

Cumberland Hard Hitting Anti-Litter Campaign

Cumberland Council has unveiled a bold new campaign to crack down on littering, with the launch of 'Don't be a TO55 3R take your litter home!

This hard-hitting initiative aims to remind residents and visitors that littering is not only illegal but also anti-social, harmful to the environment and wildlife, and costs thousands of pounds each year to clean up.

While the campaign's striking tagline is designed to grab attention, it is not intended to cause offence—it is a direct call to action to encourage people to take responsibility for their waste.

Cumberland Councillor Denise Rollo, Executive Member for Sustainable, Resilient and Connected Places, said:

"Littering isn't just about rubbish—it's about respecting our community and environment. And while some of the things we find left behind make us do a double take (a single sock? A random glove? Dirty nappies?!), the impact of litter is no laughing matter.

"Every stray piece of rubbish harms our environment and can put Cumberland's hardworking cleanup teams at risk. These dedicated workers brave busy roads to tidy up what shouldn't have been left behind in the first place. "A cleaner, greener Cumberland is in all of our

hands. By simply binning our rubbish, we can protect our beautiful surroundings and make a difference for future generations. This campaign aims to get people thinking about how they discard unwanted items and, hopefully, encourages everyone to take litter home and discard of it correctly."

Inspired by the Keep Britain Tidy movement, the campaign will include posters and signage in public spaces across Cumberland, questioning why people continue to dump their rubbish and urging them to dispose of waste responsibly. The campaign also incorporates social media messaging, using the hashtag #DontBeATO553R, to amplify awareness and encourage community engagement.

As part of the campaign trial, VMS (Variable Message Signs) have been placed on roads across Cumberland, to help the council understand whether stronger, more direct messaging can have an impact on littering behaviour.

The most littered items in parks and public spaces include picnic debris, gas canisters, balloons, glass, disposable barbecues, cans, plastic bottles, and bags of dog waste. By using bold, memorable messaging, the council hopes to spark a shift in public behaviour and reduce littering across Cumberland.

Dancing into Festival Season at Taste Cumbria Wigton



Taste Cumbria is back for 2025 with another great line up of food festivals, family fun and live music.

The first event of the year takes place in Wigton on Saturday 26th April and there's loads of free entertainment for everyone to enjoy.

The centrepiece of the Wigton event takes place on Water Street car park and will feature a producers' market and hot food court, the big music stage, a climbing wall and children's rides. In the neighbouring Market Hall there will be all the family fun including, for the first time, a silent disco. There will also be madcap activities with entertainer Liam Moorhouse, while NADT Youth will be staging loads of art and crafts.

New for this year will also be a competition to create a celebratory flag for Wigton. Details will be announced soon.

Taste Cumbria Wigton will be followed by the Taste of the Sea festival in Maryport on Saturday 9th and Sunday 10th August, before the flagship Taste Cumbria festival in Cockermouth on Saturday 27th and Sunday 28th September then the second Taste Cumbria Carlisle event on Saturday 1st and Sunday 2nd November. Taste Cumbria Christmas on Saturday 6th and Sunday 7th December, also in Cockermouth, will end the year.

The Taste Cumbria food festivals are organised by Cumberland Council. Councillor Anne Quilter, the Council's **Executive Member for Vibrant** and Healthy Places, said: "The Taste Cumbria festivals not only enliven our town and city centres, they bring tens of thousands of visitors and put millions of pounds into the county's economy. "They also showcase some of the best artisan producers in Cumbria, demonstrating the wealth of talent we have in creating amazing food and drink, arts and crafts, and lively entertainment. "I am looking forward to seeing another fabulous year of events."

Bobby Speaks in Parliament

Protect Your Pa\$\$word

Home security doesn't just mean locking your doors and windows - protecting your digital devices with strong passwords is also important to keeping yourself and your personal data safe.

Perhaps you received a new phone or laptop at Christmas, or you want to help keep your family members digitally safe. Creating a strong password doesn't need to be complicated. Using three simple steps, you can protect your devices and digital data...

Create a separate, strong password for your email. Your personal email account contains lots of important information about you and is the gateway to all your other online accounts, including banking, social media and online shopping. If your email account is hacked, all your other passwords can be reset, so it's important to use a strong password for your email, that is different to

all your other

Use 3 random words to build your password. Using three random words is the recommended way of generating passwords, as it's easier to remember and takes trillions of years for a computer algorithm to crack.

Remember to not use obvious words like your surname or the names of your pets!

Use 2 factor or multi-factor authentication on your devices. Two-factor authentication is a free security feature that gives you an extra layer of protection online and stops cyber criminals getting into your accounts - even if they have your password. Two-factor authentication reduces the risk of being hacked by asking you to provide a second factor of information, such as getting a text or code when you log in, to check you are who you say you are.



Silloth Airfield Project

Silloth Tourism Action Group was reformed in May 2024, with the proviso to create a Silloth Military Trail, so that people can be educated and inspired by exploring and appreciating the rich legacy of Military buildings Silloth and surrounding area has with the Armed Forces. This is mainly with the

former RAF Base that has left so much behind and this Trail intends to allow people of all ages to get out and learn about what these structures were used for, some of which fall into the Solway National Landscapes and King Charles III coastal walk.

We hope to get information boards at each location in the



future and install a Hamilton Pickett Fort which we have excavated out of the ground from near the Airfield runway. This is currently being renovated and we hope to have this operating and on display later in the year.

The Trail has been designed by the amazing local talent Anja Gilmartin whose business is known as Tale Trails for which we are massively grateful.

We have produced an initial batch of 250 leaflets and I have passed them round establishments in Silloth and Mawbray. We will produce more leaflets once we have more funding and moved the project on, once planning permission has been approved.

Centenary Celebration 100 years of Dundraw WI

Our regular monthly get together on February 4th saw the Dundraw ladies competing for prizes and trying their luck with a fun game of Bingo!

The first prize in the flower competition went to Mary's dwarf iris which managed to survive storm Eowyn. The challenge to find an unusual, entertaining mechanical device was won by Lesley's beautifully crafted and decorated 'scrap' book with a surprise musical movement within its back cover.

On February 12th, 1925, Mrs Court-Brown and Mrs Mitton formed a WI group in Dundraw, Cumberland.

Their early meetings were held in the Reading Room opposite the church hall on the third Tuesday of each month and presided over by Miss Russell from Waverbridge school.



From their earliest days the women of Dundraw WI enjoyed outings to places such as Southport, Glenridding, Whitley Bay, Castle Howard, and, later, Leith (to see the Royal yacht Britannia). They participated in music festivals and local carnivals becoming an integral art of the local community and connecting with other WI groups across Cumbria.

And so to February 12th,





2025 when today's Dundraw WI gathered to celebrate this landmark centenary of our, still thriving, group. We were joined by the Chair of Cumbria County Federation of WI, Kathleen Bowron, for a delicious lunch, entertainment from the Dundraw players and (comic) madrigal singers, and cake!

Our March meeting saw the ladies of Dundraw WI eyeing up a wonderful array of beautiful jewellery all made by our guest speaker Lesley Connolly.

In a fascinating talk, Lesley described some of the techniques she uses to craft her unique, artisan jewellery. We learned about the types of stones, such as hematite, malachite and the wonderfully exotic cinnabar as well as pearls, amethyst and jade. Of course we'd need beautiful boxes to keep our jewels and Lesley described how she covered the lids in sheet pewter with art and craft type



designs.

Lesley has sourced her stones from as far afield as China and Vietnam but also finds antique fairs and charity shops have recyclable 'gems'. She has made silver necklaces and earrings from spoons and sugar tongs!

Our Dundraw WI knows just how special artisan jewellery can be ... and have some wonderful inspiration for accessorising those special occasion outfits.

Outings with Owls!

The Twitterings is a monthly bird themed column from Jenny Wren and Albert Ross.

This month owls are on our minds after several amazing local encounters Bert and I have had with both Barns Owls and Short-eared Owls. As a nation we love owls. The romance of $% \left\{ 1,2,...,n\right\}$ lying awake at night listening to Tawny owls hooting out in the darkness, or the beautiful ghostly white coloured Barn Owls we catch fleeting sight of as we drive to work along country roads or are out walking as the sun sets or rises. We meet owls early in our lives learning to love them through books and films such as Winnie the Pooh and Harry

Until recently apart from the hooting and those fleeting sightings I had never properly seen an owl in the wild. Now that I know a little bit more about what I am looking for and where and when to look I can see an owl most weeks in the late Autumn, Winter and early spring and I still catch my breath every time it happens. Although I'm still waiting to catch sight of my first Tawny Owl.

The Silloth and Solway Coast

area provides loads of great countryside for watching owls, particularly Barn Owls and Short-eared Owls. Farmland, farm buildings, small patches of woodland and sand dunes are all places they love to nest and hunt for voles, mice and small mammals.

Bert and I are lucky enough to have a regular Barn Owl visitor that hunts in fields at the bottom of our garden or in farmland across the road out front. They arrive as the sun starts to set and look truly beautiful gliding low to the ground hunting for voles and mice. We always keep our eyes peeled on the first night after a period of heavy rain. Owls don't have very weather tight feathers so struggle to hunt in the rain, if they've missed a night or two of hunting, they'll be hungry and keen to get out early and hunt for longer.

We often head off to the beach with binoculars, plenty of layers and a good supply of Tunnocks caramel wafers to try and catch sight of a Shorteared Owl. There is a resident population around the area but like other species these numbers are boosted in the Winter by migrants from Northern

You need to be patient, give yourself an hour or so, but imagine, a view towards Criffel and down the coast, the beautiful pale grasses of the dunes and suddenly flying low the most beautiful owl. A heart shaped face edged with darker feathers, the most dazzling large yellow eyes and a huge wingspan. The owl easily blends into the landscape and if you do too (it doesn't have to be full on camouflage, green or dark clothing works) they can come remarkably close. It's the kind of encounter that will stay with you and bring you back to the beach time and time again.

Owls need time, space and peace to hunt so although we'd be really keen to hear about your owl sightings, please don't give too much detail we don't want to overwhelm these lovely creatures with too many visitors.

Thanks for reading, we'll be back. In the meantime, don't forget to watch the skies, look in hedgerows or just out your kitchen window and see what you can see.

Changes to Waste and **Recycling Collections**

We are making our waste and recycling collections fairer and more efficient.

We are also making it easier for you to recycle.

Garden Waste Collections

From week commencing Monday 31st March 2025 if you have a garden waste bin you will still get one bin collected for free but any additional bins will have a collection charge.

There will be a yearly charge of £40 for each extra garden waste bin.

Collections are fortnightly between March and November.

Residents will be able to make a payment for extra bins on our website or by contacting our customer contact team from week commencing 10th March.

Waste and Recycling Collections

We want to make it easier for you to recycle and also make sure our services are consistent.

Your waste collection is changing from every week to every two weeks from May 2025.

Your glass, cans, tins and plastics recycling will remain the same and will continue being collected every two weeks.

Your cardboard and paper recycling will continue to be collected every four weeks but will increase to every two weeks from September 2025.

Householders will be given the opportunity to request a free replacement 180 litre bin (most residents have a 120-litre bin). Requests can be made on our website or by contacting our customer contact team from April on 0300 373 3730 or go to https:// www.cumberland.gov.uk/bins-



The year started off on a bright note for ship spotters at Silloth with a new visitor to the port. Despite it being an icy cold day there was a good turnout for the arrival of SPANACO FIDELITY. The appearance of the smartlooking vessel was a welcome sight on a sunny January afternoon during the long winter. Conditions were ideal for photography with calm waters and a blue sky. A ship making its maiden call always adds extra interest for enthusiasts.


FIDELITY had sailed

from the warmer climes of Morocco with a cargo of fertiliser. After a week at sea, and having made good progress to reach Silloth, she was delayed by a storm in the Irish Sea. Unable to complete the final leg of the sailing up to Silloth, she was forced to ride out the storm for a further three days. This worked to photographers' advantage as the arrival coincided with a midday tide. The ship was watched as it arrived off the port and adjusted its position in readiness to enter the dock. As high-water time approached,

regular ship spotters were pleased to answer questions posed by new visitors to the waterfront, such as 'is it coming in?' and 'what's it carrying?. After a short wait, their patience was rewarded with a close-up view of the ship entering the dock. All generations were represented, and for one youngster in particular, it may have been a new experience.

Silloth receives regular deliveries of fertiliser from Morocco. The plant at Jorf Lasfar is the largest producer in the world using locally mined feedstock. FIDELITY is typical of the ships used on this route. It was built sixteen years ago and is owned by the Maltese company 'SPANACO.' There are four other ships in their fleet whose names follow a similar theme, such as LOYALTY and RELIABILITY. Our ship was soon being carefully
