The highlight of our July meeting was the presentation given by Deborah and Christina, representatives of the Great North Air Ambulance Service. Using explanations, short videos and some very moving personal experience, Dundraw ladies received an inspiring, detailed and informative overview of the work of the Great North Air Ambulance Service.

We learnt that:

- * each helicopter has a team of 3: a pre-hospital doctor, a paramedic and ... a pilot
- * the helicopters don't fly at night when they are replaced by rapid response cars
- * it takes 4 minutes from GNAAS receiving a phone call to the helicopter being airborne
- * the helicopters cover Cumbria and Northumbria part of Yorkshire and the Isle of Man.

All this amazing life saving work can not be done without us, the public, because the Great North Air Ambulance Service is a



charity!

La'al Yella Wellies by our Buzzing Twitterings

La'al yella wellies

It's the late 1980's, those of us who can remember them, were dancing the night away to Come On Eileen, Faith, With or Without You or Who's that Girl. On the south coast of England a small all white heron like bird arrives from the Mediterranean for its first visit. By 1996 those first pioneers had successfully bred and now over 25 years later the Little Egret is a common sight in coastal areas across England. It is thought that

the increasing temperatures and milder winters have encouraged it spread and it has now even ventured up into Scotland.

You may have seen these beautiful birds either stalking across pools left on the beach as the tide goes out or standing patiently watching for prey in the creaks and mud flats that surround Grune Point near Skinburness.

Whilst our common Heron is a distinctive tall grey bird with a yellow beak and elegant long neck, it's small pure white relative the

Little Egret is half its size with a shorter neck, two long feathery plumes on its neck and those fabulous, comical yellow feet, the La'al yella wellies of the title.

Those beautiful long white plumes on the Little Egret's neck caused it serious problems. The plumes were prized during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries when they were used to create ornate decorations on hats

and costumes. As a result of their popularity at times the plumes became more valuable than gold, this resulted a massacre and a huge drop in the European population of Little Egrets.

Back to those lovely La'la yella wellies. It is thought that the Little Egret's instantly recognizable yellow feet help to startle small fish the favoured prey of the birds. As the birds stand patiently knee deep in water, they gently shuffle their colourful feet aiming to startle small fish out of their hiding place in mud or vegetation. Whatever the reason we love them!

Little Egret's are generally social birds who will nest in groups with others such as Great White Egrets (their larger cousins) and Grey Heron's. Bizarrely, although largely water loving birds, they commonly nest in trees building large chaotic, unstable piles of sticks. Their crazy fluffy chicks born in spring/summer look ungainly perched on top of these precarious piles.

Thanks for reading, we'll be back in August. In the meantime, don't forget to watch the skies, look in hedgerows or just out your kitchen window and see what you can see.

Held over the weekend of 19th & 20th July, the 2025 Rally featured an impressive array of vintage tractors, classic cars, motorbikes, stationary engines, commercial vehicles, and more. Visitors of all ages enjoyed a nostalgic stroll through motoring history, with plenty to keep the whole family entertained – from traditional fairground rides and food stalls to trade stands and live performances.

In the main arena was the Ridgeside Falconry display, which captivated audiences with birds of prey from around the world. Audience participation made the experience especially memorable for younger visitors.

Adding to the excitement, Ridgeside's Little Nippers Racing brought high-energy canine chaos

to the arena, as dogs raced over obstacles in pursuit of an electric lure. Phill even gave members of the public the chance to try the course with their own four-legged friends – regardless of breed!

Wandering the Green was crowd favourite Jason the Juggling Jester, whose witty banter, balloon art, bubble tricks, and skilled juggling drew a trail of delighted families wherever he performed.

On Sunday, the music stage came alive with the performance by "Wall of Sound", a seven-piece band dubbed "All the Old Dudes" by the local press. With a combined age of nearly 500, the group delivered crowd-pleasing hits from the 50s, 60s, and 70s, covering rock, pop, soul, and blues classics. Carlos, acting as compère throughout the weekend, also lent his voice to some well-loved tunes.

The Mayor of Silloth, Owen Martin, had the difficult task of selecting this year's Best in Show. A 1956 ERF KV 1100 was awarded the honour, and the prestigious shield was presented to Alan Watson from Holmrook.

The Vintage Rally committee were pleased to commission a new trophy this year, in memory of former committee member and Mayor of Silloth, Graham Wilkinson, who had a passion for anything vintage and steam related. Our thanks go to Graham's wife Marjorie and his family, who after much deliberation, chose the 1923 Blackstone J stationary engine, with the trophy being presented to JN Forster from Carlisle.

The Silloth Vintage Rally is a community-driven event, organised by a committed team of volunteers who work tirelessly all year-round to bring the celebration to life. The organisers extend heartfelt thanks to the local businesses, sponsors, Silloth Town Council, and the grounds maintenance team, whose support and hard work made the event possible.

This year's event was made possible thanks to generous grants from the Solway Firth Partnership via the Robin Rigg Community Fund (£1,500), the



Silloth Community Shop (£1,000), and the Cumbria Community Foundation through the Hellrigg Community Benefit Fund (£1,500). To raise some additional funds this year, we had an amazing tombola organised by Lorraine. The beautiful Kath's Crochet Creations were available to purchase and the raffle of a unique handmade shoebox farm, all of which attracted a lot of interest.

Chairman, Tony Markley said "My continued thanks go to the dedicated volunteers on the committee and experienced helpers, both past and present, who continue to work tirelessly to make this annual event an enormous success for Silloth, Cumbria and the North of England."

The Committee are incredibly

grateful for everyone's support. The event continues to grow each year, and it's clear how much it means to the community. We're already looking forward to making 2026 even better but we need more people to get involved. 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Silloth Gets Green Flag Award for 13th Year!

Silloth Green Raises Prestigious Green Flag Award for 13th Year Running
Silloth has one of only two parks in Cumbria recognised with the international quality mark for parks and green spaces.



Silloth-on-Solway Town Council is proud to announce that Silloth Green has once again been awarded the prestigious Green Flag Award, marking an incredible 13th consecutive year of recognition for excellence in park management and community engagement.

The Green Flag Award is the international quality mark for parks and green spaces, and this year only two parks in Cumbria – Silloth Green and Castle Park in Penrith – have received the honour. The cemeteries at Alston and Penrith were also recognised with a Green Flag Award.

This recognition places Silloth Green among just 2,250 parks and green spaces across the UK to achieve the award in 2025, underlining its continued commitment to excellence, sustainability, and community value.

Councillor Owen Martin, Mayor of Silloth, commented: "I am incredibly proud to

announce that Silloth Green has once again been awarded the prestigious Green Flag Award for 2025. This achievement is a testament to the tireless dedication of our volunteers, staff, and community members who work so hard to keep the Green a beautiful, welcoming, and sustainable space for all. On behalf of the town, I extend my heartfelt thanks to each and every one of you — this honour belongs to you."

One of the largest village greens in the North of England, Silloth Green is a vibrant, welcoming space with spectacular views over the Solway Firth to Criffel and the Caerlaverock Hills, and across to the Lake District. Its unique combination of heritage, modern facilities, and natural beauty has made it a favourite destination for residents and visitors alike.

Attractions on the Green include a Water Splash Park,

woodland adventure play area, BMX track, and Pirate Ship Play Area for younger children. New for 2025 is a 16-station fitness trail, stretching from the lifeboat station to the bee garden, and again from the picnic area near the tennis courts to just past the iconic 'Big Fella' sculpture, gifted to the town by a local resident.

The recently refurbished replica Hudson bomber continues to serve as a striking tribute and focal point on the Green, while the Victorian Pagoda, oak picnic benches, accessible footpaths,

and heritage-style lighting all contribute to Silloth's distinctive charm.

Community involvement plays a vital role in Silloth Green's ongoing success. The Friends of Silloth Green maintain the Community Garden, situated on the corner of Criffel Street, providing a vibrant entrance to Silloth Green and a pleasant place to sit and watch the world go by. The Bee Garden, situated closer to the sea, has a bee hotel in the middle of a striking display of colourful plants and shrubs, creating a haven for the local bee and butterfly population, again cared for by dedicated volunteers.

Councillor Melanie Irving, Chair of the Parks and Play Equipment Committee (2024/25), said: "It's an amazing achievement for Silloth to be awarded the Green Flag Award again. The work that staff and volunteers put into achieving this recognition is a credit to our town. You should be very proud of yourselves, working tirelessly all year round in all weathers. You all deserve it."

Silloth Green also serves as the backdrop for a variety of popular events throughout the year, the majority of which are organised by volunteers. In 2025, the calendar has already featured a new Emergency Services Day, the Silloth Green Dayz in May, and the Firebird Festival in July. Upcoming highlights include the

Silloth Vintage Rally, Soul on the Green, and the August Carnival, all of which draw visitors from across the region and further afield.

Paul Todd MBE, Green Flag Award Scheme Manager, praised the achievement: "Congratulations to everyone involved in Silloth Green who have worked tirelessly to ensure that it achieves the high standards required for the Green Flag Award."

Quality parks and green spaces like Silloth Green make the country a healthier place to live and work in, and a stronger place in which to invest.

Crucially, Silloth Green is a vital green space for communities in Cumberland to enjoy nature, and during the ongoing cost of living crisis it is a free and safe space for families to socialise. It also provides important opportunities for local people and visitors to reap the physical and mental health benefits of green space."

The Green Flag Award scheme, managed by environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy under licence from the Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government, recognises and rewards well-managed parks and green spaces, setting the benchmark standard for the management of green spaces across the United Kingdom and around the world.

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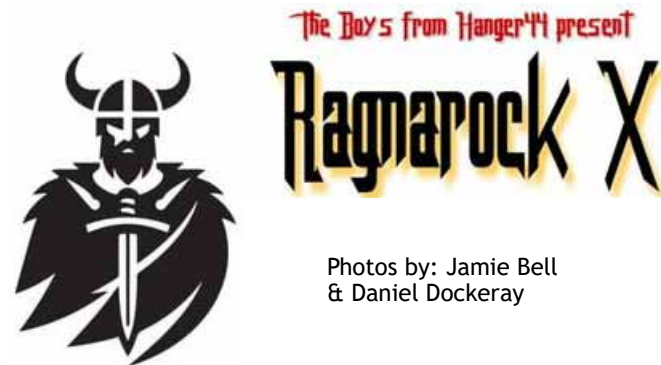

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Familiar Ship in New Livery at Silloth Dock

It was a busy start to summer for shipping at Silloth Dock. Amongst the regular visitors one ship in particular was noteworthy, the EDZARD CIRKSENA. The port welcomed back the general cargo vessel at the beginning of June after a gap of nine years. It was looking stylish in a new livery having come under the management of 'Vertom Shipping'. The ship was built seventeen years ago and is one of oldest vessels in their fleet.

Frustratingly, the ship arrived during the night from Antwerp, however, that didn't prevent ship spotters from getting their photos; the solution was to catch the ship departing. To assist with this, Silloth enthusiasts needed to develop their skills at predicting departure times. If all factors, such as cargo size, weather conditions etc are favourable, then ships can often be turned around within one tide, and true to form, EDZARD was quickly unloaded allowing departure the following afternoon.

A gathering of photographers readied themselves as the pilot was spotted climbing the ship's gangway to be greeted by the crew. About an hour before high water the ship was eased away from the quayside and lined up to squeeze through the dock entrance, always a dramatic manoeuvre. Once out of the dock, the captain was able to increase power and head towards the Solway. The amiable pilot spared a moment to give a wave to onlookers from the wheelhouse.

As the ship passed by there was no mistaking the new owner's name, with 'Vertom' prominently highlighted along the ship's hull. The Dutch company uses its distinctive livery on most of its ships, including the large 'V' logo on the wheelhouse and green flag flying from the foremast. 'Vertom' is a sizeable player in the short sea shipping market with a fleet of more than seventy vessels. The name EDZARD CIRKSENA stands out as unusual amongst others in the fleet. Some of us are fascinated by the origin of ship's names. A quick search reveals EDZARD was a notable historical character, being a 15th century chieftain of the German coastal region of East Frisia.

It appears the ship continues to be drawn back to the homeland of its namesake by trading mainly between the Low Countries and UK. On leaving Silloth the ship made a couple more calls at UK ports before heading back to home territory.

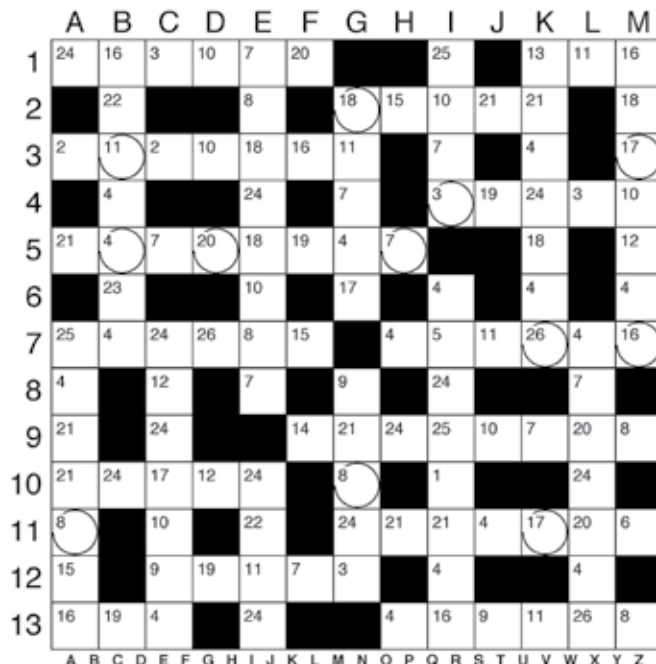

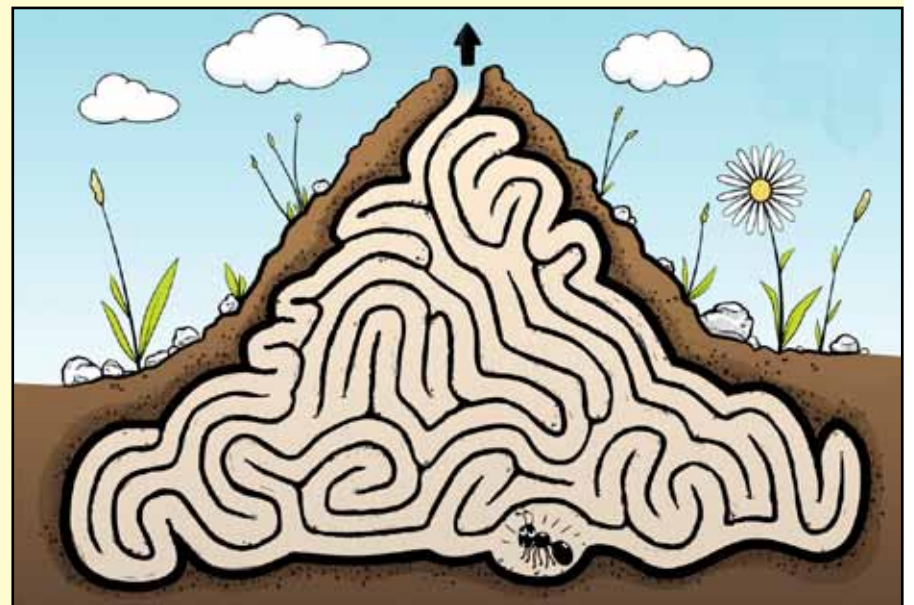
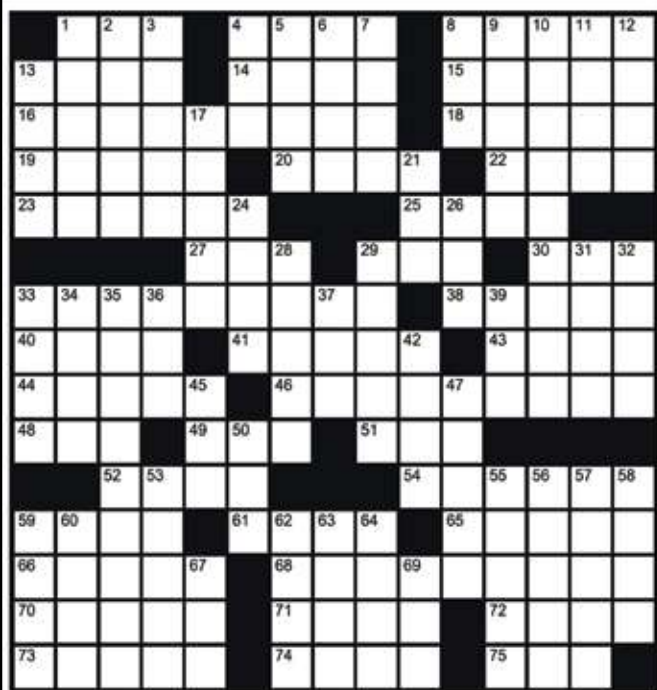

Harbour Master, Short Sea Pilot

Once again our port hosted a couple of vessels, and our old favourite, Zapadnyy. We had two loads of fertiliser from Antwerp and Klaipeda and then Molasses from Amsterdam.

Not as busy a month as anticipated, however, we were due a fourth cargo from Derry which ended up delayed and will appear in next months tome!

We have successfully reconnected our port entrance sluicing pipework and this is now fully operational and keeping the silt in the port entrance very much reduced.

In addition, our Port is now moving closer to completion of the sale to FoxJackson Ports and the MMO have now received all correspondence

concerning the change of ownership and will now move ahead with the Harbour Revision Order to be submitted to the Government some time later in the year. Current estimate of timings is around the end of September, but this is only an estimate.

Summer has finally arrived, strong winds, heavy rain and cloudy. What more could we want?

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Beware Doorstep Crime & Cold Callers

Recognise and report doorstep crime and cold callers

How to get help if you're dealing with rogue traders, how to recognise doorstep crime and how we respond to these crimes.

If you or someone you know needs assistance in dealing with a rogue trader you can contact Trading Standards through the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline on 0808 223 1133.

Due to the nature of these crimes Cumberland Council treat this work as a priority and work with partner agencies such as Cumbria Police to help raise awareness and tackle potential offenders.

How to recognise doorstep crime:

Doorstep crime involves cold callers and rogue traders trying to sell goods or services. The traders involved prove difficult to trace and as a consequence consumers have difficulties obtaining recompense in respect of any defective work.

Red light warning indicators for doorstep crime are:



person or business cold calling at various properties touting for business

no paperwork is given and there are no cancellation rights money is requested 'up front' before any work has been carried out

trader does not complete the work and consumer cannot contact them

Rapid response:
Cumberland Council operate a rapid response protocol as part of their strategy to combat doorstep crime and help support the consumers of Cumberland.

Whenever possible they will aim to attend incidents, usually in conjunction with the Police, where elderly and vulnerable members of the community have been approached by rogue traders.
