The public house was saved by a community buy-out and is now owned by over 300 local investors who are absolutely delighted to have gained a tenant with such a fantastic catering background to take on the tenancy. They are now confident that The Lowther Arms future is secured.

Green Flag Award for Silloth

Silloth-on-Solway Town Council is celebrating after receiving a Green Flag Award for Silloth Green for the 10th year in succession. Silloth Green is the only park in Allerdale to be awarded a Green Flag Award and joins only four other green spaces awarded recognition in the whole of Cumbria.

After two years that have seen our parks and green spaces play a vital role for people through lockdowns as a place to relax, exercise and meet friends and family safely, the news that Silloth Green has achieved the Green Flag Award is testament to the hard work and dedication of the team that make the green space a great space that everyone can enjoy.

Councillor Mark Orchard, Mayor of Silloth said: "Once again, we are extremely proud to announce that Silloth on Solway has been awarded the Green Flag. This is the tenth consecutive year we have achieved this prestigious award. Lead by our very own grounds maintenance team alongside the many volunteers that work tirelessly week in week out whatever the weather. Together we have yet again maintained the high standard required to achieve the Green Flag Award.

We have a huge increase in visitors year on year. Our large manicured open spaces and seasonal floral displays along with our community garden and more to enjoy really keep Silloth on Solway well and truly on the map. Thank you to everyone who has helped achieve this yet again for Silloth. Every little helps in our community and this shows what a fantastic little town we have which is why so many of us choose to live, work and visit here."

Silloth Green is one of the largest village greens in the North of England. It boasts spectacular views over the Solway Firth to Criffel and the Caerlaverock Hills in the North, and the Lake District to the South. The Green forms a green link between Silloth's grand Victorian townscape and

the sea front promenade, for many years attracting visitors seeking fresh sea air and recreational facilities.



After extensive refurbishment work, Silloth Green now boasts a modern Water Splash play area, a woodland adventure play area and a BMX track. There's also a Pirate Ship Play Area, next to the Water Splash Park, for children aged 0-5 years. Another popular attraction is the 'Big Fella' sculpture created by artist Ray Lonsdale and gifted to the town by a local resident to make people smile.

Beautiful oak picnic tables and benches are to be found in various locations, with accessible footpaths linking the various features. Along Criffel Street, some Victorian style lighting was installed, in-keeping with the heritage of the town. The Edwardian ladies' toilets built in 1910 and the spectacular Victorian pagoda overlooking the sea were also sympathetically refurbished.

The Community Garden, situated on the corner of Criffel Street and Lawn Terrace was opened in May 2014 and is cared for by the volunteers of the Friends of Silloth Green. It provides a vibrant entrance to Silloth Green and a pleasant place to sit and watch the world go by. Friends of Silloth Green are a very active group and volunteers meet on a weekly basis to help with the maintenance of the Green and have been instrumental in obtaining funding for various projects on the Green.

The Heritage Rose and Bee Garden is situated closer to the sea, with a bee hotel in the middle of a striking display of rose bushes, plants and shrubs which have created a haven for the local bee and butterfly population,

again cared for by dedicated volunteers.

Silloth Green plays host to several popular events which draw in crowds of visitors to the town. This year a new Spring into Silloth

was held in May and a Platinum Jubilee event in June. We saw the return of the Silloth Pride event in June and the Solway Coast Cycling Festival in July. Events include Soul on the Green in July, the Mega Carnival Weekend in August, and the Silloth Music & Beer Festival in September. Circus Montini visited the town in August.

During 2021/22, access to the car park on Skinburness Road near the 'Big Fella' was improved using funding from Cumbria County Council and some additional picnic tables have been provided. An area within the Community Garden was also resurfaced. A Platinum Jubilee bed was planted with new trees as part of the Queen's Green Canopy, with help from the Friends of Silloth Green and the local brownies, rainbows and guides.

Commenting on Silloth Green's success, Councillor Bill Jefferson O.B.E., Chair of the Parks Committee added: "Silloth on Solway, with the Green at its heart is one of the finest examples in Britain of what a small, dedicated community can achieve when they come together to keep their town, not only alive but thriving, in a world class setting with sunsets to die for. No longer a hidden jewel, we are back where we belong after being cut off from the outside world by the loss of our railway line in 1964. Well done to generations of organisations, volunteers and individuals who have kept on going for so long. I am over the moon we have made Green Flag ten in a row. Thank you all."

Silloth-on-Solway Town Council Needs Your Views



Silloth Town Council are doing a plan for the area to include:

- Issues around
 - ~ Accessibility for people – both locals and visitors with additional needs
 - ~ Health and Wellbeing
 - ~ Environmental sustainability
 - ~ Transport and Infrastructure
- Local people's aspirations for the area
- Project ideas and plans
- Collecting views on things the community will put energy into that the Town Council can support
- Being ready when the next funding pot is available to bid for projects in Silloth.

The plan will be developed over the next six months with four online questionnaires, a number of online and public meetings, lots of information on social media and through the Solway Buzz, and Town Councillors talking to people.

The Town Council want a plan that lays out aspirations and routes to developing Silloth for locals and visitors. This will be a rolling plan that can be regularly updated and have sufficient detail that the Town Councillors will be able to take action, monitor progress, involve others in the community and use the plan as a basis for funding bids.

A key building block of a successful plan is community support. This support will allow the Town Council to lobby for and speak on behalf of Silloth residents on the actions the plan lays out.

The Town Council will seek community support:



- Through Councillors taking ideas and set questionnaires out to the community and collecting people's responses on agreed issues
- By holding online and face to face meetings
- Through social media and using the Solway Buzz

The key issues for Silloth that the Town Council wants to address and the timetable to do this is:

- August Accessibility – building on the work of your Access working group
- October Environmental sustainability – with thoughts on actions for local people, the town, and the Council.
- December Health and wellbeing – including ideas like outdoor gym equipment, events on the Green, etc.
- February Transport and infrastructure – including access to services and improvements to roads.
- March/April Drawing the plan together
- May 2023 Launch of the Plan

Your views are needed to make this plan work.

This is an important and exciting opportunity to make your

thoughts heard on what more Silloth-on-Solway Town Council could and should deliver in future and will enable the Town Council to work with

strategic and local groups to make changes in Silloth for the benefit of locals and visitors.

We want to hear the views of a wide range of people and groups through this consultation. Whatever you feel could be made better in Silloth – whether it's enhanced green spaces to enjoy, improved accessibility for everyone, better infrastructure for walking and cycling, improved parking provision or further celebration of its heritage and history, we need to hear your views through this survey.

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Garden Tips from Friends of Silloth Green

ITS TIME TO THINK ABOUT SPRING!

September is a good time to get spring bulbs like daffodils, crocus and iris reticulata planted in your borders so they have time to establish a good root system before winter. Delay planting tulips until mid October/November to avoid the risk of the fungal disease tulip fire.

If you are planting up pots for Spring have a go at a bulb lasagne for long lasting colour. Layer up a pot, at least 12 inches (30cm) in diameter, starting with the largest and latest flowering bulbs at the bottom and smallest and earliest flowering ones at the top with compost between each layer.

Incorporate horticultural grit into the compost to improve drainage, bulbs do not like to sit in wet soil, and finally top off with compost and a layer of grit for a

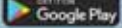
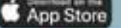
neat finish.

Place the pot somewhere sheltered, against the wall of the house or in a cold frame and await the colourful results!

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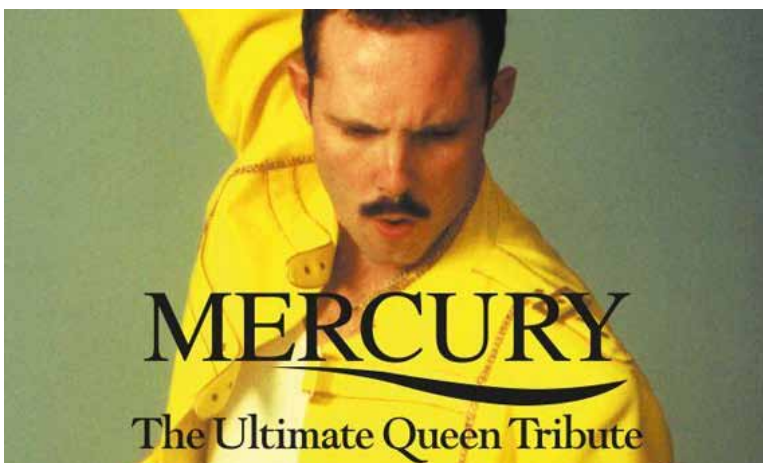

RNLI Historic Collection Box Restoration



Silloth RNLI would like to thank Nicky Harrison of DA Harrison, for the use of their digger to remove the vintage collection box, which has been sited outside the lifeboat station for many years. Previously it was positioned near Silloth Port entrance on West Beach.

The RNLI Heritage Team has requested the box, in order to renovate it. Silloth's collection box is special in that it has a rope shaped trim around the inscription on top

of the dome, one of only three known in Britain. The donation box has been sealed for many years due to vandalism and misuse.

What was unknown, was how deep the concrete base went down underneath the box and it came as a real shock to find a huge boulder of granite attached to the concrete, keeping the box well and truly anchored in place.

The box was in a sad state of repair and will hopefully be restored by the RNLI

Heritage team. The first thing that will have to be done is the removal of the huge lump of granite that is attached to the base of the box, before any attempt can be made on removing the concrete that is inside the structure, put there to stop further vandalism many years ago.

The most important part of the box is the rope shaped trim around the inscription on top of the dome - one of only three known in the country, which luckily is still in excellent condition.



The RNLI heritage team will be returning the donation box to Silloth lifeboat station, once restoration is complete.

Hallbankgate School Donation

Silloth RNLI lifeboat station would like to thank Class 2 from Hallbankgate village school, Hallbankgate, Brampton for their generous donation of £105. The children raised the money by baking and decorating cakes, along with making Birthday and Thank You cards. They collaborated with a second class at the school to raise as much money as they could, both classes then decided on the charity to whom they would like to donate the money, each one receiving 50% of the total. Class 2 decided on the RNLI and their partner class chose WWF. The children learnt about the RNLI in their class and then made information sheets for the whole school, of about 60 children.

Sally Johnstone, teacher of Class 2 came



to Silloth RNLI lifeboat station on Sunday 31 July to present the money and told us how much everyone had enjoyed learning about the lifeboat and the work that the RNLI does.

RNLI Save Dog Walker

The pagers went off at 12:38 for an immediate launch by Silloth RNLI lifeboat on Sunday 17th July.

By 12:45 the lifeboat was making its way to Mawbray, where there were two people waist deep in a fast flowing incoming tide. Onlookers at Mawbray had seen someone with a dog, in difficulties in the sea, having been cut off by the tide. They called on a local, experienced swimmer to go and assist them. The Coastguard had also been informed.

Against the advice of the RNLI generally but obviously out of concern for the casualty and their dog, the local man swam out to the casualty, who by this time was in real danger.

The lifeboat arrived on scene at 12:58 but due to the state of the tide, was having trouble reaching both people. The helmsman Chris Clark, skilfully manoeuvred the boat, having to negotiate the sandbanks and lack of water, getting as close to the casualty as possible. A member of the lifeboat crew got into the water and waded chest deep through the sea to reach the casualty and helped her and her dog back to the lifeboat. The local man was also guided to the boat.

Once on board, the casualty was



wrapped in protective equipment, and both people were safely brought back to Silloth lifeboat station at 1:26pm, where there were Coastguards from Maryport, Burgh and Whitehaven, waiting for them. The casualty, who was on holiday in the area, was extremely cold and suffering from mild hypothermia. The dog was also stressed having swallowed a considerable amount of sea water. The local man, who had gone to assist, was fine and well. An ambulance from Whitehaven was in attendance and treated the casualty on their arrival. Also present was a doctor from Immediate Care.

This rescue involved a large number of people from different services across the county, all working together and pooling their skills. The casualty and the dog made a good recovery and after some time were allowed home.

Out On a Shout to Annan

Silloth RNLI lifeboat was tasked to attend the rescue of a person seen in the water up the River Annan opposite the rugby club. The pagers went off at 12:10 pm on Monday 1 August and the lifeboat launched from the slipway outside the lifeboat station. The tide was flooding and there was enough water for the lifeboat to make its way quickly up to the River Annan in Scotland.

The RNLI lifeboat was stood down by the Coastguard when it was reported that



the person had been located and was being recovered.

Silloth lifeboat consequently returned to station and was made ready again for service by 12:45 pm.

Scots Cross the Solway to Raid Bowness!

On Sunday 14th August Silloth RNLI Lifeboat was invited to accompany seven skiffs across the Solway; six skiffs were from Scotland and one from Bowness on Solway. The skiffs also had a couple of their own safety boats who escorted them as they set off from the mouth of the River Annan in Scotland to row across the Solway Firth to Bowness-on-Solway in England, following the exploits of a raid by the Scottish on the English in 1626, when they followed the same route and plundered the Bowness on Solway church bell. The boat then was very light, the bell very heavy and a quantity of alcohol had been imbibed, resulting in the bell being lost at sea. It has never been found.

This event though, caused considerable insult to the people of Bowness on Solway and in return they went to Dornoch and Middlebie in Southern Scotland and stole their church bells. These bells still hang in Bowness on Solway's church today. The minister from Middlebie asks every year for their bell to be returned. The request is always politely declined.

Silloth RNLI Lifeboat saw the skiffs safely across the water where the boats disembarked and everyone was treated to a very pleasant and welcome lunch by the organisers and the good people of Bowness on Solway, before returning to Annan. The winners this year were Wigtown Bay Coastal Rowing Club closely followed by the Saltire Boat.

The weather was extremely kind on the day which made rowing across the Solway Firth a real pleasure, there was very little wind, the sea state was calm and an excellent day was had by all concerned.

At 3pm just before the skiffs from the Bell Raid were ready to return to Annan from Bowness on Solway Silloth RNLI lifeboat who had been in attendance for the crossing of the Solway Firth, was tasked to attend to a juvenile seen on an inflatable close to Southerness, which was being carried out to sea on a strong ebbing tide.

The lifeboat crew made their way down the Solway and arrived on scene very quickly. They ascertained that the casualty (along with the very distinctive inflatable) was walking on some rocks towards the shore. An outlying submerged crop of rocks which were becoming exposed due to the ebbing tide, had stopped the inflatable from being swept out to sea and the casualty was able to self rescue.

Nith Inshore Rescue was also involved. Having been in contact with the Coastguard to discuss the situation, Silloth RNLI lifeboat stood down and returned to station and made ready for service again.



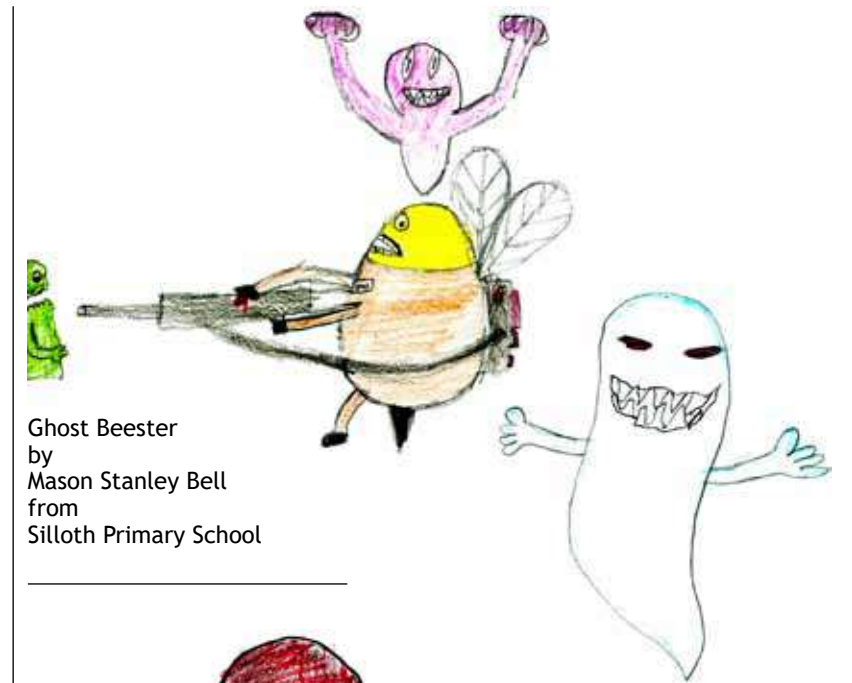

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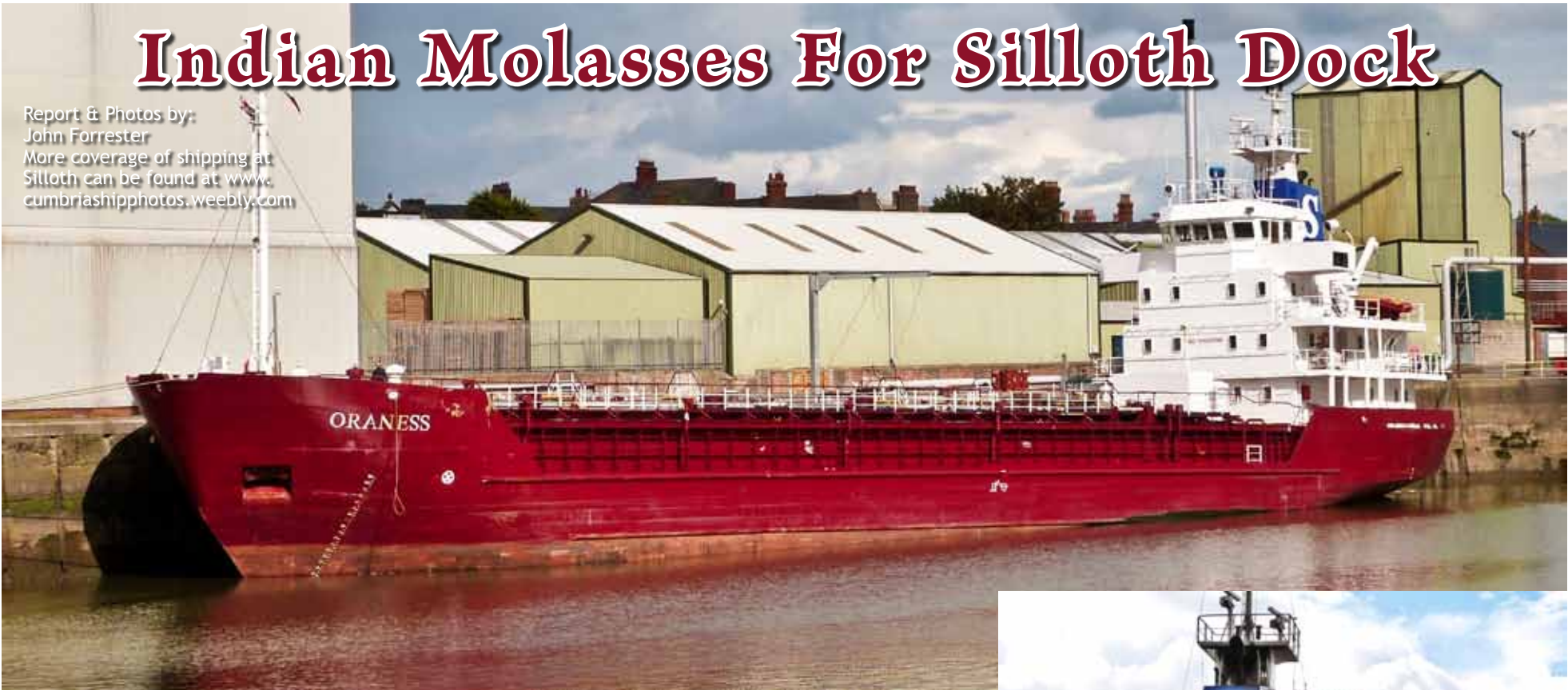
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Indian Molasses For Silloth Dock

A recent highlight for ship enthusiasts was a visit from molasses tanker ORANESS. The Danish tanker was a welcome alternative to ZAPADNY which has become the regular carrier of syrupy cargos to Silloth. ORANESS last called at the port eight years ago when it was photographed at the quayside.

The latest delivery

illustrated the international nature of shipping serving the town's industries. ORANESS had loaded Indian molasses in Amsterdam by ship-to-ship transfer from a Norwegian bulk carrier. The bulker, with a capacity twenty times that of ORANESS, had taken a month to sail from the west coast of India via the Suez Canal. Our smaller coastal tanker ORANESS then made

the relatively short three-day sailing from the Netherlands to Silloth.

ORANESS is a dedicated vegetable oil tanker. It is fitted with heated tanks to enable molasses to be transported and discharged in liquid form. The ship's Danish owner 'Simonsen' is a family run business with a history going back several generations. It currently operates a fleet of nine tankers, of which ORANESS is one of the smallest. Like ZAPADNY, its size enables it to serve smaller ports around Europe.

ORANESS quickly pumped out its cargo to dockside storage tanks. The sugary material is combined with other ingredients in an adjacent unit to make the familiar 'Crystalx' animal feed. It was a short visit for the tanker which was soon ready for its onward sailing to Avonmouth. With ZAPADNY undergoing planned maintenance, it is hoped there may be time for Silloth to receive more new tankers before the regular one is back in service.

July Shipping at the Port of Silloth

July

10th Furness Abbey from Barrow then on to Whitehaven.
11th Oraness with a cargo of Molasses from Amsterdam then on to Avonmouth.
12th Paula C with a cargo of Fertiliser from Antwerp then on to Londonderry.
12th Doonhamer from Lancaster for dredging then on to sea for orders.
25th Christine from Flushing with a cargo of Wood Pulp then on to Plymouth.
Lady Astrid from Aviles with a cargo of Fertiliser then on to Drogadha.
After a not so good June, the port has had a bit happening! Four cargo vessel calls, dredging and some buoy surveys carried out.

Two cargoes of fertiliser and one of woodpulp with some

molasses in the mix was an average to good month for the port. We had been in discussion over dredging with the MMO since November 2020 and finally got permissions to carry out dredging within the port from them in June this year!

The vessel, Doonhamer, is a water injection dredger, she pushes large volumes of water out of nozzles under the boat and into the surface of the mud in the dock, this raises all the loose sediment into a suspension in the dock water, which we allow to flow out through the dock gates, keeping them open until the tide has gone out. With the tide out we can see the effect and the actual height of the dock bottom mud levels above the dock gate bottom (cill).

In this event we have cleared all the sediment that has built up since we last dredged and a small amount more. We are hoping next year to get a little closer to the actual bottom of the dock

and once at that level, carry out smaller maintenance dredges to maintain the level moving forward.

The Furness Abbey travelled up from Barrow-in-Furness via Whitehaven to carry out survey work and then some buoyage maintenance, she will return in August for dock surveys and further Buoy work.

Our cargo vessels brought in fertiliser for Origin at the Silloth Airfield and some woodpulp for Futumura in Wigton, hopefully this will continue over the remainder of the year.

The Oraness brought in some molasses in the place of our normal Zapadny who was having a little maintenance stop in dry dock as part of her statutory Hull and machinery survey works.

Finally the weather has warmed up and we look to a few weeks of warm and slightly less windy weather than May and June.

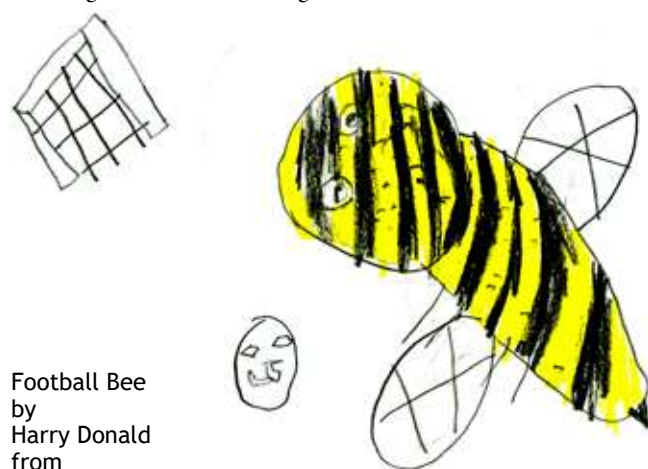
would like to take this opportunity to thank both Liam and Brian for their time and dedication.
