Denise Says Slimming Groups are Here To Stay

Shop Front Grants Available!

Cumberland Council is pleased to announce further funding support for the local economy.

Funded by the UK government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) and the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF). Details of how to apply can be found at www.cumberland.gov.uk/ UKSPF

The funding has meant that Cumberland Council is able to extend their successful shop front grants programme which sees improvements to commercial properties within town and city centres across Cumberland.

An additional £105,000 is being made available for 2025-26, applications must be made before the end of August.

This will be the third year Cumberland Council has made capital funding available for this type of grant which brings pride back into our town centres and high streets. So far, more than 100 premises have been upgraded, and 11 vacant units have been brought back into use.

Previous grant recipients have transformed their commercial

premises, such as 16 King Street, Whitehaven and 121 Senhouse Street, Maryport.

Leader of Cumberland Council, Cllr Mark Fryer, said: "The previous grants have proved to be a great success, and we urge businesses to apply for the funding. If you have a commercial high street or town centre property which would benefit from a new look and meets the call criteria, please do get in touch. More information on the fund, guidance notes and how to submit applications is available on our website."

The grants are available for projects that demonstrate alignment and deliverability against the criteria.

Cumberland Council is also working with the Cumbria Business Growth Hub and Enterprising Cumbria to offer grants and business support across Cumberland.

With £200,000 UKSPF and £400,000 REPF funding being

made available, Cumbria Business Growth Hub is again able to offer both business advice and grant funding to small/micro and medium sized businesses.



Have Your Say on a New Political Map for **Cumberland Council**

New boundaries are being proposed for council wards in Cumberland Council.

The Local Government Boundary Commission wants to hear what residents and local organisations think about the proposals.

A ten-week consultation on the proposals will run until 11th August 2025.



The Commission is the independent body that draws these boundaries. It is reviewing Cumberland to make sure councillors will represent about the same number of electors, and that ward arrangements will help the council work effectively.

The Commission has published proposals for changes to Cumberland. It is proposing that there should be 55 singlecouncillor wards across the authority, all but two wards will change.



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

Changes to Waste and Recycling Collections

Cumberland householders can now download, bookmark and print the next four months of waste and recycling collection information.

The collection information is available at www.cumberland.gov. uk/waste/binday

Householders can check the dates for June through to the end of September 2025 by entering their post code and clicking on their home address from the dropdown options. As well as viewing on screen, they can also be printed, saved or bookmarked.

As more changes to collection dates are planned in late September, householders are advised to continue checking their collections as they may be subject to

change. Changes to waste collections in the former Allerdale area are now into their second week and residents are being urged to check their collection dates.

Fortnightly waste collections started on Monday 26th May.

Residents are also being urged to check their updated collection dates at www.cumberland.gov.uk/ waste/binday

The council has received more than 10,500 requests and are continuing to deliver replacement 180 litre bins. We've started the delivery of replacement 180 litre bins. If you have provided an

email address when requesting a replacement bin, you will be contacted a day or a few days before the delivery.

We've had more than 10,500 requests for bins, so if you don't get your replacement bin before the start or beginning of fortnightly collections, carry on using your existing bin and recycle as much as you can. If you can't fit all your waste into your bin, you can put out up to two bags of excess waste.

We can't take orders for replacement 180 litre bins at the moment, but there will be another

chance to order one between Tuesday 1st July and Thursday 31st July.

Due to the large number of requests, they are advising residents that don't get their new bin over the next few weeks to carry on using their existing bin and to recycle as much as they can. If they can't fit all their

waste into the bin, residents can put out up to two bags of excess waste.

Householders may also be eligible for an even larger or extra bin if they have a large household, young children in nappies or your household produces extra waste due to medical needs. Apply at www.cumberland.gov.uk/waste/ largerbin

The sounds of summer in Silloth.

There are many things we love about living in Silloth but the best, the sounds of a Silloth summer. We bet you have your own favourite sounds. Is it the tune of the ice cream van as it drives the streets encouraging children out for a cornet or lolly, perhaps it's the gulls fighting over chips down by the RNLI station, Soul on the Green filling the town with music and visitors or children squealing as they run through the water play area. These sounds are what make Silloth and summer special.

Our favourite sounds are the birds that fill the skies with their unique songs so evocative of this time of year. We particularly love Cuckoos and Skylarks.

Skylarks are with us in the Silloth dunes all year round and although we can hear the male singing right into December, we get their 'top of the pops' tunes over the spring and summer months. Like so much bird behaviour it's all about protecting their home and hunting ground and impressing the ladies. Like the female Skylarks we can't help being drawn in by these little feathered Romeos.

The birds take flight rocketing up into the sky as much as 300 metres (about 1,000ft) on what are called song flights. The birds hover up there effortlessly singing their hearts out for just a few minutes or as much as an hour. Their song is often described as a 'silvery thread of sound', 'liquid warbling, and is a seemingly unending stream of delicate rising and falling notes that rain down around you as you sit, walk or lie in the dunes. Once the bird starts to parachute back down to the ground the magical song stops.

Second in our Top 10 of summer singers is the Cuckoo. We know it's not fancy, it's not pretty and it repeats itself almost as much as the adverts on terrestrial TV, but it just screams at us that summer is really here.

Like Skylarks the Cuckoos two note call is all about finding a mate. It's the males that have the instantly recognisable cuck koo which give the bird its name.

Although many of us will easily recognise the sound of a Cuckoo few of us have seen one. This is partly due to their brief visit to the UK during the spring and summer months; arriving in late April and leaving June or July. In recent years numbers visiting the UK have also fallen drastically.

Did you know that Cuckoos don't build a nest or feed and raise their own young? The female Cuckoo simply lays a single egg in another bird's nest such as a Meadow Pipit or Dunnock. She will go on to do this time after time in other nests over the next few days

Having dropped the egg off, she then totally abandons it. The care of this egg now falls to the poor unsuspecting parent of all the other eggs in the nest. In this horror story things go from bad to worse! Not content with simply 'adopting' a new parent, once all the other eggs have hatched, the Cuckoo chick will push other chicks or eggs out of the nest. The 'new' parent will feed its only baby and even though the Cuckoo chick grows to twice the size of its 'adopted' parent this doesn't raise suspicion or trigger the happy new parent to throw out its unfamiliar looking child.

For nature lovers this behaviour still shocks us every time we read about it. However, even as we think about all those poor frazzled parent birds with a giant chick twice their size to feed, we still feel that thrill when hearing first faint sounds of a Cuckoo and believe summer has truly arrived.

The first photo shows some of the Cyan prints made on the day. In the hustle and bustle of


everyday life, many adults, and more importantly, children, have lost the desire to work with their hands to produce a unique article that is truly theirs.

is to draw a circle then doodle away! Or, the Solway Buzz often has a "picture to colour" on the puzzle page which is ideal for using the Zentangle technique - try doodling within the lines instead of colouring by adding squiggles, dots and lines - and just have fun!

Yet another form of "Creativity" is Eco-Art. This comes from linking ecology with art to encompass seeing, feeling and emotional responses to nature.

It encourages everyone, no matter what age or ability, to look at the world about us. A walk through the forest or a stroll along the beach has always inspired artists and poets. William Wordsworth wrote much about nature and wildlife and was a passionate gardener.

So why not go pick a flower, find a pretty leaf, pebble or twig and start creating!






Some ship arrivals are just a little too early in the morning for us ageing ship spotters. At this time of year with daylight hours increasing, there's often a second chance to see visiting ships if they depart at a more socially acceptable time. This was the case with the general cargo vessel WESTEWIND which arrived over the May Bank Holiday weekend.

Despite the ship being seen at Silloth only two years ago, small coasters of this type have a character which is often missing from larger ships and attracts enthusiasts to photograph them. WESTEWIND has a full Dutch pedigree and is typical of shipping seen in UK waters. It was built in a Dutch shipyard in 2003 and is owned and registered in the Netherlands. The unusual port of registry, Wemeldinge, a challenge for us to pronounce, is the name of a village in the province of Zeeland.

WESTEWIND had arrived with a cargo of salt from the Netherlands which was quickly unloaded allowing departure the following day. In contrast to ship arrivals, the timing of departures can present enthusiasts with a problem. A ship can appear empty and ready to sail but there are factors which come into play which may delay departure. Conditions out at sea are an important consideration as well as whether the ship has orders for its next port of call. Even when everything looks good for a departure, there can be disappointment if the master decides he's simply not going to sail on that tide.


In this instance, WESTEWIND was cooperative and made her exit from the port on a sunny evening. It's always a relief when the pilot is spotted boarding and the crew take up the ship's gangway. With her shallow draught, the ship was able to make an early departure shortly after the dock gates were opened. Despite her modest size, WESTEWIND covers a wide range of northern Europe destinations from her Dutch base, typically as far as the Baltic Sea and Scandinavia. On leaving Silloth she would have a less testing sailing, just the short crossing to Belfast.



New £1 Million Support Fund

Community groups across Cumbria are set to benefit from a new long-term fund established by two of the county's most dedicated civic leaders.

The Matson Ground Fund, founded by Alex and Samantha Scott, will be managed by Cumbria Community Foundation and will distribute £100,000 in grants each year for the next 10 years, creating a total investment of $\pounds 1$ million into charitable activities across the county.


