Tank
Regiment and did tours of duty in
the second Gulf War so naturally
he is the driver, whilst Mark does
the "spannering". The car is of the
slingshot type and named Vintage
Toys and they are members of the
"Wild bunch" clubs.

Keep Silloth Warm I instantly had an abundance of messages offering help and



Once again in December we are remembering & celebrating our loved ones by decorating a memory tree in church. Wooden tags will be hand-made.


Your messages can be added at any time.

Be Wary of Phone Fraudsters

Cumbria Police is urging people to be vigilant to fraudsters after a further incident has been reported after a victim was encouraged to transfer thousands of pounds to criminals in fake police officer

This follows a warning after three other incidents were reported to police of a person pretending to be a police officer to try and gain money.

T/Chief Superintendent Andy Wilkinson said "Police officers will never call you out of the blue requesting to meet to collect cash or ask you to transfer money to an account. Sadly, due to the convincing nature of these criminals' victims have fallen for this scam. In the last two weeks we have had eleven reports of incident to us. I would urge anyone who received a call from someone claiming to be an officer and are unsure if its genuine to hang up and call us on 101 to verify their identity. If you know someone

potentially vulnerable to potential scams please share and remind them of our advice."

Remember: Police officers will never call you out of the blue and request cash or personal information. They'll never ask you to transfer money to another account, hand over cash or bank cards to a courier, or a pay a fine or fee over the phone.

If an officer contacts you in person, they will show you their warrant card. This is proof of their identify and authority.

If someone has called you and you are unsure if they are a genuine police officer, you can hang up and call police on 101 to check their identity.

If you think you have been the victim of a fraud you can report this to police on 101 and to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 - or by visiting their website at www.actionfraud.police.uk.

On the 6th of July 2024 I walked the Yorkshire Three peaks with a group of family and friends raising money and awareness for Prostate Cancer.

This is the second walk I've done for this charity since my own Prostate Cancer diagnosis, last year I walked the Hadrians Wall Path with a couple of my good friends and raised over £6,000, we decided that we wanted to do another walk this year but we were joined by many more of our friends and family.

We walked the Yorkshire

Three Peaks on July 6th, it took us just under 11 hours to complete the three peaks challenge which include Ingleborough (2,372ft), Whernside (2,415ft) and Pen-Y-Ghent (2,277ft).

I am so grateful for the support from my friends and family and for everyone who has kindly donated to us, we raised over £4,100 this year making it over £10,000 raised so far for Prostate Cancer UK.

Prostate Cancer affects so many men and the symptoms

aren't always problematic, so remember get yourselves checked out, a simple blood test is all it takes, I would like to thanks Silloth Doctors, Carlisle and Whitehaven hospital for their ongoing treatment and support.

The lads had such a great time together we have decided to complete another challenge next year so watch this space for our next walk in 2025.

Special thanks to each and everyone of you who took on this year's challenge and for your support personally it means a lot.

Silloth on Solway Golf Course Are Finalists!

Silloth on Solway named one of the best in England, the golf club is delighted to put Silloth 'on the map' after being recognised as one of the best courses in the country.

Silloth on Solway Golf Club has been named a finalist in the England: Course of the Year category at the prestigious Golf Course Awards.

If you believe you've been scammed, contact your bank immediately on a number you know to be correct such as the one on the back of your bank card.





On Saturday 28th September, volunteers from Silloth RNLI gathered along with friends, family and the general public to wave off the Coast to Cobbles times capsule.

Silloth RNLI Lifeboat Station was the starting point for the historic event that is Coast to Cobbles. The event was kicked off with sea shanties sang by the Allonby Ukes. The Atlantic 85 lifeboat, Elaine and Don Wilkinson launched at 10am and gave a great demonstration to those watching from along the shoreline.

Three 'future crew' members (children of current crew) were asked to carry the capsule down the slipway and hand it over to the lifeboat crew. Once the capsule was handed over, one of the volunteer lifeboat crew members gave the youngest future crew member a high five, it was a very special moment.

This action sums up the RNLI's 'One Crew' ethos perfectly, as the little boy is the son of Chris Clark, Helm for Silloth RNLI and Rebecca Clark, Press Officer for Silloth RNLI.





The lifeboat then made its way to Maryport Harbour where it met up with Workington RNLI. Both boats moored up and Silloth lifeboat crew passed the time capsule over to the crew of Workington RNLI.

The time capsule was transported to RNLI stations along the North West via lifeboats before heading to Salford Quays where it will then be displayed for 50 years.

Maximum score was 58. The winner was Rachel Bloomer


and crew with a score of 45. The Frozen Chickens came second with 43 and a consolation prize was awarded to the Walters Gang with 19 points.

Championship judge at the British poultry club annual show in Lincoln, the event took place at the Lincolnshire show ground in October.


It was a well attended show over two days with well over 3,500 birds including poultry, ducks, turkeys and geese also a huge section for the judging of eggs.



Two Familiar Ships Return to Silloth Dock

Silloth recently welcomed the return of two cargo vessels to the port, the SYLVIA and ZAPADNYY.

Ship spotters often keep detailed records of their sightings including dates, names and identification numbers. Several ships are named SYLVIA, however each has a unique identification number to avoid confusion. A search of the records revealed our ship to have visited Silloth ten years ago. In contrast, there is only one ZAPADNYY, a regular at Silloth over many years with cargos of molasses. The tanker was making her second visit of the year after undergoing a major overhaul.

SYLVIA is one of eight ships belonging to the Dutch family business 'Van Dam Shipping'. All of their vessels appear in the same sky blue livery and have girls' names. SYLVIA had loaded her cargo of wheat at the Baltic port of Mukran, uniquely situated on Germany's largest island, Rugen. It was then a six day sailing via the Kiel Canal to reach Silloth. Conditions were bright and sunny on the day of arrival making the ship an ideal subject to photograph. The fully laden vessel was carefully lined up off the port before making

a graceful entry on the midday tide. It was then turned in the dock and brought alongside ready for unloading. The captain and pilot could relax after a job well done.

The weather wasn't quite so kind for the visit of ZAPADNYY. After loading in Amsterdam the



tanker had taken eight days to reach Silloth. The sailing was interrupted by stops in Penzance Bay and off Ramsey, Isle of Man to shelter from rough seas. Even on the day of arrival the tanker was met by foggy conditions in the Solway towards the Scottish hills. Thankfully, visibility improved as the ship approached Silloth, just in time for the assembled photographers to start work. The thirty-six year-old ship looked very smart in its green livery, the paintwork still looking fresh after undergoing repairs in dry-dock earlier this year. With three crew on lookout at the bow and two at the stern giving a wave,



it looked to be a happy ship. Discharging cargo is a very slick operation at Silloth

and twenty-four hours later the ship was ready for departure.

Shipping at the Port of Silloth

Only two vessel calls in September, again another quiet month for Silloth. Our old faithful Zapadnyy back again with more molasses for animal feeds and Sylvia bringing wheat from Vierow in Northern Germany.

We briefly also had a visit from La Malouine, a 30m sail training and private sailing vessel owned by a very pleasant gentleman who lives over in Dumfries so they stopped off here on their way to Annan to await the tide for a quick high water dash over the sand banks and into port on the opposite banks of the Solway Firth. More information on the vessel can be found on BRIGANTINE La Malouine: data, photos, videos, history of the sailing ship (tallshipfan.de) or on their facebook page.

In other news around the port, FoxJackson are still progressing slowly with their Bid and Legal application to acquire the port. I

am led to believe the process has now been moved over to an HRO, a Harbour Revision Order, so that the government can transfer the legalities of port responsibilities from one organisation to the next. I would expect this part of the process to take many months! Possibly a year, however in the past some of these changes have been done quicker, so here's hoping!

September Visitors

Zapadnyy from Amsterdam with a cargo of Molasses then on to Gdansk. Sylvia from Vierow with a cargo of Wheat then on to Aberdeen.

Silloth had another quiet month in October, only two vessel calls, the IMI and the Eastern Vanquish, with Ammonium Nitrate and German Wheat respectively.

Due to some severe weather the dock gate sill seals have been

damaged and as such the gates leak a little more than they should, so these will be repaired in the next few weeks. The mains power cable to the port passes across the dock gate sill from North to South and this also became dislodged during recent hurricane force winds and very rough seas in the port. This has been tied down temporarily and will also be repaired when the gate sill seals are done.

We have a port Stakeholders meeting in November and hope to have our prospective new owners FoxJackson Ports, attend this

Hoping the fertiliser trade picks up soon.
