The purpose of Jim's amazing effort was to raise money for the Rotary

PolioPlus programme for the worldwide eradication of Polio.

Jim swims most days of the week in order to keep fit and regularly does between 20 and 30 lengths but this was rather more of a challenge. However, very keen to get the job done, he made an early start and it was all over within 2 hours 20 mins. Jim has said he wouldn't be too keen on repeating the exercise.

Silloth Rotary Past President Jim also has the unusual distinction of having achieved 100% attendance at the club in his 36 years of being a member and that is a total of 1,892 meetings!

We look forward to seeing you on Friday 27th January.

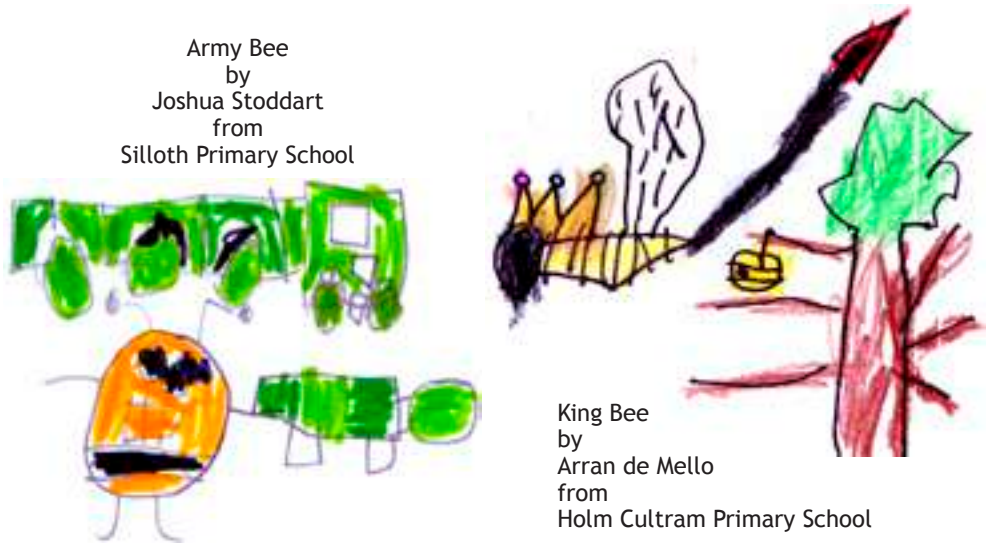
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Val's 35 Years of Service

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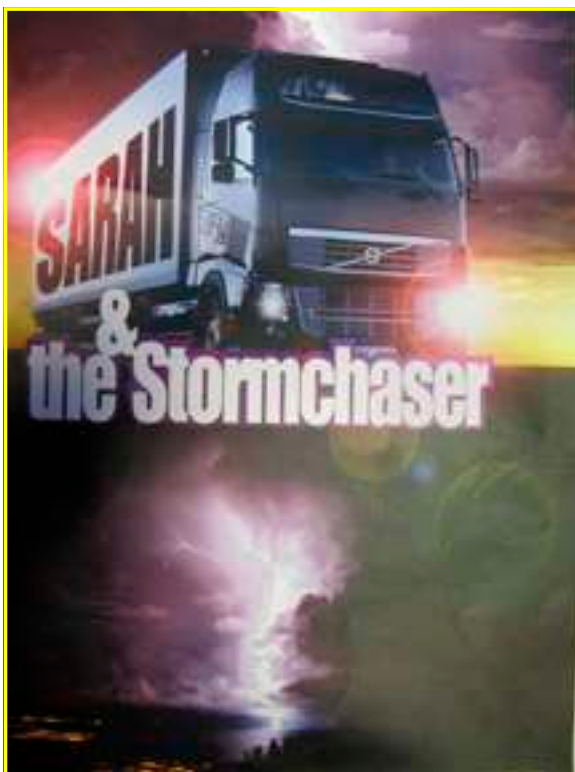
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RNLI Lifejacket Appeal

Volunteer Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) crews in the north of England will receive new state-of-the-art lifejackets in 2012 – and they are appealing for help to raise the £100,000 needed.

Lifeboat crews at the 33 lifeboat stations in the north are due to receive the innovative lifejackets in the coming months, at an average cost of around £3,000 per lifeboat station.

Incorporating the latest material technology, the new lifejackets have been designed by the RNLI and manufacturer Crewsaver specifically to meet the charity's search and rescue requirements and are a far cry from the original cork lifejackets invented by RNLI Inspector Captain Ward in 1854.

To help pay for these vital pieces of kit, the RNLI is appealing for help from the public. The charity will hold its biggest annual fund-raising day - SOS Day – on Friday 27th January and is asking supporters to target their efforts towards buying the new lifejackets. Silloth RNLI Quiz Night is in the Golf Hotel at 7:30pm

Andy Cliff, RNLI Inspector, North, said: "The RNLI's volunteer lifeboat men and women often put themselves in difficult and dangerous situations while rescuing others. To help them carry out their role as safely as possible, we owe it to our crews to provide them with the very best equipment available. However, our charity is only able to do that with the generosity and support of the public, who I hope will do all they can to help us raise the funds needed to give our lifeboat volunteers new lifejackets in 2012."

The new lifejackets will provide a comfortable, secure

fit, leading to increased efficiency and effectiveness in lifesaving. There are two designs, one to be worn on all-weather lifeboats and the other on inshore lifeboats. Crotch straps will prevent the lifejacket riding up over the head when in the water, and an integrated harness, designed to pull the lifejacket away from the wearer's neck, will allow greater freedom of movement during rescues. The lifejacket has zipped pockets for casualty care kit, torches, gloves or knives, and a spray hood to protect against sea spray.

Mr Cliff added: "The RNLI has always endeavoured to advance and improve its safety equipment to keep pace with changing demands and technological developments. Since the middle of the nineteenth century, RNLI lifeboat volunteers have worn a variety of different lifejackets



and the design has evolved continuously from the original cork lifejacket which, in its day, was an innovative piece of kit. One of the early versions famously saved the life of Whitby's Henry Freeman in 1861 when his lifeboat capsized and, as the only member of the crew wearing a lifejacket, he was the sole survivor. These new lifejackets incorporate the best modern technology available.

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Public Meeting on Health Care in West Cumbria

A public meeting which was due to take place on 13 January about health care in West Cumbria has been rearranged to ensure that health bosses can attend to answer questions.

Councillor Alan Smith, Leader of Allerdale Borough Council, and MP's Tony Cunningham and Jamie Reed, agreed to rearrange the planned public meeting to ensure that Dr Neil Goodwin, Interim Chief Executive of North Cumbria University Hospitals, and Sue Page, Chief Executive of NHS Cumbria, will

be present to respond to questions from the public.

Councillor Alan Smith said: "We have tried to be helpful and done our utmost to accommodate the diaries of Dr Goodwin and Ms Page so that they can attend the meeting to answer questions on the quality of health care in West Cumbria. Ms Page has agreed to attend the meeting, accompanied by Dr David Rogers and Dr Fayyaz Chaudhri. However we understand that Dr Goodwin won't attend the meeting as he works part time and Friday is not one of

the days he works.

"Dr Goodwin did offer to meet me privately but it is not just me that needs answers; the people of Allerdale need them too. A public meeting is the ideal opportunity for people to raise their concerns about their local health care and get some answers about the future provision of health services in our area."

The public meeting will now take place at 7pm at the Wave Centre, Maryport on 3 February 2012. The public are invited to attend.

The raffle was drawn and Margaret Crawford and Alice Anthony were the two lucky winners.



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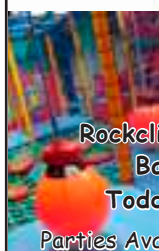
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Look After Your Mind and Body

Silloth RNLI lifeboat station recently received a massive boost to their funds from a local Silloth man and his family.

Keith Millburn of Eden Street, Silloth, together with other truck enthusiasts, organised a sponsored Truck run from John O'Groats to Lands End in July last year.

Keith and the rest of the group set off from John

O'Groats on the 29th July 2011, escorted by a piper and motorcyclists in front of the convoy and arrived in Lands End 5 days later. They stayed at various places en route including Perth, Gretna, Ludlow, Weston-Super-Mare and Sennen Cove. Keith said 'It was an absolutely fantastic trip and I had a smashing time. I am thrilled with the outcome.'

A magnificent amount

of over £12,000 was raised in total from the event, of which half the proceeds went to MacMillan Cancer Care and the other half was split between Silloth and Thurso RNLI lifeboat stations.

A tremendous amount of hard work and effort was put into the organising of this charity truck run and a big thank you must go to Keith from all at Silloth RNLI lifeboat station.

A Seal for Christmas?

On the evening of the 23rd December, Harbour Master Ed Deeley spotted a seal lying on the sand at the dock entrance. On closer inspection it appeared to be injured, so a call to Beacon Veterinary was made.

Local vet Tom Henderson quickly made his way to the port, and after a short chase on foot Tom and Ed had the seal caught. Tom identified it as a pup, having most likely been separated from its mother by the recent storms. It was soon in the back of the vets van and on its way to Aspatria surgery for medical treatment. Tom decided to name it 'Rudolph' and I think staff at Beacon vets deserve a big thank you from 'Rudolph' for giving their time over the Christmas period to feed and treat him!

Rudolph has been referred down to the RSPCA seal rescue centre in Cheshire (strange place for a seal rescue centre?). Tom spoke to the British Marine Diving Rescue charity and they gave him some advice on treatment and approximate age - 3 months

- much too early to be weaned from Mum.

Mr Henderson said: "I've been in continuing correspondence with the RSPCA at Stapely Grange in Cheshire, and it sounds like Rudolph has been feeding well, although it still requires restraining when fed via stomach tubing with a fish puree. They're hoping to get it into well-enough condition to be moved onto a seaside facility where they can prepare it for release into the wild."

Hopefully they'll be able to bottle rear him and then eventually set him free - but you might be able to monitor him on their website.

Mr Henderson added:



"I've been revisiting my exotics handbooks and I was correct when I suggested they're very similar to dogs without legs, as they are particularly susceptible to distemper, one of the viruses which we routinely vaccinate dogs (and ferrets) for. Potentially an infected seal could be contagious to a dog, and vice versa, not that we are suspicious in this case. Most wild seals carry a large worm burden, of which our baby seal seemed to be suffering as well."

Winter Warmth Fund

Cumbria Community Foundation's Winter Warmth Fund has now raised an incredible £163,280 to help people stay warm in the winter.

More than £37,000 has been donated by generous older people who gave part or all of their Winter Fuel Payment to the Government to help others in greater need. The rest came from a successful bid to the Department of Health for a slice of the £20m 'Warm Homes Healthy People Fund'. The bid for the extra Warm Homes Healthy People Fund money was made jointly by the Cumbria Affordable Warmth Partnership which is made up of Cumbria County Council, NHS Cumbria and a number of other voluntary and statutory organisations. This funding can only be used for specific revenue projects that don't overlap with the existing Warm Front project, like refurbishing boilers, social housing, low energy lighting repairs, maintenance, like for like replacement and emergency repairs.

Andy Beeforth, Director of Cumbria Community

Foundation, said: "Our Winter Warmth Fund has grown beyond my wildest expectations thanks to our successful bid for the extra 'one-off' Government money. We'll be able to help more older people than last year. The money donated by individuals and businesses has been set aside just for older people, the rest is open to other vulnerable groups. We're now asking people who meet our criteria to get in touch so we can help them."

How do you apply? Individuals and families can apply for a grant - the aim is to reduce the number of excess winter deaths and numbers of people living in cold homes across Cumbria

You must either:

1. be over 60
2. have at least one child under 5
3. have a chronic underlying health condition, particularly respiratory or coronary, or
4. have a disability particularly affected by cold weather and receive

A Family at War

Well, lets get on with the war, lets pay a visit to Mount Chico this is the name of a small mountain which we of the 1st Infantry Division were ordered to take.

We sat at the bottom of the said feature waiting to make our assault, wondering what was the cause of our sitting there in the pouring rain, when to our complete surprise our stretcher bearers appeared on the scene carrying a headless body to be buried somewhere. Sgt. Pendlebury got a queer shock, I saw the colour drain from his cheeks and I thought to myself there's something going to happen to him. So up the Chico mountain we climbed in the dark wondering what we should find up there. Well, in the dark I managed to find a trench and guess who was standing outside of my trench, a Gerry officer with his men having a right old conflag, how did I know that they were Germans and not our own troops, well because I was so near to them that I could have touched them if I had wanted to and they were talking. How do you say 'yes' in german 'Ja Ja' they were so busy talking that they never gave a thought about me. My slit trench was quite fully armed with Mills bombs (hand grenades) so I just quickly rolled them amongst them, it was a sight to see them bolting like rabbits. Daylight came and we were made aware of the down to earth situation, across the Chico mountain top was a German sniper who was a crack shot. He got a bead on me and bang his bullet pitched in front of my face the dirt from it blinded me, so I shouted to Neeves my comrade in our slit trench to see if he could get a shot at him so he had a try, as a result he was clipped in the head and needed hospital treatment. So stretcher bearers came up, it was during the time when we and the German enemy decided to hold a truce to bury our dead and move our wounded, agreed upon by



I noticed on TV a programme about the film 'War Horse'. My father Bill Todd fought in the 1st World War as a Royal Field Artilleryman using his horses to pull the guns into position. He fought in the Battle of Mons and received a serious head injury which caused him to be blinded for a short period of time. He fought the rest of his war on the Italian front, going under the code name 'Foot-Sloggers', finishing the war in 1947. He returned to Silloth to be employed by Carrs Flour Milling Industries.

both sides.

Sgt. Pendlebury got wounded in his neck, Pte. Reeves a head injury, killed were Sgt Adams and a Private of the Duke of Wellingtons Regiment and other casualties, so the truce went on till almost dark, then all hell opened up.

I was in the slit trench on my own that night when the shelling cooled off a bit. I was listening for any movement when a voice was heard by me, it was a german voice, he was shouting "commerad" so I let our officer know about things and I asked him if he would like me to bring him in. He said yes, so I went for him and another surprise awaited me, in the middle of no mans land I met up with this German soldier and lo and behold he was a 'Square Head', they used to say they were square heads but I never thought I would ever see one. This lad was a proper 'Square Head'. We took him prisoner. For you the war is over, was what the Germans used to say to our troops

who were taken prisoner. I wonder if there is any square head Englishmen?

Next day I met up with our Brigadier, he was crawling on his belly and I was in a forward trench at the time and he speaks to me asking where-about is the enemy? I said "he's there" pointing to a German tin hat about four or five yards from me. The Brigadier said "what am I doing here?" I said "I don't know" but his parting word to me was I'll see you get relieved soon. Away he scuttled over the top of Mt. Chico and he was as good as his word. That's the beauty of having Brigadiers who keep their word.

Getting relieved wasn't as easy as that though. Our troops were sent up to relieve

us and I still hadn't got rid of my German sniper trouble.

Guess what happened! My bren gun which I had whilst taking aim at my enemy sniper jammed, so I saw my Duke of Wellington soldier who was dead had no more use of his gun, so I took it. It became my proudest possession for the rest of the war.

Up those lads came to relieve us, hell, they didn't know what trouble they were getting into, perhaps it's just as well. This young lad crawls in beside me, as he crawled he had his head in the air, of course our sniper foe couldn't let a chance like that pass could he now? He shot him in the head. Well, this was my way of getting out of a tight corner, if I should turn my back on my sniper foe I was a dead, dead man. I'll tell you something honourable about our sniper foe and that was he didn't

fire upon stretcher bearers and that meant my life.

When the young soldier who was sent to relieve me got shot in his head I called the stretcher bearers to carry him out of the line and I helped the bearers to carry him out of the line.

In about that time they said to me that I had been awarded with the Military Medal which I never received. A sad, sad mistake. I wish I had not got to know about it but the war was still being fought and I wasn't sure whether I was going to live through it. So 'san fairy Anne' was my attitude, they can keep their medals. A lot of fighting there was to do and to be done.

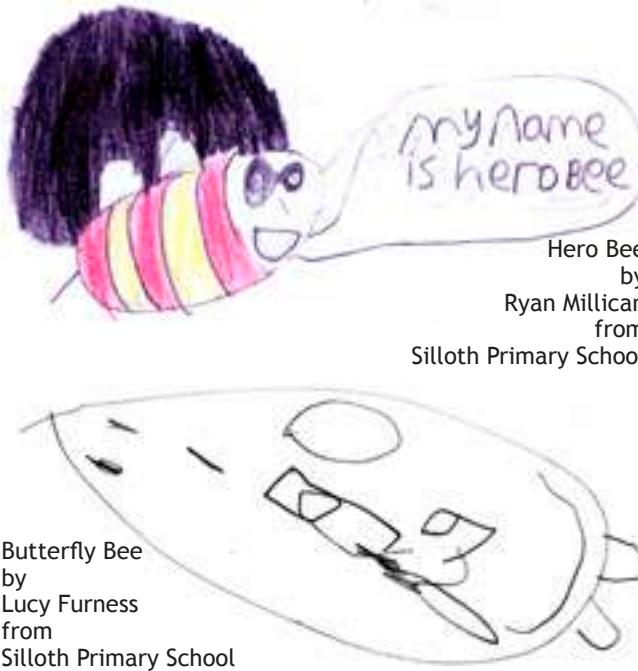
From the Italian campaign to Palestine and wondering if the Burma war

was my next field of battle, but no the big bomb changed all that and so by the year 1947 I was discharged.

So the family at war was over and we were changed into softies today. I think of Afghanistan and our brave young warriors who have paid the highest possible price that mankind can pay.

How many years has this evil madness gone on. Since before my father went to war also my dear mother. There will one day be an end to this evil, when Satan is cast into his pit, his bottomless pit and man will live in peace with his fellow man. When the Lord Jesus christ will show us how to live in peace with each other. Come quickly Lord Jesus we certainly need you.

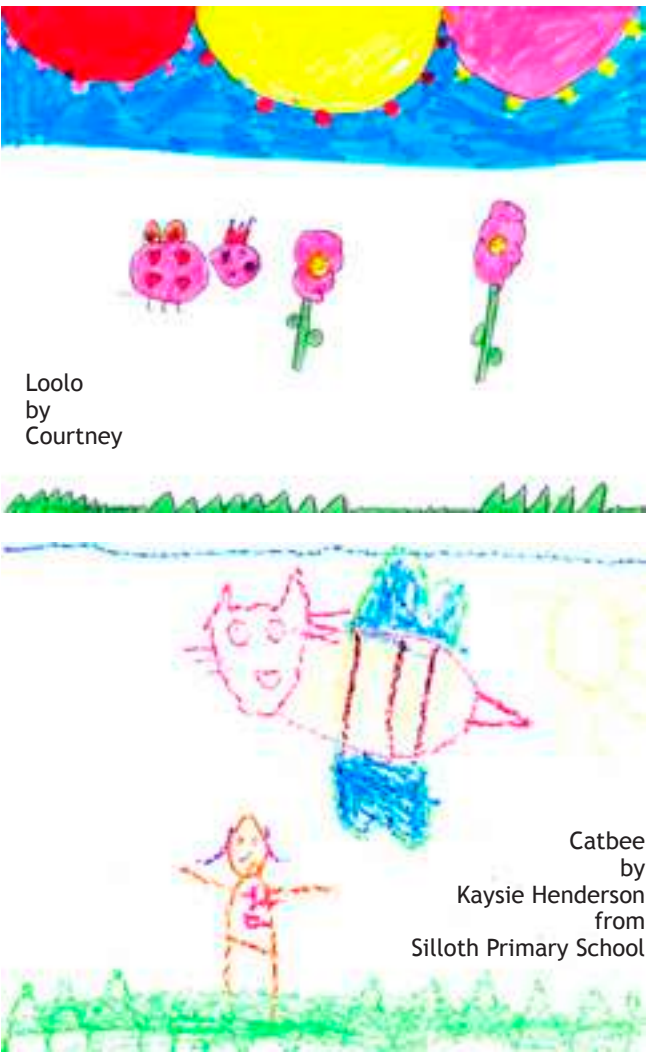

Misuse of Life Belts

Allerdale Borough Council is warning of the dangers of misusing the life belts. There have been reports to Workington Police over recent weeks, following the four life belts at Harrington Harbour being thrown into the sea by youths.

Councillor Barbara Cannon, Chair of Harrington Harbour and Dock Board, said: "Life belts and heaving lines have had to be replaced by Allerdale Borough Council within the last month alone at a cost of about £120. If anyone had the misfortune of falling into the Harbour and there were no life belts at hand, the consequences could be dire.

"I would urge parents and teachers to educate the children in their care about the dangers of not having a life belt when needed. Children and adults alike also need to be made aware

of the dangers of going onto the pier in stormy conditions.

"We have experienced some very stormy weather of late and anyone being too close to the sea in those conditions are risking their lives. We have erected a sign at the entrance of the pier warning people of the dangers but it is being ignored."

Inspector Mark Wear, from the Neighbourhood Policing Team in Workington, said: "These acts of antisocial behaviour are mindless and those responsible are not thinking of the consequences of their actions. These life belts are emergency equipment and are needed to help anyone who gets into difficulty. We are investigating the incidents and ask members of the public to contact us if they have seen anyone tampering with the life belts to get in contact with us"

companionship and their relationship blossoms into what Vavara mistakenly accepts as true friendship.

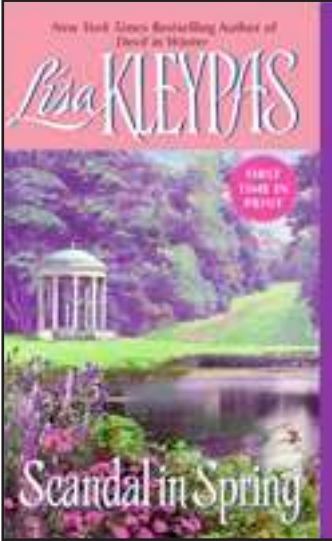
This beautiful story is woven around real life events which leave you praying that Vavara survives the transformation of Sophie as she flourishes into who we know as Catherine the Great.
